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Raju's dream - to be a computer engineer

A run away, Raju Boitai was sweeping the railway compartments with his friends. Here he contacted the Bhubaneswar platform school and was counseled and mainstreamed to a government school. A child without family support he was taken



care of in ASRA, a home for destitute children run by the organisation where he was provided with food, clothes and other basic amenities as well as family care. Supported by the organisation he has completed High School examination with 70 % marks and is in college now.

Thousands of children like Raju today have been mainstreamed to society with the intervention of Ruchika Social Service Organisation for over 20 years.

Our History

As the capital of Orissa and a major railway hub of the east coast, Bhubaneswar attracts a countless number of impoverished, homeless and unemployed families and the children from different parts of the state as well as neighbouring states. Living conditions of these families is deplorable and depressing. Without family guidance the children are often forced into a life of crime; drug addiction and alcoholism is rampant; domestic abuse is commonplace. Every day is a struggle simply to survive. This is the plight of over 80,000 children of the city.

We believe

"If the child cannot come to the school then the school must come to the child" Ruchika cares for children in difficult circumstances, providing education, skills for employment and by improving health.

Acknowledging the formidable challenges faced by the beggar children of Bhubaneswar Mrs. Inderjit Khurana started a fun school at the Railway platform in 1985. With a large variety of educational innovations and other services it now reaches to over 4500 children on the street and of the slums.

Our mission ...

Advance opportunities for underprivileged children through education to

- create a society free of child labour destitution, exploitation and abandonment;
- 2. equip children with the knowledge necessary to become active partipants and positive contributors to their communities; and
- 3. Provide all children with a joyful and creative school atmosphere that incorporates the education and skills relevant to a meaningful and dignified existence.

We believe ...

Education is no more a distant dream.

To realize education for all Ruchika initiated a programme for taking meaningful and enjoyable education to the most unreached children of Bhubaneswar. Presently 3000 children access education, through 72 alternative schools, 6 street education centres and 12 platform schools spread in the city slums, street corners and major railway hubs of Orissa. Interesting songs, stories, puppetry, sight reading cards and other child centred and activity oriented methodology is used to motivate the children and prevent dropouts.

The curriculum of formal school is followed to bridge the gap to mainstream education. District Inspectors of schools evaluate the

children for eligibility to enter Government schools. Functional education and life skills are emphasized.

Importance is given to parents associations with the teacher and community involvement to prepare the former to manage the school



Pre-schooling is everychild's right

27 Balwadis and 6 Day Care Centers for children in the age group of 6 months to 6 years are run as pre-school centers. This program prepares 1100 children to be enrolled into government schools from class I. Children enjoy the program with a lot of hand made activity materials and collected from the environment.

Response to women & Children in crisis

CHILDLINE - 1098 and HELPLINE -10920 are toll free 24 hours crisis response centers for children and women in distress. They are

rescued through a round the clock telephone outreach service and provided with immediate medical aid, shelter service and food if necessary. The victims are restored to families and provided with necessary legal aid, counseling and other services. Short stay

homes, old age homes, orphanages, police, hospitals, Red Cross, lawyers and other allied systems are contacted for their expert advice.

Homes for the Homeless

One shelter for boys and one for girls/women are run especially for those who do not have any family ties. The shelters are also used as short stay homes for those who are runaways. Children are provided with a home, an identity and address as well as food, clothes, sleeping, bathing and toilet facilities. Counseling, education, health care, recreation, vocational training and rehabilitation services are also made available. The families of run away children are contacted and they are repatriated to their homes.

Health Care a must for All

The high mortality rate among children, on account of malnutrition and sickness were issues of concern. High risk of infection, of living in unhygienic conditions, abject poverty, ignorance and illiteracy convinced the organisation to start a regular medical service. Starting with homeopathy, it is presently using allopathic and other alternative medicine systems.

The organization has 15 part time doctors who reach out to over 2500 children and community members everyday. checkups were conducted and health cards maintained and updated regularly. In addition tuberculosis and leprosy patients are identified and referred for further treatment to Govt. hospitals. Immunization drive continues. Family planning through advocacy and individual counseling has been successful. Three family planning camps were organized. In addition health awareness was created among the children as well as the community.

Addressing the need for potable water and sanitation

No toilets, no waste-disposal facilities, insufficient water facilities and occupations such as rag picking and sweeping the train compounded the health problems. Disease was an inevitable consequence.

Child-friendly latrines and sanitary blocks have been constucted at the 60 schools. Water facilities are provided at 10 schools. In addition the children of two schools are experimenting with rain water harvesting.

Hygiene was made a part of the daily curriculum in the education centers. Children a retaught personal hygiene and environmental cleanliness through actual



hands on practice and puppetry. Every Saturday children are given an oil and soap bath. Nails are clipped and clothes washed. Health messages are given through puppet shows.

Every child has a right to food.

65 % children on the street and railway stations have been identified with malnutrition and vitamin deficiency. Recognizing the extent of malnutrition children of platform schools, street education centers, crèches (day care centers), balwadis are provided with supplementary nutrition -a protein enriched cereal. The shelter children eat three regular meals a day.

Life without fear of HIV/AIDS

Sexual experiences are rampant among street children especially during adolescence. Without a home and support, girls are raped by older boys even in daytime. Hence the incidence of Sexually Transmitted Diseases is wide spread. This necessitated a targeted intervention to sensitize the adolescent population to the dangers of the maladies, and to enable them to seek remedial treatment. The goal was to influence behavioral moderation/modulation towards greater prudence and safety in sex. The strategies included counseling the adolescents to change their high-risk behavior, providing STD care and treatment, educating the children on safe sex practices and making the environment conducive to implement the program.

Our Innovations

School on wheels is our innovation of the year. Two trolleys with a large wooden box to store materials and black boards on either side reach to the children who were untouched by any of the programs.

They are children who work on the pavements and in roadside stalls. We take education program to their place and at the time when they are available.




