

ASSAM DOG SQUAD UNIT, INDIA

The Issue

Kaziranga National Park (KNP), a UNESCO World Heritage site in the Indian state of Assam, provides vital habitat for diverse wildlife and has been protected since the early 20th century.

Kaziranga is the last stronghold of the Indian one-horned rhino, more than two thirds of the worldwide population of this gentle herbivore live in the park. It is also considered to be one of India's most critical tiger habitats.

However, this wildlife haven and its remarkable inhabitants are under threat. In 2013, 24 rhinos from Kaziranga were lost to poachers; the worst seen since 1980s and 1990s. To-date in 2015 there have been 14 known poaching cases. Rhino horn costs have increased four-fold in three years. The park also recently experienced its first ever case of a tiger being poisoned by poachers.

It is vital that these endangered species are given the protection they need and wherever possible poachers are identified and brought to justice. With the increasingly well-funded trade in illegal wildlife, innovative and effective ways of tackling this crime are becoming more and more important.

Background

David Shepherd Wildlife Foundation (DSWF) has worked with Indian NGO, Aaranyak for over 20 years to protect endangered species in Assam state, India. Sole funders of a vital, comprehensive communications system for the forest rangers as well as funding equipment and camera-traps, DSWF has facilitated substantial state-of-the-art wildlife protection and research in Kaziranga National Park.

Continuing to strengthen and expand upon current anti-poaching work, in 2011 DSWF expanded its support to fund Kaziranga's first dog squad. Jorba, an extraordinary Belgian shepherd dog, and his handler Anil were the pioneers in this aspect of the fight against poaching. Having been specially trained, Jorba is capable of picking up a scent, tracking and bringing down a suspect and is trained to detect wildlife products such as tiger skin and bones, ivory and rhino horn.

In collaboration with the Kaziranga National Park authorities, the dog squad work to unearth clues, lead enforcement agencies to suspect's hideouts, arrest criminals and recover wildlife products along with arms and ammunition used to conduct the crime. During monsoon season, it is not possible to pick up a scent and so the team returns to their training, though they are always on call for emergencies.

The Need

Apprehending over 30 poachers and even recovering two camera traps discarded by poachers attempting to avoid detection, Jorba and Anil have exceeded expectations. In 2014 they were joined by a second dog, Babli. This small team has become a unique model to deter poaching and bring poachers to justice. DSWF and Aaranyak strongly believe that creating further dog squad teams would complement and expand the existing success of the team as well as DSWF's other work within KNP and the wider fight against poaching.

At 170sq miles, Kaziranga is an immense area. Expanding the dog team will enable them to cover larger areas as well as tackle multiple poaching cases; vital considering the recent increase in demand for rhino horn. Additionally, as high profile anti-poaching units, the teams are involved in many dangerous situations and adding further teams will reduce pressure as well as provide mutual support for this often challenging role.
