Since 1995, Fatima Memorial Hospital has been playing host to students from educational institutions from Lahore and around the world as part of its Student Leadership Program. Every summer, a number of A-Level & Bachelors students from different educational institutions apply and are selected to join the Student Leadership Program at the Fatima Memorial System. This program has been labeled as a Role Model for Internships in Pakistan and its popularity can be assessed by the growing number of applicants who apply for this program both locally and from overseas. In 2008 alone over 400 applicants registered for the program.

Students from these education institutions are given the opportunity to work with disadvantaged students through a Community Outreach program. The internship program is currently assisting 120 students. Rather than explain the program in detail, we have asked our interns to document case studies of these students. Many of the students have financially adopted these disadvantaged students and support their education. Here are reports from five of the case studies.

Can You Help Me in Changing My Destiny and the Fate of My Generation?

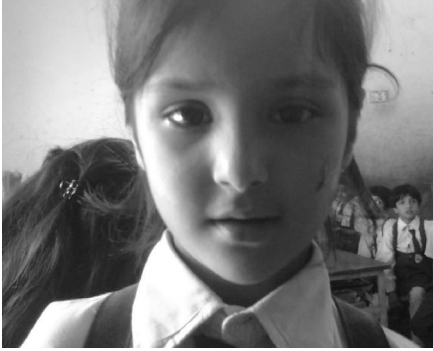
