"The sense that someone cares about their situation and that the voice of this displaced population was being heard by the Sudanese government raised community morale," he continued, "It gave people energy and enthusiasm to continue lobbying until progress is made to improve their very difficult circumstances."

The distinguished guests got an earful from local residents taking full advantage of the opportunity--not only on issues related to their health, but other daily concerns like electricity, water, roads and transportation, school infrastructure, and healthcare. In turn, the governor made promises to work towards practical solutions and delegated different issues to a few of his key staff who had accompanied him to the opening. They were to establish communication and follow up with the local people's committee.
