Philosophy

ORPHANED CHILDREN

It is estimated that every 14 seconds a child is orphaned in sub-Saharan Africa. In poor countries such as Kenya, very few social services exist to care for these children. Many end up living on the streets, or are squeezed into overcrowded orphanages in the city slums. These facilities are often decrepit buildings that lack basic amenities such as running water, toilets, and electricity. The children living there do not have enough to eat and communicable diseases are rife. Despite these adversities, the children are desperate for an education and eager to learn. Although public elementary education in Kenya is free, most schools are understaffed and overcrowded. With up to 130 students per classroom and few resources, it is not surprising that less than 50 percent of students go on to high school, and less than three percent attend college. Many current approaches to the orphan crisis, reactive in nature, are inherently limited and do little to break the cycle of poverty. Given a fair chance, these children will fight their way out of this misery. At Flying Kites, we believe this chance begins with remarkable care.

REMARKABLE CARE

The Flying Kites vision of providing remarkable care demands that we get the basics right. Our site in the Aberdares Mountains provides clean water, fresh air, fertile farmland, nutritious food, and abundant space where the children can learn, grow, and play. The Flying Kites Leadership Academy (FKLA) will be made up of 10 individual houses that accommodate 15 children and two housemothers. This creates a loving and nurturing environment, and gives the children a place to call home. Happy, healthy children are ready to learn. At our on-site school and teaching staff provide these children with the education they need to transform their lives.

TREMENDOUS OUTCOMES

We start from the premise that every child can succeed. We aim to create an environment of expectation where such success is the norm, and not the exception. Our children will be equipped to lead diverse lives as citizens of their country and members of a global society.

We will prepare the children in our care to achieve their highest potential, be tolerant and understanding, respect themselves as well as others, and be responsible custodians of the environment. Through our emphasis on compassion, advocacy, and leadership, we hope our children will champion causes of social justice. In our experience, adults who have endured the deprivations of orphanhood often have a desire to ensure that future generations do not have to face the same hardships. Our goal is to foster this desire in our students by fusing the drive to help those in need with the tools necessary to make their voices and actions count. Flying Kites graduates will be positioned to have an impact on the world greatly beyond their numbers.

2010 Events and Highlights

International Day of the African Child

On Saturday, June 12, 2010, Flying Kites, along with Kenyan gospel sensation Jimmie Gait, hosted our second annual celebration of the International Day of the African Child in Njabini, Kinangop District, Kenya. An estimated 5,000 children, teachers, and community leaders paraded through Njabini's center to the site of the Feinstein Junior Scholars' Academy, the new primary school funded by a grant from the Feinstein Foundation. The program also featured opening acts Mcoasto Lucid Stanley, Father Mbuyu, and the Children's Garden National Champion Girls Choir. Special guest M.C. Wairimu Wamaruki from Coro-FM introduced a number of community leaders, including 2012 presidential candidate and Member of Parliament Martha Karua, former Minister of the Environment and Member of Parliament Jane Kihara, the Njabini Councillor, the Njabini Chief, and the Njabini District Commissioner, who spoke on issues of health, education, and human rights.

Into Africa

On April 20, 2010, Committee Chairs Marie Elena Martinez and Ntiedo Etuk organized Into Africa, a cocktail party and silent auction at STK, a popular steakhouse located in the heart of NYC's Meatpacking District. The evening raised over 26,000 USD.

The Carly Pie Liptak Clinic

Ground was officially broken for the Carly 'Pie' Liptak Clinic in November 2010. The trenches for the building were dug, the foundation blocks laid and the first concrete poured. The Flying Kites children and staff and the entire Njabini community are excited to see the clinic underway. This clinic will allow Flying Kites, working with its Kenyan counterparts, to add to the range of health services currently available in the area. It will cement the partnership between our organization and our Njabini hosts.

Launching First Conference

Nearly 300 make-shift children's homes provide support to thousands of orphaned and vulnerable children in Nairobi. Many orphanage Directors find themselves isolated as they strive to provide basic amenities to the children in their care and acquire stable funding and, as such, the day-to-day demands of each orphanage take priority over long-term organizational planning. Additionally, there is a lack of shared knowledge among directors concerning principles in childcare, fundraising challenges and donor relations.

While the Homes offer love and support to children in their care, the ability to significantly alter the course of these children's lives is limited due to a lack of resources and funding. The Flying Kites Oasis Program strives to unite and support these orphanages. The program has established new forums for communication among orphanage Directors and increases each Home's access to local and international resources.

By working with local leaders in the non-profit industry, each home is given the tools necessary to strengthen its domestic and international presence to increase its ability to raise money and attract volunteers. The Oasis Program provides participating orphanages with a network of support and an unprecedented collective voice.

The Oasis team launched the program on July 9th, 2010 with a meeting held at our Njabini site.

Adventure Challenges

Africa's Highest Peak

In June 2010 we ran our first Adventure Challenge to the summit of Mt. Kilimanjaro. The trip began in Njabini, Kenya at the Flying Kites Leadership Academy. Our challengers, many of whom far exceeded the \$5,000 fundraising target, spent several days at the Academy prior to traveling to Tanzania.

After spending time with our team in Kenya, the climbers were even more motivated to make it to the top of Kilimanjaro in honor of the children who had won their hearts in only a few short days.

The climb itself was demanding; each day presented a new challenge. The final day was a grueling hike, ascending and descending a total of 13,283 feet in less than 24 hours. Newport-based photographer Sandy Nesbitt kindly donated his time and talent to document our first Adventure Challenge.
