# Educare Receives \$150,000 Grant from Arizona Community Foundation

### Partnership with ASU's College of Teacher Education and Leadership Takes Shape



Starting in the fall of 2011, Educare Arizona will be home to a cohort of 16 undergraduate ASU early childhood education students who will work in the Educare classrooms as teachers' aides and take their courses on site and online. Students selected for this program will commit two years at Educare Arizona to ensure continuity of care. This integrated partnership will be a model early childhood professional development effort that ensures each new class of ASU graduates can take the best practices learned at Educare Arizona into their own classrooms.











## The Value of Collaboration

The Educare model is built upon partnership and collaboration, and each site is an exercise in shared governance. Each partnership consists of an "anchor" philanthropist or philanthropists, a Head Start/Early Head Start provider, and a school district. Anchor funders for Educare Centers in other communities include the Buffett family in Omaha, George Kaiser in Tulsa, the United Way of Miami-Dade in Miami, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in Seattle. In Arizona, the anchor funders are the Whiteman Foundation, the Steve Nash Foundation, the Ibis Foundation of Arizona and the Buffett Early Childhood Fund. Each of these

visionary philanthropies recognizes the value of pooling their resources to make the greatest impact on our community. The center will be located on land donated by the Balsz School District. This close link between early learning and elementary education is a central

component of the Educare model, and a key to sustaining the gains made in the first five years. Head Start and Early Head Start services will be provided by Southwest Human Development, which has received national recognition for program quality.

Collaboration is also critical to the successful operation of the Integrative Health Center, which will offer both western and naturopathic medicine, dental health care, and behavioral health services. While Scottsdale Healthcare will manage operations, the Educare health center will provide a unique opportunity for health care providers who may not have had traditional partnerships to collaborate and bring to bear each of their specialties to serve a population which has traditionally not had this level of access to medical care.

Each of the Educare collaborators believes that they can accomplish more together than they could as individual entities, and that the whole is truly greater than the sum of its parts.
