TRAVEL INFORMATION:

Nathan DeHart, our team photographer, left on September 17, 2013 - two days ahead of the team and arrived in Nepal on the 19th. Nathan partnered with WHH as a photographer from Silent Images, a NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) that serves other NGOs to help tell their story by providing professional photos at no cost. He actually arrived in Nepal ahead of the WHH team to serve another NGO called WomenLEAD, and stayed behind in Nepal a couple of weeks longer to serve Agape International Ministries and SIL (linguistic and translation NGO).

Margaret Jennifer Burns and Lonn Marie Hlusko flew from Denver to San Francisco to join the majority of the medical team members, Dr. Paula Dhanda, Dr. Nancy Jane Reynolds, Flora Shepherd Krasnovsky, Linda Arnold and Nathan Powers - who were congregated in and departed from San Francisco on September 19, 2013.

Dr. Rafal Jan Wyskowski left home from Ambler, Pennsylvania, and joined the team in Kathmandu on the 21st.

The team then flew along the Himalayan ridge to Bhadrapur and continued north by jeep on a 3 hour drive over bumpy and often unpaved roads toward the hills of Ilam, climbing to where the tea gardens of Ilam begin, then dropping northwest around hairpin curves down to the Mai River and uphill once again to reach Dr. Megh Bahadur Community Hospital in the small town of Ilam.








The Dr. Megh Bahadur Community Hospital, Ilam, Nepal

Established in 2004 by Himalayan HealthCare, a not for profit organization, has expanded and improved its services since its inception, from outpatient to inpatient service to surgery and delivery, allowing more women, especially mothers, to receive maternal health care services for the first time in their lives.

ACCOMMODATIONS for VOLUNTEERS and MIDWIVES:






MEDICAL SUPPLIES and EQUIPMENT FOR THE MISSION:

WHH volunteers carried about 600 pounds of donated medical supplies which included stethoscopes, blood pressure cuffs, neonatal ambu bags, Helping Babies Breathe (books), instrument sets for suturing and sutures, umbilical tapes, Clean Birth Kits (multiple), Kiwi vacuums (for operative delivery), gestation wheels, OB tape measures, nail brushes and clippers, soap and soap dishes, hand towels, a notebook and pen and a waterproof tote bag. Then too, the team members divied up baby clothes, over 100 hand-knit hats,16 hand-made baby quilts, many baby blankets donated by members of our local community - and a t-shirt with the WHH logo.

- 4. a LigaSure donated by Sutter Novato Community Hospital (thanks to Margaret Walker); and,
- 5. stirrups donated by St. Helena Hospital Napa Valley (thanks to Dr. Bryan Henry).



BACKGROUND and OBJECTIVES OF THIS MISSION:

WHH partnered with Himalayan Healthcare (HHC) to provide maternal and gynecological care for women at the Ilam Dr. Megh Bahadur Parajuli Community Hospital located in the remote area of the Himalayas in eastern Nepal; serving a region of 300,000 people. HHC is a 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is "to create sustainable development programs in the remote areas of Nepal that will improve the quality of life for its people. Himalayan Healthcare achieves its mission by providing primary healthcare, community education, and income generation programs that enable people to be self-supporting in the long-term."

WHH MAIN GOALS:

- Provide surgical care and gynecologic services;
- train midwives:
- 3. mentor local Nepali physicians and staff.

WHH ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

- WHH made 960 patient visits outpatient as well as emergency visits;
- performed 625 ultrasound examinations:
- successfully performed 25 gynecological surgeries;
- 4. delivered 4 babies, including 1 emergency operative vaginal delivery:
- 5. introduced an innovative new surgical instrument, the LigaSure:
- 6. introduced a cervical cancer clinical practice prevention program;
- trained midwives: we prepared in advance to train10 midwives and thus carried equipment for that number. However,18 midwives from the eastern region of Nepal traveled to Ilam for training (see separate midwife report). Many of these midwives traveled for 4-5 days, some of them either carrying their own young infants with them or leaving them behind just for the opportunity to attend the training, so we welcomed all eighteen;
- 8. equipped the 10 midwives as promised with basic supplies to carry on after our departure;
- improved the skills of the Nepali OR staff; and,
- 10. mentored 2 Nepali ob/gyn physicians (to perform gynecological surgery),1 Nepali anesthetist, 1 Nepali intern and 1 intern from the UK.
