



Statement of the CEO

What a long, strange year it was! As the severity of COVID-19 revealed itself in early 2020, the HRI professional team and Board quickly realized that accurate information about the virus, albeit still scarce but growing daily, was not reaching vast numbers of people in lesser developed nations and was certainly not reaching the vulnerable children and families HRI works with daily. The world was facing a huge crisis and the folks that relied on HRI had little information, and much of that was inaccurate. In response, HRI launched a series of outreach projects through which we provided accurate information to tens of thousands of people in Haiti and Guatemala daily - what was this virus, how was it spread and most importantly how could they protect themselves and their children from falling ill. Saving lives was uppermost on our minds for much of 2020.

We also faced a huge increase in food insecurity as a result of COVID-19 in 2020. Many subsistence farmers in Guatemala could not get the seeds, fertilizer and pesticides they needed for their crops - the same crops that they would rely on to feed their families through 2021! Poor urban dwellers relying on the informal economies of their countries, i.e. vendors in open markets, were unable to leave their homes due to stay-at-home orders. When they could venture out, their daily sales plummeted to unsurvivable incomes. Thanks to our donors, partners and churches, HRI was there to assist! People are alive today, children are healthy and well nourished today because HRI stepped up to the unprecedented challenges of 2020.


HRI is grateful for the children's lives we saved together in 2020 - saved from hunger, saved from abandonment and trafficking, saved from the fear of sickness!

HRI was there for thousands of children, moms, dads and grandparents. We worked tirelessly to educate, feed, and keep healthy and safe so many who would otherwise have been forgotten in the chaos!

TOTAL PEOPLE SERVED

Thanks to our wonderful partners in 2020, together we served more than 7,210 people through HRI's ongoing programs and an additional 500,401 people through COVID-19 education, prevention, and relief programs!

This includes distribution of 683,956 meals to more than 4,000 people, 331 trainings, and 125 hand washing stations that enabled more than 372,000 people living in high-risk slum communities to wash their hands with soap and water regularly to prevent infection from COVID-19.



According to the World Bank, COVID-19 is estimated to have dramatically increased the number of people facing acute food insecurity in 2020-2021. This increase is reflected in HRI's statistics.

HRI meal programs, combined with medical support, access to clean water and education, psychosocial support, and trainings on nutrition, sanitation and hygiene ensure people no longer suffer from the various effects of hunger and preventable illness and that they receive all they need to learn, grow and thrive.

COVID-19 RESPONSE

More than 500,000 people benefitted from HRI's COVID-19 education, prevention, and relief programs in 2020. HRI was identified as a lead agency responding to the crisis. Families had nutritious food, psychosocial support, information and more to stay safe and healthy.

TRIFECTA

HRIs Trifecta Approach includes providing one water filter, one traditional latrine and one safe cookstove for one family. Our holistic approach of providing all three to each family will decrease waterborne illness, respiratory illness (also one of the top five killers of children under the age of 5 worldwide), and improve overall health and safety.

WEDSON



2020 was a year of fear, death and mystery. We didn't know what was going to happen or how to navigate in the United States or elsewhere. When other agencies stepped back or completely out of the countries where we work, HRI stepped up.

Thanks to our generous partners,
HRI went above and beyond in 2020
by implementing life-saving
programs to bring a dozen new
COVID-19 education, prevention, and
relief programs which collectively
saved lives and transformed the
futures of thousands of people – and
all while maintaining our regular
programs.

Our team made COVID Care Calls, provided mental health referrals, and became the lead agency in the OCHA working group on mental health in Guatemala during the pandemic.

We reached more than 21,000 people every month with COVID-19 prevention and education messages and trained more than 100 Good Health Ambassadors.

Our emergency food assistance programs targeted the most vulnerable, including elderly, disabled, and single mothers with young children.

We assisted 86 farming families in rural Guatemala with the seeds, fertilizer and pesticides needed to ensure they were able to plant their crop to sustain them through 2021.

We built more than 125 hand washing stations and distributed them in orphanages and slums.

We trained women to establish cottage businesses and together produced 2,000 high-quality masks, cleaning supplies and disinfectants which the women sold in response to increased demand and to generate income.

Even with all of the challenges COVID-19 brought us, HRI continued and expanded our regular programming as lives depended on us. Much of our work focused on Child Protection. Our Children First program which prevents child trafficking and abandonment doubled in size thanks to a new partnership. Our team of social workers addressed violence in the household as families were quarantined. Teens in our Youth Engagement programs assumed lead roles in their communities under our leadership to bring relief to those most impacted by the economic crisis. Our Guatemalan youth developed a Violence Prevention Proposal which is now used as the basis for activities by the Children Adolescents & Youth Municipal Commission and the Violence Prevention Commission.



Even with COVID-19, HRI continued to implement institutional capacity building to ensure children in orphanages received the highest standard of care. Our nutrition programs continued in Haitian orphanages; however, in Guatemala, we transitioned from school feeding programs to home-based nutritional support. HRI targeted extremely poor families in need; this enabled us to work more closely with families to identify specific needs. We worked closely with single mothers to build their capacity to protect, provide and care for their children. We completed 15 trifecta projects for a total of 15 latrines, 23 water filters and 17 safe cookstoves which immediately improved the health of the beneficiaries.



"Before Naila was enrolled in school through the HRI program, the atmosphere in our home was chaotic. Naila was struggling with poor behavior, she was acting out, being disruptive and sometimes even shouting to draw attention to herself. I did not know what to do, and often became angry. I was making a tough situation worse and the angrier I became, the more she acted out.

After attending the HRI-sponsored parenting workshops, I felt able to address the chaos in our household from a position of knowledge and understanding instead of anger. The workshops helped me to reassess my own core values, which I also understood are reflected in my children's behavior and the values they are adopting as they grow. I wanted to teach my children better values!"

MEET THE JIMENEZ FAMILY FROM RURAL GUATEMALA

The Jimenez family lives in a remote, rural village of Guatemala. The family of 8 lives in a one room home constructed of wood, sheet metal and a dirt floor. When we met the family, they were drinking water from the river, they had no sanitary facilities, and their meals were cooked indoors on an open fire. This extremely dangerous practice resulted in the youngest child suffering severe burns.

The family's health was poor - everyone regularly suffered from diarrhea as a result of drinking contaminated water and the lack of even a simple latrine, the youngest children were suffering from malnutrition and dehydration, and respiratory illnesses were a regular occurrence due to constant exposure to smoke inside the small home.

The family income averages \$2.00 per day, not nearly enough to feed, clothe, educate nor access healthcare for the children and adults.



HOW HRI'S TRIFECTA HELPED THE JIMENEZ FAMILY

Thanks to HRI's Trifecta program designed to educate communities about the importance of these three basic resources required for good health AND to provide direct relief through the provision of a water filter, clean cookstove and latrine to families like the Jimenez's, lives were saved and health improved dramatically for this family.


After just 3 months, the family reported no cases of diarrhea, no respiratory illness and improved weight and growth of all of the children. This progress continues 7 months later!

With results this dramatic, community members and neighbors took note and independent of HRI multiple families moved ahead and sought their own access to all of these resources - a true demonstration of behavior change on the community level.
