# Compassionate Next Steps

As word about Warm Hearth spreads in Armenia, we receive more inquiries from people who have a family member with a disability. They are discouraged from having walked this road alone for too long. While we are committed at this time to only taking residents who have been orphaned or abandoned, we have been struck by the lack of support that families have in regard to caring for their loved ones with disabilities. In an effort to prevent further institutionalization and respond to this need, we have considered for some time the possibility of opening a Day Center out of our home in 3rd Village that would be available to some of these individuals for a fee. We have a large basement with a separate entrance that may be used for the Day Center, thus preserving the privacy of our residents and their sense of "home," which is our priority. The addition of a Day Center would provide support to the families and individuals with disabilities, allow us to cultivate independence and financial stability with an income-generated project for Warm Hearth, and in general enable us to share our vision with the community. A project plan is being drafted at this time. It is exciting to consider the possibilities as we look forward to the future.
