pala, Uganda to Amsterdam, reporting from the Republican caucus in Iowa, the primary in Michigan, and a videoconference by Burmese leader Aung San Suu Kyi's with students in France. YJI reporters delivered from a London philosophy marathon, Pakistani markets and even a movie premiere inside Buckingham Palace. They've weighed in on films, music and plays, beauty pageants for breast cancer, the thrill of paragliding over Norway, Queen Elizabeth's Jubilee and the Olympics.

YJI teamed up with the Environmental Learning Centers of Connecticut for <u>a story detailing how youth around the</u> <u>world celebrate Earth Day</u>. That collaboration involved 22 young journalists in 11 countries and several U.S. states.

<u>A 24-hour reading of *Uncle Tom's Cabin*</u> at Hartford's Harriet Beecher Stowe Center included YJI alumni, students and leaders, who also covered the event.
