Our hope and work is to bring her home and we are engaged in that work. While Anna is much more than a Cause, and while we cannot yet say whether this is a "lost cause", we take some solace in these words. If we take the widest and wisest view of a Cause, there is no such thing as a Lost Cause, because there is no such thing as a Gained Cause. We fight for lost causes because we know that our defeat and dismay may be the preface to our successors' victory, though that victory itself will be temporary; we fight rather to keep something alive than in the expectation that it will triumph. (T. S. Eliot). For Anna's sake, for all of our residents' sakes, and in honor of the dignity and humanity of all who suffer from mental illness, we continue to fight to keep Anna out of institutions.
