## **SUMMER PROGRAM**

This Summer, we had the privilege of partnering with the Center for Inspired Teaching, another DC nonprofit organization that works with teachers to ensure that schools make the most of children's innate desire to learn.

Inspired Teaching teachers (all training to receive their Teaching License) and New Community for Children staff collaborated to serve 143 students, 50 more than any previous summer here at NCFC. Kindergarten through 12th grade students participated in theme-based academic learning. The 4th Graders built circuits to explore electricity while the 2nd Graders made nature sculptures to learn about how things grow. Students also participated in sports days and field trips to round out their summer learning experience.

The 6-week summer program ended with a much anticipated Carnival day. Bank of America graciously sponsored the event, allowing us to rent a 72 foot water slide for students (and adults alike!), a moon bounce, carnival games, and enough food to feed the 200 people who attended.

This past school year (2008-2009), New Community for Children served the most children in its 20 years! 285 students from the ages of 4 and 20 attended NCFC before and after school programs at four different sites in and around the Shaw neighborhood.

Students spent the year improving their math and language arts skills while unlocking their creative juices. Through arts projects, photography, group discussions, reflection journals, movement activities, games, experiments, and field trips, students saw that learning is not only valuable, but also extremely fun!

NCFC participants also had the privilege of taking classes in graffiti art, darkroom photography, step dance, and praise dance.

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
