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Partnering with Other Organizations

Australian Grant Awarded

In October, 2009 an application was made to the **Australian High Commission** in Bangladesh for funding for rural health fairs targeting women and children. Hope Foundation is pleased to announce that the application was successful and a grant of 12 Lakh Taka (\$18,000) was made last month. The grant is the second awarded to Hope Foundation by the Australian High Commission. The funds will be used to host health fairs in rural villages to encourage women and children to use the medical clin-

ics. Female doctors will visit these areas during the health fair and encourage women to use health services at the Hope Medical Centers.

This proposal for women's health fairs was made following findings that more men than women or children were using the services at the Hope Medical Centers in rural areas. This was a result of women being shy to see male doctors and also not being encouraged to seek healthcare for themselves and their children. Many women live village-centered lives and rarely visit public places such as markets and stores, even those close by. These proposed rural health fairs will help to show the village women the importance of seeking healthcare for themselves and their families by making active use of the resources available to them.

Global Nomads Contribute to Hope Foundation

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Medical Visits

Nova Southeastern University Visit



Nova Southeastern University (NSU) medical school will send medical team to Hope Foundation clinics in December 2010. This is following an important partnership agreement by Hope Foundation and NSU. Nova team will be composed of physicians and senior medical students and will be headed by Dr. Elaine Wallace, Associate Dean of Health division. In the future NSU will be sending their final year medical students to Bangladesh to learn about healthcare in developing countries and tropical medicine.

The students will assist the doctors at the Cox's Bazar Hospital for Women and Children and complete a clinical rotation. Nova will also give the Bangladeshi doctors and nurses at the hospital an opportunity to earn an online diploma in Global Medicine fully accredited by NSU. This is a great opportunity for Hope staff and others to receive an internationally accredited education, increasing employment prospects for local people and allowing first world medical education to be taught in a developing country. This will help improve standard of care for all the patients and will also improve the way the hospital is managed.

UK Medical Students Visit Bangladesh

In July 2010, an organization of British medical students called **Selfless** will be visiting Bangladesh to take part in a large health camp for the poor. This is their second trip to Hope Foundation hospital. Their visit in 2009 resulted in over 2000 people being treated and helped. A team of 15 students will assist visiting doctors and doctors from the hospital to get hands on experience. They are generously donating the expenses for the camps.

Cleft Lip Surgery Project

Every year 150,000 Bangladeshi children are born with cleft lip and palates, but surgery is very expensive and there are only few trained cleft surgeons in the country. Most of these unfortunate children live their lives in shame - unable to eat properly, talk go to school and taunted by many.

Dr. Shahid Aziz



Dr. Shahid Aziz is a Harvard and Columbia University graduate of both medicine and dentistry and is a maxillofacial surgeon at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey. Having Bangladeshi roots, Dr. Aziz has felt a need to give back to the unfortunate children in Bangladesh. A prominent cleft surgeon, Dr. Aziz decided to make an annual trip to Bangladesh to perform cleft surgery on poor children. This is his first trip to Hope Foundation hospital, with plans to make this an annual event. A Cleft Center is being proposed in the Cox's Bazar District since there are no other facilities for many miles to receive cleft surgery.
