Score4Africa Award

Rarieda Road Show

We're more pleased to report that through sponsorship from the Safaricom Foundation. A&K Kenva will host its 18th Health Awareness Road Show next year in Rarieda

District. Last year, we interacted with over 35,000 children in Eastern Province using our health awareness posters, complemented with music, drama and zonal football and volleyball tournaments to disseminate health awareness advice. Next year, we hope to disseminate information on HIV/AIDS and TB to over 40,000 students and youth in 30 secondary schools, and 23 community sports groups over the 5 week duration of the road show scheduled for February 2010 in Rarieda District.

Dandora Drug-Free Street Soccer Tournament

On the 17th October 2009, A&K Kenya held a drug-free street soccer tournament at the Dandora Stadium Grounds.

Known for hosting Nairobi's dumping site, its high crime rate, smuggling and unemployment, Dandora is considered one of the most impoverished areas in Nairobi. The tournament therefore formed part of a larger drive to mobilise young people from around the Dandora neighbourhood, using football to encourage healthy behavioural choices and discourage the abuse of drugs. The theme for the day was 'drugs and football don't mix', with anti drug messages printed on A&K balls. Balls were awarded to the winning team, the runners up, and winners of a quiz about HIV/ AIDS and drugs abuse following a health awareness session.

Luis Figo Workshop & Tournament on TB/HIV

HIV and TB form a lethal combination, each speeding the other's progress. According to WHO, TB is the leading cause of death among people who are HIV positive, while in Africa, HIV is the single most important factor determining the increased incidence of TB. In a bid to therefore raise awareness of TB/HIV co-infection, Alive & Kicking, teamed up with the Stop TB Partnership, WHO, Mathare Youth Sport Association, Vijana Amani Pamoja, and the National Aids/ STD Control Programme, to organize a Stop TB workshop and tournament that took place between 30th November

and 1st December. 24 teams; all of which walked away A&K footballs printed with TB & HIV messages, took part in the health awareness workshops and six-aside football tournament targeted at under 12s. In attendance were Dr. Jorge Sampaio - UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy to Stop TB, Wilfried Lemke - Special Advisor on Sport for Development & Peace, and Hon. Prof. Hellen Sambili – Kenyan Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports, among others.

In support of Special Olympics Kenya's inaugural 'Camp Shriver' that



engaged 106 children aged 8 - 25 years with intellectual disabilities and their partners in social activities such

as football and basketball, A&K Kenya distributed 15 footballs donated by the Ashworth Trust to the camp. The camp, which was held at the Kenyatta University, was modelled after other Camp Shriver's around the world, with the aim of including children with and without intellectual disabilities in the same recreational programmes alongside one another. During the camp children with disabilities were partnered up with those without disabilities to promote social inclusion of children with disabilities and allowing the children without disabilities the opportunity to interact with and achieve a greater understanding and appreciation of their peers with disabilities.
