Why It's Working

Many of the young people we work with have been excluded or absent from education for many years and often came from unstable families. Some struggle with addiction, have low literacy and numeracy skills, a lack of confidence and low self-esteem. The non-formal environment our YAFs provide has been created to suit the needs of these kinds of young people far better than a mainstream school setting. So after what can be a challenging settling-in period attendance of the students improves significantly along with marked positive behaviour changes.

The evidence we have gathered indicates that the majority of young people attending our YAFs are taking important steps back into education. The Foundations have successfully helped many to achieve awards and gualifications, and provided them with further positive exit routes.



When we compare local data on transitions of students out of the NEET category, YAFs are successful in helping to engage and retain students in education. For non-YAF students the most popular destinations out of NEET are employment (45 per cent) in December 2010) and government supported training (34 per cent). For YAF students most known destinations are into further education (85.2 per cent), with relatively few students moving directly on to employment (13.1 per cent).

The YAF Experience

John was referred to a Youth Achievement Foundation by his Local Authority. Aged 15 he had been permanently excluded from two mainstream schools and was also a young offender dealing with a myriad of issues beyond his education.

Even so once he became engaged with our non-formal curriculum he quickly gained confidence. Through a variety of activities and challenges such as mountain-biking, cooking and video production he started to really enjoy learning.

With this growing sense of self-belief he felt more comfortable attempting to gain formal qualifications. This in-turn enabled him to access mainstream college and go on to pursue a career in plastering.

John has gone on to volunteer as a mentor of other young people, helping them deal with the same challenges he once faced.

"Here you get asked, not told to do something. You get shown respect, so you show respect back."

"It's a lot better than any other place I've been to They're more tolerant, they seem to understand.

Exclusion: It's expensive and it isn't working

England remains the biggest excluder of young people in Europe. The most recent figures show there were more than 330,000 fixed-term and 5,740 permanent exclusions.

Crime

A survey of 15-18 year-olds held in custody found that 90% of young men and 75% of young women had been excluded from school.

The Riots

On average young people involved in the August 2011 riots missed almost 1 day of school per week. 36% of them had at least one fixed-term exclusion.

The Cost

The average cost of intervention after a young person has entered the criminal justice system is £79,000 p.a.

Excluding young people is extremely costly & there is no need for it. UK Youth has established a proven alternative.



In 2008 UK Youth set up its' first Youth Achievement Foundation (YAF). This independent centre was run in partnership with an expert local education provider. It offered an engaging vocational and activity-based curriculum of personal development, alongside literacy, numeracy and other core subjects.

It proved so successful that we have since gone on to build a national network of YAFs from Hampshire in the south to Middlesbrough in the north. Our YAFs have become a robust and effective way to engage marginalised young people at the fringes of mainstream education.



Young people often arrive with a zerooutcome rating. This too is resolved - 100% of YAF students gain accredited outcomes, frequently achieving equivalence of a GSCE C grade.

Accredited Outcomes

An Affordable Option

Secondary schools often have significant budgets and need appropriate options when commissioning alternative places for pupils at risk of exclusion. Forming school partnerships can increase budget flexibility and allow the varied needs of students to be met. Some can be educated annually for £4,000, others at between £8,000-£15,000, while a few individuals with therapeutic needs can cost over £20,000. A YAF is able to meet the needs of all these challenging students at two thirds of what a Pupil Referral Unit will charge and deliver excellent educational outcomes.

The advantages are considerable for vulnerable young people and YAFs are an effective way of keeping them engaged with education up to and beyond school leaving age. For a small short-term investment there are significant long-term savings to be made.
