YEARDLEY'S STORY



One Love was founded in 2010 to honor Yeardley Love, a UVA student who was beaten to death by her ex-boyfriend just weeks before their graduation.

After her death, Yeardley's friends and family were shocked to learn the statistics about relationship violence and to realize that no one knew how at risk Yeardley really was.

Today, One Love honors Yeardley by working with young people across the country to raise awareness about the warning signs of abuse and activate communities to work to change the statistics around relationship violence.




YEAR ONE: BUILDING A MOVEMENT FOR CHANGE

THE CATALYST - Our campaign to educate, empower, and activate young people officially launched in January 2015 when we began nationwide distribution of the *Escalation* workshop. *Escalation* is a powerful, emotionally-engaging 90-minute film based workshop that educates students about relationship violence and empowers them to work for change in their campus communities.

Over and over, students describe *Escalation* as "eye-opening" yet "deeply recognizable", reflecting the fact that they frequently see the unhealthy behaviors depicted in the film, but never before realized how dangerous they might be.

Student enthusiasm is driving rapid adoption of the workshop as an educational tool on campus. Students report that they have never before talked with their peers about relationship violence and they feel deeply empowered to find their collective voice on this issue.

National roll-out of *Escalation* begins


November 2015:

With Escalation distribution underway and the Yards for Yeardley campaign showing early signs of student interest, One Love realized the need for more short, shareable content that could help educate young people and engage them more deeply in our work. #ThatsNotLove, our new digital campaign, was launched in October 2015 and will roll out over the next year.



- ₩ #ThatsNotLove defines the gray area between love and control, helping students identify relationship abuse, something 57% of college students report is difficult to do.
- The campaign's first public service announcement. Because I Love You shows how a simple phrase can take on different meanings in an unhealthy relationship, escalating from a statement of care to one of control
- Because I Love You was viewed over 5 million times on YouTube and Facebook in its first two weeks. Importantly, the extensive comments and shares indicate young people relate deeply to the message and are eager to start the discussion with each other.

TEAM ONE LOVE



On campus, **Team One Love** is the way for interested students to formally join One Love's movement to end relationship violence. Students sign on to share the *Escalation* Workshop more extensively in their communities and to keep their schools engaged.
