

THE "EXTREME ROOMS" PROJECT

CONTEXT, OBJECTIVES, DESCRIPTION, BUDGET

A renovation & humanization project of the Pediatric Protected Unit of the university hospital of Bordeaux





CONTEXT

- □ Children going through a bone marrow transplantation or very intensive chemotherapy experience "extreme conditions" during their stay in the hospital:
- Separation from home
- Prolonged stay (several weeks)
- Draconian antimicrobial isolation in a room similar to an operating room
- Accommodation reduced to functionality (cramped, lighting, lack of comfort)
- Life under constant threat, which is unthinkable at this age

These rooms fully provide the required antimicrobial protection. However, hospital stays in such extreme conditions are very painful, and even sometimes experienced as "carceral", for children and their families.





CONTEXT


- ☐ The following project is meant to completely rethink the Protected Unit in order to ensure the same level of antimicrobial protection while "letting life in":
- Room of sufficient size
- Health equipment
- Natural lighting
- Possibility of access to a room to play or relax.

This project has been designed along with children and their families, as well as with the commitment of the hospital and of the different health care staff

In addition to improving comfort during their stay, the objective of this project is to provide more serenity to children and their family, to allow them to leave their room and see each other, and to provide them with a space where they can play, dream, create, and practice a physical activity.

Ultimately, the objective is to give them the opportunity to recharge their batteries, mobilize themselves, develop their autonomy and think about their future.





OBJECTIVES

☐ This project is axed around the following objectives:


- Maintaining or improving a high level of antimicrobial protection and safety
- Improving the quality of service, comfort and animation in a way adapted to babies as well as to teenagers in order to meet our goals in terms of humanitarianism
- Facilitating inputs from different health care professionals

The 200m² Protected Unit will be completely restructured. It will have six rooms of 20m², each equipped with a private bathroom, large windows to let natural light come in, and will be arranged so as to accommodate parents as well during their visits.

The Unit will also include a kitchenette to heat up or freshen up meals, as well as a room for physical activity and relaxation.

More than the reconstruction of a hospital unit, which is within the competence of public finances, this project is about *improving* the mental and physical well-being of children of all ages. Such project is possible thanks to the support of our partners and sponsors.





EXPECTED RESULTS

■ We expect from this project to:

- Provide a decent level of comfort, especially in a special technical environment, for children suffering from a serious or lifethreatening disease and for their families
- Offer to families, caregivers, teachers, psychologists, physical therapists, dieticians, sports coaches, socio-aestheticians, art therapists, and volunteers the possibility to fully support children
- Improve the feeling of serenity and the ability to go through this hard time, cheer up and concentrate
- Acknowledge the children's personal projects and support their resilience capacity by demonstrating an innate interest in them

The majority of children recover in spite of the extreme experience they've been going through, as described earlier. Their health conditions change accordingly with the intensity of their treatment or ferocity of their disease. However, a profound reorganization of hospital conditions centered on children's experience and on how they feel, as well as on true support from their family and hospital staff, will <u>significantly improve</u> their quality of life during their stay, healing process, and entry into society upon recovery.
