Warm Hearth is truly one of the most amazing experiences of my life. Most of you know the levels of social stigma and discrimination against people with disabilities have always been very high in Armenia and it will take a very long time to change this. However, with Warm Hearth it doesn't seem so impossible any more. I grew up in Armenia, in a society where we carried the Soviet ideology that considered people with disabilities a burden. I know families, even relatives, who were hiding their children because they had a disability. They were ashamed or simply didn't want to take care of these children so they ended up in an orphanage. I grew up thinking the same way. I didn't know any better and when I realized how wrong we were, I was ashamed. Then I felt helpless because I didn't know how to change this. Warm Hearth is my hope. This organization is not only helping its residents. It is also helping Armenians like me who want to change their country but can't do it alone.
