2005 – Dedication of Nyumbani Village.

2006 – Nyumbani Village opens with two grandparents and 19 children.

2007 – Nyumbani Village begins sustainable organic farming

2008 – 83,550 melia tree seedlings planted on 50 acres at Nyumbani Village as part of 500 acres from the Trees for Children program. Opening of Hotcourses Primary School.

2010 - Opening of Lawson High School.

2011 – All Form 4 Lawson High School students receive passing results on their final examinations, with 1/3 receiving university admission grades.

Nyumbani, "home" in Swahili, was founded in 1992 by the late Fr. Angelo D'Agostino, S.J., M.D., a physician, psychiatrist and Jesuit priest.



Sister Mary Owens, IBVM, Nyumbani's Executive Director who shared Fr. D'Agostino's dream from the beginning, provides continuing leadership and inspiration for all the Nyumbani programs.

Nyumbani Village is located in an arid area near Kitui, three hours from Nairobi. It is now home to more than 725 orphans and 70 grand-parents.

A Sustainable Model for Kenya's Present and Future



Nyumbani addresses the challenges caused by the unprecedented decimation of an entire generation of Kenyans.

The Village will ultimately house 1,000 orphans and 100 elderly grandparents. It presently has primary and secondary schools, a medical clinic, community center, polytechnic school, worship hall, administration building, resource center, guest house and a police station.

The Village is designed to be both self sufficient and bio-friendly using Western technology while maintaining Kenyan culture.

An extensive sustainability program has been developed at the Village including organic permaculture, agro-forestry, bio-fuel production, carbon farming and livestock husbandry. Five hundred acres of melia trees are planned to make the Village fully selfsufficient by 2018.

Each home is allocated a half-acre of land and access to water in order to encourage selfreliance. The Village is nearly self-sufficient now for fresh vegetables.



Numbani Village Gives Surviving Victims of HIV/AIDS a Fighting Chance

Nyumbani Village is a complex, pioneering settlement incorporating local cultural values in its operation and implementing steps to empower villagers and local people in surrounding communities to embrace self reliance, and create a more secure future.

Nyumbani Village is the prototype for additional villages in Kenya. As a solution to the problems caused by the loss of a generation due to AIDS, Nyumbani Village is a successful solution to retain culture, build stability and offer millions of Africans hope for their future.
