

Furthermore, our pledge for a self-sustaining community includes providing opportunities through vocational training, the distribution of rice to poor families, the sharing of clean water, and the offering of loans to promote small businesses.

Our Achievements in 2011

- A new four-story school building was built in the Stung Mean Chey area
- A new library was built in the Stung Mean Chey School
- Now serving free lunch to more than 400 students at our Stung Mean Chey School
- 117 students successfully completed our IT Training Program
- 13 students successfully completed our Hair Salon Training Program
- 10 students successfully completed our Dress Making Program
- 77 newly registered students began their studies at PIO
- Five new orphans were registered at the PIO Shelter
- 11 students graduated grade 6 and are now studying in Chea Sim Samaky High School
- 125 kg of rice were distributed into the community
- 13 single mothers were trained in housekeeping and successfully found jobs

Our Outreach Schools

PIO School Overview

PIO offers children access to free education and supplies students with uniforms, knapsacks, books, bicycles and motor transportation to those far from the school. Our schools follow the national institute curriculum for grades kindergarten to grade 6, and we have a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sport. This allows PIO to provide students national level education and a child that graduates from a PIO school will be able to continue studying at any government school. In addition, PIO sponsors students from grade 7 to grade 12 to study at state run schools as PIO has not yet established resources to provide higher education beyond grade 6. We also support and sponsor students to study at state run schools from grade 6 to grade 12.

Stung Meanchey School

In 2004, PIO built an outreach centre in close proximity of the local garbage site in order to aid child garbage pickers. Soon enough, children were reaching for schools bags instead of garbage bags and PIO had to borrow government land in order to accommodate more students. However, in 2008 the government land was soon sold to a private company and PIO needed to find a new area to provide to students. In 2011, with the help of donors and the determination of Noun Phymean, PIO was able to construct a four-story school centre to replace our smaller school building in the Stung Mean Chey area. The school was built in eight months and now contains a library, computer lab, 10 classrooms, kitchen, dining hall, and one meeting room shared with our health office. Students begin Khmer-taught classes at 7am, break for lunch at 11am, and return to learn English at 1pm, finishing at 4pm. The school currently provides education to 415 students (203 girls and 212 boys) and employs nine full-time teachers, one librarian, one nurse, one social worker, two custodians, two guards, and one cook.

Borey Santipheap II School

In 2007, due to land issues, families in the Borey Keila slums were forcibly displaced and relocated to an area 20 km away from Phnom Penh City. This relocated area lacked any infrastructure and there was no school for many miles. Mrs. Noun Phymean was then asked by the community chief in the relocated area to help purchase a building for a school to support the children. She immediately agreed and established the Borey Santipheap II School the same year. Currently the school supports 208 students (103 females and 105 females).

Borey Keila School

The Borey Keila School opened in 2005 and began to provide sustenance to one of the most impoverished communities in Phnom Penh City. Before the school, many children worked as shoe-shiners, selling newspapers, picking garbage, and as beggars. Now they are part of the 381 students (166 girls and 215 boys) attending classes regularly. Currently the school supports 208 students (103 females and 105 females).

PIO School Support Programs

PIO provides children essential support programs in order to foster social growth and physical wellbeing. Many of these programs have been instrumental in transitioning children from destitute environments to nurturing environments.

Hygiene and Sanitation

The children of PIO are educated on the importance of maintaining proper hygiene. Students are encouraged to value cleanliness by brushing their teeth, showering, and getting their clothes washed two times a week. They are also provided with toiletry items such as tooth brushes, tooth paste, and soap. Students also follow sanitary rules during meal times and wash their hands before and after eating.

Recreational Programs

As a directive to promote social development, PIO routinely offers children the opportunity to engage in extracurricular activities and join exciting field trips. In 2011, children made multiple visits to Olympic Stadium for sports and recreation. They also travelled outside the city and made trips to Sihanoukville to enjoy the beaches.

Educational Sponsor Programs

With education one of PIO's highest priorities, we have established a sponsor program for students who have graduated Grade 6 from a PIO school. Because teachers charge daily fees to students who wish to learn and graduate—with the help of our donors—we financially support students from Grade 7 to Grade 12.

Nutrition Program

PIO firmly believes in providing a healthy diet, with the aim of improving students' learning abilities and sustaining their attention span. At both our Stung Mean Chey School and Borey Keila School, we provide free lunch to all students. Though at our Santipheap II School, we can currently only provide snacks during lunch hour.

Basic Healthcare

At our Stung Mean Chey School, we employ one full-time nurse who provides medical care to all students. Each student has a medical checkup twice a month and those who require immediate attention are transferred to private clinics or the Russian Hospital.

KIDS (Kids International Dental Services) made their fourth trip for 2011 and provided dental services to more than PIO 347 students.











■ PIO Community Support Programs

PIO is devoted in supporting the welfare of the Cambodian community in Phnom Penh. We have established communal development programs to fulfill the socioeconomic needs among community members.









Rice & Clean Water Distribution

At our SMC School Centre, for every family that has their child learning at the school, we provide 50L of clean water per day. We provide incentives for parents to keep their child in school instead of forcing them to work in dangerous conditions. We also provide 5kg of rice monthly to any family that demonstrates financial need.

Child Sponsorship Program

With the generous support of sponsors, many vulnerable children are now able to live a better life. With a recommended 50 dollars per month, the child will receive proper medical care and his/her family will be able to buy enough food, water, and clothing and pay for housing expenses. This in turn will alleviate the pressure on families and especially children, who can instead focus entirely on their schooling instead of working.

Community Credit Program

In an effort to raise the standard of living for families, PIO endorses loans for community members who would like to start their own small businesses. PIO believes in providing the opportunity for individuals to express their talents and use them to better themselves through entrepreneurship.

Orphanage

Many children were found to be abandoned by parents and working on dump sites or begging on the streets for money. In response, PIO opened their first orphanage in 2009 within the Stung Mean Chey community. Our orphanage now cares for over 60 orphans. We provide them with food, water, shelter, recreational activities, social support, and an education.

Vocational Training

PIO advocates women empowerment and independence through our vocational training. Our programs such as dressmaking, beauty salon training, and jewelry making are offered free of charge. Successful trainees have gone on to find jobs all over the city and some have even opened their own businesses.




