

Friendship Flood Response 2016 Report

Date: 21st August 2016

Flood situation:

In Bangladesh, an estimated 3.7 million people in 19 districts have been affected by the recent floods which began in mid-July. More than 250,000 houses are reported damaged. Around 110 deaths have been reported.

Of the total number of people affected by the latest floods, around 2 million lives in Jamalpur, Kurigram and Gaibandha - Bangladesh's poorest districts, where around a third of the population falls below the poverty line. These northern areas were also hit by severe flooding in September 2014.

The water has now started receding but experts cautioned about different post flood crisis like water borne diseases, food insecurity, water scarcity, lack of sanitation facilities, and environmental hazards.

- **Rescue:** Friendship made available 5 boats for rescue services
- Shelter: Arranged shelter for 1,287 people and 1,278 cattle in Friendship schools and raised plinths



- Water Sanitation: installed water sanitation facilities in 25 locations where people took shelter
- **Medical support:** provided medical services to 9,056 people through 83 emergency medical camps in Gaibandha, Kurigram, Bogra, Jamalpur and Sirajgonj
- Cattle vaccination: vaccinated 122 cattle in collaboration with government
- Staff and Volunteers services: 100 community volunteers and at least 500 staff are involved
- Food relief: The 1st phase relief distribution for 10,757 families in 50 chars are in progress with a target to support over 20,000 families. The food relief contains 5 days' food for a family of five people which includes 8 kg rice. 1 kg dal (pulse), 2 kg potato, ½ kg shuji (Semolina). 1 kg sugar, 1 liter oil, 5 packs oral saline, 1 kg salt and a hygiene pack (containing soap, toothpaste, petroleum jelly and detergent powder)

Story of Omisa

"It is too difficult for me to stay here while all my school friends are scattered. I cannot even continue my schooling with my friends and beloved teachers. She had to leave home all of a sudden due to severe flooding and took shelter in an open field of a rural market named Kunderpara along with her family.

Technical skill for water option maintenance

As part of Friendship's disaster preparedness programme, people from the community were given simple technical knowhow on how to fix a tube well and sanitary latrine and were also provided with basic tools which now coming in handy. The community people themselves are now fixing the tube well, while its out of order, resulted making water available in emergency situation.





Mobility

'Give us a boat to go to the shore', water logged people urged to the Friendship team when they were visiting by boat to observe the flood situation in the pocket areas of Kurigram district. Only a rescue boat could help those people get out of that miserable situation and get connected with mainland community. Many had family members in distant location who could provide support. However, they were unable to move from one place to the other due to flood water. By giving them a solution for their mobility Friendship helped them get connected with others.

Plinth, a shelter solution for the community

Friendship plinth is a raised oval-shaped land which gives shelter to 30 families and their cattle during the time of disaster. When the poor flood affected people primarily struggle to find shelter for themselves, often they have to leave their valuable cattle behind and incur a great loss. Friendship's plinth has been a great support to the community during this flood.
