6 free surgical eye camps had been organized by the Ophthalmology Department of Fatima Memorial Hospital, in 2008. The camps were held at the Fatima Memorial Hospital, Shadman Lahore and were targeted at the general public with the aim to provide free diagnosis and treatment of eye diseases.



The medicines to outdoor patients as well as the post operative medicines were given absolutely free of cost by the Fatima Memorial Hospital to almost 974 patients. 985 Free spectacles were provided to the poor patients. The camp also offered new Phaco Emulsification Procedure for cataract surgery and provided free IOL implantation to 150 patients through the 6 Eye Camps held in 2008.

She was admitted to Fatima Memorial Hospital after visiting Free Eye camp conducted by Fatima Memorial Hospital, where she was advised to have a free IOL implant. She had a successful operation of IOL implant at FMH and qualified for treatment as a non-paying patient. Hardly anyone from her family comes to the hospital to see her because her husband drives Rickshaw all day long which is the only source of bread and butter for them. She is satisfied from the hospital staff and feels very much at home with other patients in the ward.

She feels all better now and will be able to get out and about and live a healthy life with her family in a day or two. According to the doctors, she will be discharged from the hospital over the short haul.
