DDing Dong is dedicated to working to guarantee the physical and mental well-being of LGBTQ youth so that they can live full lives with autonomy and self-esteem about their gender and sexual identities.

DDing Dong's goal is to become a comprehensive institution where LGBTQ youth can comfortably rest, hang out, eat, sleep, shower, study, learn about human rights, and receive support to live independently.

DDing Dong's second takeoff! We will work hard to build a Home PRIDE HOME shelter that can operate 24 hours a day. DDing Dong's current space is sponsored by Alice Go Home.

We have had an unpredictable year because of COVID-19. Much of the work we had planned for 2020 was disrupted, and all projects such as counseling support, programs, and fundraising activities were affected. Not only that, because of the difficulties meeting LGBTQ youth in person due to social distancing, we had no other option but to reach out to them through phone and text message.

However, in 2020 DDing Dong also provided the largest number of consultations and crisis support to LGBTQ youth since our organization's founding in 2014. We received more than 2,400 basic inquiries alone. Crisis support services including emergency living expenses support, self-reliance support and partnerships, and support for basic living items were also further expanded. At a time when we were unable to meet in person, we wondered and worried about why the number of LGBTQ youth asking for help continued to increase. While the impact of COVID-19 certainly played a large role, we also believe that the growth in support cases shows the growing trust that LGBTQ youth have in DDing Dong.

Our tears also flowed freely as we became aware of much tragic news, and we looked back on what we it was that we missed before the deaths of a number of transgender people. As an organization that unwaveringly supports LGBTQ youth against hate and discrimination, we know intimately the hatred that many LGBTQ people face. Our hearts break, and we vow to work even harder to protect LGBTQ youth as the faces of LGBTQ youth who live unstable lives without respect at home and school are always at the forefront of our minds .

In 2021, we were again standing at the starting line. We started the year responding to crisis signals from LGBTQ youth. Although the sadness continues to well up within us, we are trying to take a step forward with strength by reflecting on the present so that the promises and commitments we have shared with our supporters are not overshadowed. We will endure hatred and discrimination together with LGBTQ youth, and together become stronger.

We promise you this. In 2021, we will continuously search for and expand the resources that LGBTQ youth need. We will not be proud, we will not stop learning, and we vow to act. We will work towards making the mid-to-long-term housing support project "Home PRIDE HOME" a reality. We will listen more to the lives of transgender, genderqueer, and non-binary youths, and develop specific programs to support their growth. We will work to communicate accurate, accessible, and non-judgemental information about HIV/AIDS LGBTQ youth. We will educate youth institution workers to change their views and practices, and we will create and disseminate materials for non-LGBTQ youth that increase their sensitivity to human rights.

We have been able to make it this far thanks to the backing and help from our supporters. During the last seven years, we have tried many different activities and have not been afraid to fail. No matter what problems face us in 2021, we believe in the supporters who are standing beside us with LGBTQ youth. Together, we will move forward confidently, and we will become a stronger DDing Dong.



DDing Dong's **Numbers in 2020**

We organized a program for five transgender and genderqueer youth about how to live independently.

We distributed Rainbow Kits to 85 runaway youth. Rainbow Kits include food and basic living supplies.



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
We provided emergency funding to seven runaway youth who had been laid off or put on involuntary leave from work due to COVID-19.

We interviewed ten LGBTQ youth in-depth about their thoughts about and experiences of running away from home.



487

DDing Dong conducted 487 counseling sessions, the most since we have opened. Of these cases, 349 (72%) were with youth under the age of 19.



We created the HIV/AIDS education material 'Challenge! HIV-ster!' and conducted correlating educational workshops for 12 youth-related organizations.



We provided crisis support for 288 cases including housing, medical, legal, therapy, and living support-the highest number of cases we have supported


We conducted a Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) program with four LGBTQ youth who are at risk of suicide and self-harm.

A Close-up Look at DDing Dong's Activism HOT-LINE Counseling and Crisis Support From crisis to pride!

In 2020, non-face-to-face consultations through phone calls and video calls (Zoom) were greatly expanded as the center's in-person programs were reduced to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Through social media promotion and counseling, DDing Dong connected with LGBTQ youth who were feeling isolated due to social distancing measures. A total of 487 consultations were conducted, including meeting with 75 new youth for the first time.


Counseling through DDing Dong's KakaoTalk channel

% Consultation requests and application, checking in with youth, sharing information, etc.




Counseling cases Unit: cases



Meanwhile, the impact of the spread of COVID-19 on LGBTQ youth was assessed through counseling. Because of social distancing and concerns about privacy violations by family members, LGBTQ youth had difficulty interacting with and talking freely with other LGBTQ friends and youth. It was also difficult for runaway youths to enter shelters, and youth who already lived in shelter facilities were greatly restricted from going out. Although the difficulties transgender teenagers face in school decreased as in-person classes were replaced by online classes, they were the targets of hate speech through texting and chat messenger services. Many LGBTQ youth living independently were laid off or placed on unpaid leave, and struggled to raise living expenses.

In 2020, more than half of the total counseling sessions we conducted were with transgender youth (272 cases; 55.8% of total cases). This is an increase of about 100 cases from the previous year. Topics discussed included dysphoria, transition, family conflicts, difficulties at school, and concerns about mandatory military enlistment and employment.

Main counseling topics in 2020

* We provide counseling for various other reasons including issues related to being LGBTQ, relationships, employment, poverty, dropping out of school, mandatory military service, illness and disease, gender marker corrections, hate speech, bullying, violation of labor rights, etc.



7 Crisis Services Provided by DDing Dong



DDing Dong space

Youth can shower, use the washing machine, rest in the lounge area, and have a snack or meal.

Household goods support

We provide items for dignity in everyday life including underwear, socks, condoms, menstrual items, and toiletries.



Introductions for shelter and housing support

We connect youth with shelters and/or help them find housing, as well as provide some support for rent. Although we are unfortunately only open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., we hope to operate a 24-hour shelter in the future called Home PRIDE HOME.



Medical counseling and support

We provide counseling for health concerns including everything from mild colds to comprehensive screenings, obstetrics, gynecology, sexually transmitted infections, and HIV/AIDS tests. If necessary, we use the medical support network established by DDing Dong to connect youth to medical care and services. Youth can also receive emergency medication for pain, upset stomach, etc. for free at DDing Dong.



Legal consultation and support

We provide legal consultations and information about human rights violations for youth. DDing Dong has employed a staff attorney since 2017 who is able to provide consultations for youth.



Continuing psychological counseling

We connect youth with professional psychological counseling services for help with various psychological difficulties including family problems, trauma, and suicide.



Emergency living expenses support

DDing Dong does not generally provide direct cash support, but in the absence of other available help from the youth's family or government social services, DDing Dong provides a minimal amount of basic living and transportation expenses for youth in crisis.

HOT-LINE Counseling and Crisis Support


We focused in particular on working closely with LGBTQ youth who had left their families and were living independently. We accompanied youth who had left their families to local housing welfare centers, and connected them with what support was available to help them live independently. We also focused on providing physical and mental health support for them throughout and beyond this process.

We also distributed more Rainbow Kits to youth who have left their homes, increasing the frequency from once a quarter to once a month. Through this, we were able to check in more regularly with youth who do not receive regular counseling with us as well. In addition to Rainbow Kits, we also provided youth with other emergency grocery and living items support (144 cases).

In 2020, the number of crisis support cases increased significantly compared to the previous year, and the scope of support and connection also expanded.



Strengthening DDing Dong's Counseling Capabilities

Consultation activities were checked through regular consultation case meetings (1-2 times a month), and individual and group expert supervision. We made efforts to provide better counseling by creating a KakaoTalk response manual and a domestic violence counseling checklist, and supported education for sexual violence support counselors (2 staff members), trauma treatment center, and trauma awareness improvement education (all staff)

COVID-19 Special Crisis Support

In the first half of 2020, due to the spread of COVID-19, many LGBTQ youth who are living independently were laid off and struggled to survive. They were unable to receive COVID-19 relief funding from the government, and existing support in the form of food and goods was insufficient to pay for rent, transportation, and other expenses that require cash. Because of this, DDing Ding created a program to support youth with emergency funding, and raised money through online fund-raising.

| COVID-19 Emergency Funding

Beginning in April 2020, we supported seven LGBTQ runaway youth living independently with 200,000 won per month for three months.

In addition, we supported LGBTQ youth in the Daegu and Gyeongbuk areas through funding received from the Beyond the Rainbow Foundation.

Supporting LGBTQ Youth in the Daegu and Gyeongbuk Areas

- Sent special Rainbow Kits to runaway youth (5 times)
- Sent messages of support and convenience store gift cards (33 individuals)
- Networked with 189 youth organizations in Daegu, Gyeongbuk, and Busan in order work together in the future

Home, PRIDE HOME!

Project for Housing Support for LGBTQ Youth

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
From 12 hours to 24 hours! Home, PRIDE HOME!

Although there are more than 130 youth shelters nationwide, youth who are LGBTQ worry about where they can sleep safely at night. DDing Dong wants to create a space where all LGBTQ youth can stay comfortably and safely. Home, PRIDE HOME will be a place where youth do not have to hide their identities, and where they can start to imagine living independently. In 2020, DDing Dong reviewed housing support cases and conducted a basic survey on the concerns and experiences of LGBTQ youth. 153 youth participated in the survey, and 10 participated in in-depth interviews to share their experience of running away from home. In the first half of 2021, we will publish a result report and conduct a promotional campaign so that our voices can reach more people. In addition, we would like to continue our solidarity with the Youth Residential Area Network and Gender Minority Residential Area Network to review laws and policies about housing for LGBTQ youth.

In 2020, we made efforts to change youth institutions as well as do case reviews. We conducted a survey of youth organization staff about their experiences, concerns, and difficulties in supporting LGBTQ youth. We also participated in lectures and offered recommendations. In 2021, we plan to provide guidebooks and education to youth institutions, including shelters, to enhance their understanding of LGBTQ youth, especially transgender and genderqueer youth.

Our goal may seem far away, but it is the road that we must walk. We vow to establish an alternative residential space where LGBTQ youth can stay safely, and create a welfare environment in which LGBTQ youth are not excluded


A Close-up Look at DDing Dong's Activism Even Though We Can't Meet, We're Always Nearby, **DDing Dong Pocha**

On the first Saturday of each month, DDing Dong staff meets with youth as part of DDing Dong Pocha street counseling

Unfortunately, because of COVID-19, DDing Dong Pocha was unable to run in 2020

However, even if we are physically apart, our hearts are close!

Instead of offline street counseling, we conducted online counseling.



In addition, during the Seoul Oueer Culture Festival, which was online this year, we organized various activities to stay connected even though we are not able to meet in person. We created the online website "Teenager LGBTO Bamboo Forest" where youth could share their stories. We hope that many LGBTO youth heard and believed in our message telling them that "even if we cannot meet, you are not alone."

In 2021, we will continue to check in with LGBTO youth as COVID-19 social distancing restrictions continue.

"Hanging Rainbow Wings" LGBTQ Youth Mental Health Program

The LGBTQ youth mental health care program "Hanging Rainbow Wings" is a program that helps youth in crisis. With support from the trauma healing center Human Heart, we met with LGBTQ youth to practice using Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) to learn crisis survival skills. We met with four youth in May, and three in June. LGBTQ youth face hate and discrimination in everyday life, and surviving these experiences can feel overwhelming. Through this program we taught youth strategies to understand and process their feelings and thoughts, and shared tools for how to deal with certain situations.

Feedback from youth who participated in the program included the following: "It was good to learn how to see things differently"; "I feel connected with others and like others can understand me"; "I feel alive, and I want to try using the skills that I learned today."

Of course, DBT is a treatment that works better when you can practice it over a longer period of time, combined with psychological counseling as well. However, many youth face barriers to accessing counseling and psychotherapy, and so even though this program was short-term, it was helpful to the youth who were able to participate.





Transgender and Queer Youth Planning How to Live Independently Through **"Rainbow Navigation T_Go Project"**

"Act like a woman!" or "Act like a man!" Many transgender and genderqueer youth struggle both at school and at home because of the oppressive atmosphere enforcing the gender binary. It is very important for young people to be able to meet others who are also figuring out their gender identity, to have access to accurate medical information, and to be in a supportive environment. Since 2019, DDing Dong has offered the program Rainbow Navigation T_Go, which supports transgender and genderqueer youth as they navigate their gender identity. In 2020, T_Go was held in four sessions. Three of the sessions were collective counseling programs where participants drew difficult memories using various materials such as flowers, stones, and clay. In the fourth session, participants listened to and asked doctors about any medical questions they had. Five youth, including MTF, FTM, and non-binary genderqueer youth, participated in the event. They were able to connect with each other, and formed bonds so that they felt less alone. They also enjoyed eating delicious meals together, too.

Through the program, youth were able to explore their emotions, how and what they are feeling, what comfort they need, and express themselves fully in a supportive and encouraging environment. It is desperately necessary for transgender and genderqueer youth to be able to share their various emotional experiences including the worries, joy, and sadness that they have not been easily able to express even to those closest to them, and to imagine their future

DDing Dong encourages all youth to live how they want with the gender expression they want, and is with them always by their side.

Supporting LGBTQ Youth Living With HIV



HIV/AIDS-related Counseling

In 2020, a total of 10 HIV/AIDS-related counseling consultations were conducted. This included three cases of accompanying youth to get tested for HIV, four cases of providing information related to HIV/AIDs, and three cases of HIV-related counseling via KakaoTalk. DDing Dong works hard to provide accurate and unbiased information without fear every time we receive an inquiry. Recently, rather than through regular counseling, more and more young people are talking about HIV through KakaoTalk inquiries, DDing Dong center visits, and DDing Dong program participation.

Visiting iSHAP STI Education and LGBTQ AIDS Prevention Center

In order to better provide STI-related counseling, all DDing Dong staff participated in a training conducted by experts. Through this education, DDing Dong staff were able to learn about different types of STIs, infectious diseases, symptoms, disease information, the examination process, precautions one can take, and coping methods. Staff were able to better develop their ability to understand and respond to youth's concerns and crisis situations. DDing Dong also visited iSHAP, a sexual minority AIDS prevention center, and learned about the HIV testing process, testing methods, and internal workings of the organization.

Special Meeting Time with a Young Person Living with HIV

On December 1, World AIDS Day, we learned about HIV and conducted a program called "View from an HIV–positive Per–son" to meet a young person living with HIV. Our program was held online because of COVID–19, but we were able to spend time talking freely with three LGBTQ youth about HIV.

Challenge! HIV-ster!: Developing HIV/AIDS Educational Tools

Hate and fake information about HIV/AIDS is extensive, and not enough prejudice-free information about HIV/AIDS exists. And because there is a lot of information to take in, and medical terminology is often used, it is easy to lose interest, no matter how important learning about HIV/AIDS is. So in 2020, DDing Dong developed the educational tool "Challenge! HIVster!" A "HIV-ster" is an HIV master, and through the game-like educational tool people can easily learn about HIV/AIDS. It is an educational tool developed to talk about HIV/AIDS in a fun way, and was produced with the support of the Seoul Northeastern NPO Center. We also conducted a pilot training with 12 local activists to introduce how to effectively use Challenge! HIV-ster! as an educational tool. In 2021, we plan to use Challenge! HIV-ster! tool to educate many people. We will not only educate teachers and workers at youth organizations, but also challenge ourselves, including using the tool to teach our close friends more about HIV/AIDS. We will conduct the first "HIV-ster" program, which allows you to communicate what you have learned to your close friends using the educational tool.









DDing-ga Dding-ga Volunteers

DDing-ga Dding-ga volunteers are those who share DDing Dong's values **Together With DDing-ga Dding-ga Volunteers**

DDing-ga Dding-ga volunteers are recruited at the beginning of the year. After being selected, they complete a training program and then complete at least one year of volunteering with DDing Dong. Because of COVID-19, we had to reduce our offline programs such as DDing Dong Pocha and DDing Dong Diner. Because of this we didn't recruit new volunteer members this year. We would like to thank our current volunteer members for their support and assistance with our online programs.





Reviews from DDing-ga Dding-ga volunteers

Volunteering in 2020 was very different then last year but still very meaningful. In the past year, many people have been isolated from existing social relationships amid the pandemic, and we've been thinking about what programs and resources we need to help LGBTQ youth keep their pride and lead their daily lives.

Christmas Gift Event

for Transgender and Genderqueer Youth

2020 was a year of hatred towards LGBTQ people. In particular, mockey and hatred toward those who are questioning their gender identity has flooded social and mass media, and youth who identify as transgender and genderqueer are especially hurt and struggling. In order to convey our comfort and support, DDing Dong prepared a Christmas gift event for transgender and genderqueer youth with the help of the "Yongsan Sharing House" Anglican Church. We delivered gifts (gender-free underwear, socks, and health and beauty store gift cards worth 30,000 won) and cute Christmas cards to 30 transgender and queer teenagers under the age of 21.

When hatred and stigma against LGBTQ people spread after COVID-19 infections in the Itaewon neighborhood, DDing Dong provided emergency counseling support. As a coalition member of Rainbow Action Against Sexual-Minority Discrimination, DDing Dong has actively raised its voice for human rights issues. DDing Dong will continue to fight against hatred and protect the lives of LGBTQ youth.

2020-2021 Media Coverage of **DDing Dong**

In 2020, DDing Dong's activism was covered extensively in the media as well. DDing Dong gave many remarks to the media about major events, and statistics about DDing Dong's counseling and crisis support work were used in a variety of ways. In the first half of the year, DDing Dong's Home PRIDE HOME campaign was covered in the media. There was also media coverage of DDing Dong's activism in response to the hatred that increased following COVID-19 infections at clubs in Itaewon. In the second half of the year, DDing Dong's counseling statistics were published and covered by the Hankyoreh newspaper. An article about examples of discrimination against LGBTQ youth an the anti-discrimination bill was also published.

If bullying toward LGBTQ youth can be reduced, if suicide rates can be lowered, we wish that we can live happily and and be respected as who we are. DDing Dong wants to listen to the voices of LGBTQ youth, stand together, and exist for them.

Unlike other youth organizations, DDing Dong operates only with individual donations, and without support from the government. Although there are many hurdles, we will continue to make positive changes in our society with the help and support of our donors. In order to find hope even in crisis, so that youth minorities can continue their lives with dignity, we stand with LGBTQ youth. DDing Dong Finances in 2020


It was difficult to even meet LGBTQ youth due to COVID-19.

As social distancing continued, the isolation and loneliness youth experienced grew, they were exposed to domestic violence, and those who lived independently struggled financially.

Nevertheless, DDing Dong did not give up.

We conducted an online fundraising campaign to support youth in crisis, secured various donations, and provided financial resources. In terms of expenditure, direct event expenses decreased, but the cost of supporting youths' living expenses and everyday necessities increased significantly. Through the Home PRIDE HOME Campaign, we also developed a roadmap and study about LGBTQ youth housing support. In addition, DDing Dong also implemented a retirement pension plan for the long-term sustainability and stability of its staff members.

It is thanks to the support of DDing Dong's donors that we were able to keep working and supporting youth during these difficult times. As we continue to move forward, we vow to continue to be unwavering supporters and partners of LGBTQ youth.

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
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
