Dear Friends,

My involvement with the Boys & Girls Clubs spans more than thirty years...the last twenty-eight right here in our great community. In that time, I have seen the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley grow and mature like so many of our wonderful children.

Originally founded in Huntington Beach in 1967, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley has grown over the last 40 years to include five facilities: two school age centers, one in Huntington Beach and one in Fountain Valley; two licensed preschools in Huntington Beach, including one on the campus of Golden West College; and a performing arts center in Fountain Valley. Together, these sites serve more than 7,200 youth annually. We are providing programs that make a difference by "inspiring and enabling the healthy development of all young people, especially those from disadvantaged circumstances, to realize their full potential as productive, responsible and caring members of our community."

Today, without question, we are one of our community's greatest assets. But, there are still more children and families that need our help. In particular, programs like ours are needed in areas of Huntington Beach where fewer community programs exist for a large population of "at-risk" children. Our solution to meet this critical need is to open a new Club.

Through a partnership with Golden West College, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley will build this newest Club in the center of the College's campus. This new location will provide a new and improved home for the Golden West College Child Development Center, licensed and operated by the Club, and will include a school age youth facility with gymnasium that will serve as many as 500 children per day. This site will not only provide the services the community needs, but will also inspire thousands of children and parents to pursue a college education.

To accomplish this challenging but very realistic goal, the Board of Directors will lead the organization through a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds to build and furnish the facility and also to help it operate successfully through its first year. On the following pages you will read more information about our exciting plans and I sincerely hope it moves you to support this great project.

Naturally, we need the support and involvement of our entire community to make this dream a reality. We know that we will succeed, especially if we have help from people like you. Please know that you are invited and welcome to help us...in any way...to give this Club to the kids of our community. Please consider joining our special team of donors and volunteers organized to make a real difference.

### 7,200 Youth Annually

Last year, more than 7,200 boys and girls ages 6 weeks to 18 years built their dreams at our two school age centers, performing arts center, and two licensed preschools, all open year-round: Kingston Fountain Valley Branch, Huntington Beach Branch, ClubHouse Academy Center for the Arts, Learning Center Preschool, and Golden West College Child Development Center.

Children start their days at one of the Clubs as early as 6:30 a.m. and are picked up by their parents as late as 8:00 p.m. During the summer and holidays, most children are with us at least ten hours each day! At the Learning Center Preschool and Golden West College Child Development Center, we operate licensed preschool and school readiness programs for more than 300 children. These programs also include services such as on-site counseling, health screenings, child assessments, and family support services.



Our extended hours and programs allow parents to work and provide for their families or go to school to improve their families' circumstances. We provide more than \$300,000 in scholarships each year so children from low-income families, who need our help the most, can benefit from Boys & Girls Club activities. We were also among the first to provide transportation for children to and from area schools on a daily basis. We now serve 34 schools, giving more desperately needed flexibility to the parents of hundreds of our children.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley provides much more than quality supervision at an affordable cost. Character building and school readiness are recurrent themes in all of our core programs. Our enrichment activities, such as sports leagues, performing and fine arts, gymnastics and martial arts instruction also form an integral part of the learning experience.

We realize that our role is important in today's world because families truly depend on us to take an active and positive role in their children's lives. This means that in addition to teaching arts and crafts, cooking and sports, we must teach socialization and living skills in a positive environment and provide academic support and homework assistance to assure success in school and in life.

We provide the highest quality programs that give kids the tools they need to succeed. Added to their toolboxes are improved academic skills, self-confidence, creativity, experience with technology, good health and fitness habits, leadership skills and so much more. Whether children dream of being artists, professional athletes or scientists, activities at the Boys & Girls Clubs help them build the path to success.






1 9 7 4. The Girls Club of Fountain Valley opens its doors, with the help of local service groups, city officials and a donation from the family of the late Lt. Cmdr. Charles R. Lee. The Club's daily programs were operated out of a local school.

976 Girls Club of Fountain Valley gets its own site, a three-section trailer owned by the City of Fountain Valley, rented for \$1 per year.

1 980 All three clubs become co-ed and change their named to reflect that boys and girls can participate in their programs.

1981 Girls & Boys Clubs of Fountain Valley-Huntington Beach (formerly the Girls Club of Fountain Valley) outgrows its trailer and moves to the Kid Connection Branch at the old Wardlow School site.

1982 The Huntington Beach and Fountain Valley Boys & Girls Clubs vote to merge the two organizations, forming the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley, serving two cities in three locations (Club on Yorktown near Delaware, school site on Yorktown behind Oka School and Nieblas School site in Fountain Valley).

1986 With a goal of replacing the two smaller Huntington Beach sites, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley breaks ground at McCallen Park in Huntington Beach.

1997 The Huntington Beach Branch opens at McCallen Park.

1995 Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley merges with Girls & Boys Clubs of Fountain Valley-Huntington Beach, making the Club the largest youth-serving organization in the community.

1 9 9 7 The Kingston Branch at Mile Square Park in Fountain Valley is opens.

2003 The Club is named #1 in the Nation for Overall Program Excellence by Boys & Girls Clubs of America. The Club's Learning Center Preschool earns National Accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children. The Club wins the Marketing and Communications Award for the Boys & Girls Club with the most comprehensive and effective marketing strategy in the nation.

The Club wins Annie E. Casey Award from the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, given to the best family support programs in the nation.

2005 The Club begins operating the Golden West College Child Development Center on the college's campus, beginning a strong partnership with college.

2006 The Club opens the ClubHouse Academy, a 5,000 square foot facility in Fountain Valley dedicated to the arts.

> The Wardlow School site is sold, causing the relocation of the Learning Center preschool to the Haven View School site and the closure of the Kid Connection Branch.

> Golden West College and the Club sign a 45-year lease agreement to build a new Club and child development center on the college's campus.

2007 The Club launches the "Building Dreams" Campaign.

### A Strategic Vision to Chart the Future

In 2006, the Board of Directors updated its existing Strategic Plan. As this process included assessing the effectiveness of its current programs and services, determining the capabilities of the organization, laying out a vision of what our community would require in the foreseeable future and then determining how the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley could respond to those needs.

To continue to be the leading provider of services to children in Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and surrounding communities, the Strategic Plan calls for the organization to place a special emphasis on the following:

- The children and families we serve
- · Staff as our most valuable resource
- Academic support, character building, integrity and life-enhancing programs
- Diversity and acceptance
- Our volunteers
- Collaboration, partnerships, evaluation and fiscal responsibility
- Our financial contributors

### A New Club for Our Community!

Due to the acute need for affordable childcare in our community, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley has experienced tremendous growth over the past five years and the trend is expected to continue in the foreseeable future. The new Club will expand our service area to reach under-served groups in Huntington Beach, including children of Golden West College students and children in the Ocean View School District.



We are committed to more effectively and efficiently serving our deserving young people and their families by opening a new facility that will serve the northern part of Huntington Beach. After searching for many years for a suitable location for this new Club, the perfect site has been secured!

Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley has signed a 45-year renewable lease agreement with Coast Community College District to build a new state-of-the-art school age youth facility with gymnasium and a child development center in the center of Golden West College's campus. This is a unique and special partnership between the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley and Golden West College and is truly a win-win for both organizations and the community.

### Boys & Girls Clubs go to College

Through a partnership with the Coast Community College District, solidified by a 45-year renewable leased signed in 2006, the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley will be able to build its newest Club, enabling the organization to reach out to additional families from Huntington Beach. The new Club is expected to serve 2,500 previously un-served children annually.

The size and location of this new facility will significantly expand affordable before and afterschool programs for families of Golden West College students and the community at-large. It will provide the Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley with the reach it needs to make an even bigger impact in the community.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley estimates that the annual cost to operate the new facility could be as high as \$1.7 million. With an annual budget of more than \$5.5 million in 2007, our organization is very well equipped to manage the additional costs of the new facility through generated fees and additional fundraising. The breakdown of these estimated costs and the anticipated income for the first year of operation is below.





A few of the many special features of the development plan for the campus, which will include a new child development center and school age youth facility, are as follows:

- A state-of-the-art school age facility will offer low-cost before and after school care for children from the community. Included in this facility will be a kindergarten room, a teaching kitchen, fine arts center, games room, activity center, kids' café, teen room, education center with technology lab and library, administrative offices, storage areas and restrooms.
- A gymnasium with a separate entrance will adjoin the school-age playground and include a team room, storage and restrooms. Use of the gym will be shared by the Boys & Girls Club and Golden West College.
- A school-age play area including playground equipment and outdoor eating areas will be located between the school-age facility and the gymnasium.
- Eight state-of-the-art preschool classrooms, office space, resource center, and restrooms will comprise the new Child Development Center, housed in a separate building from the school-aged facility.
- A preschool playground will be located adjacent to the Child Development Center.


### A New Club to Meet Critical Needs!

Research shows that many kids growing up in low to moderate income environments reach adulthood unprepared to work, parent and contribute to society. Recent data published by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, such as the Kids Count Data Book, clearly indicates that after-school programs like those offered by our Clubs result in increased test scores, fewer behavior problems, decreased juvenile crime, increased self-esteem and decreased antisocial behavior. The newest Club on the Golden West College campus will improve the odds for children in our community by preparing preschoolers for success in school and filling school age youth's non-school hours with a structured environment full of opportunities for academic support and recreational activities.

The new Club will make a difference in the lives of thousands of families by providing programs that allow parents to work or attend school and break the welfare cycle. Many of the families we serve are considered the "working poor" of this community. 72% are low to moderate income families and 98% of parents work or attend school full-time. The location of the newest Club on the Golden West College campus will enable us to reach out to an even higher percentage of low-income families ... making the need for this facility even more acute.

The location of the new facility will allow the Club to reach out to schools in currently underserved areas of Huntington Beach, where only about 100 of the 1000 children bused to and from our two school age branches each day attend school. In these areas of the community, 21% of children are English language learners and 31% are economically disadvantaged, qualifying for free and reduced price lunches. These children will be targeted for membership in the new Club, ensuring that the kids who are most in need of positive programs can benefit from all that the Boys & Girls Club has to offer.

57% of parents in the neighborhoods this new Club will target are not college graduates. The Club and Golden West College believe that statistic can change in the next generation. Youth who spend every day on a college campus will begin to see a college education not as a distant and perhaps impossible dream, but as an attainable goal that the Club and the academic support it provides will help them achieve.





### The Building Dreams Campaign

The successful growth of Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley over the last 40 years is a tribute to the great volunteer and financial support of our community's residents and an active and dedicated Board of Directors. Due to excellent management, influential volunteers and a very clear mission, we have achieved fiscal success through fundraising and generated fees that produced more than \$5 million in revenue in 2006 to support the Club's programs and services.

Despite existing fundraising success, it is clear that a major fundraising campaign is required to achieve the estimated \$6 million necessary to construct the new Club facility. At 30,000 square feet, the project is a large undertaking...but at an estimated cost of \$200 per square foot for the construction of the facilities, the cost is reasonable, especially for the benefits realized! We are not merely raising money to build buildings. Rather, we are raising money to help children and their families achieve their dreams!

To accomplish this exciting and much needed project, Boys & Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley is spearheading an effort to raise \$6 million to design and build a state-of-the-art facility on the Golden West College campus to be completed in phases: a child development center scheduled to open in 2008 and a school age youth facility and gymnasium to be completed by 2010.


