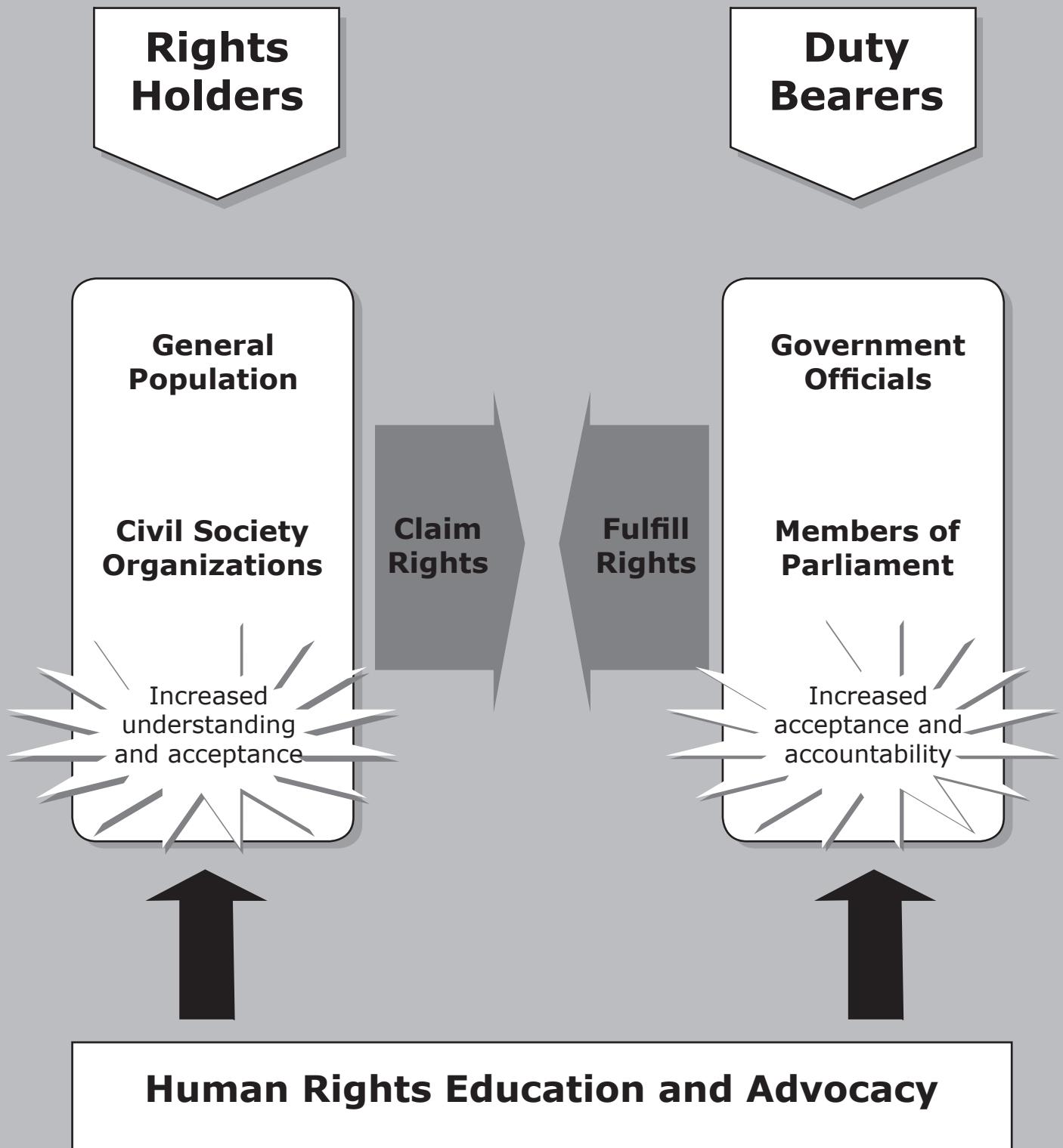

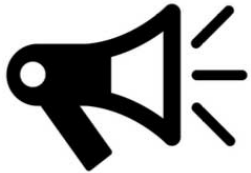

fulfill its obligations under CE-
DAW, which Myanmar ratified
in 1997.

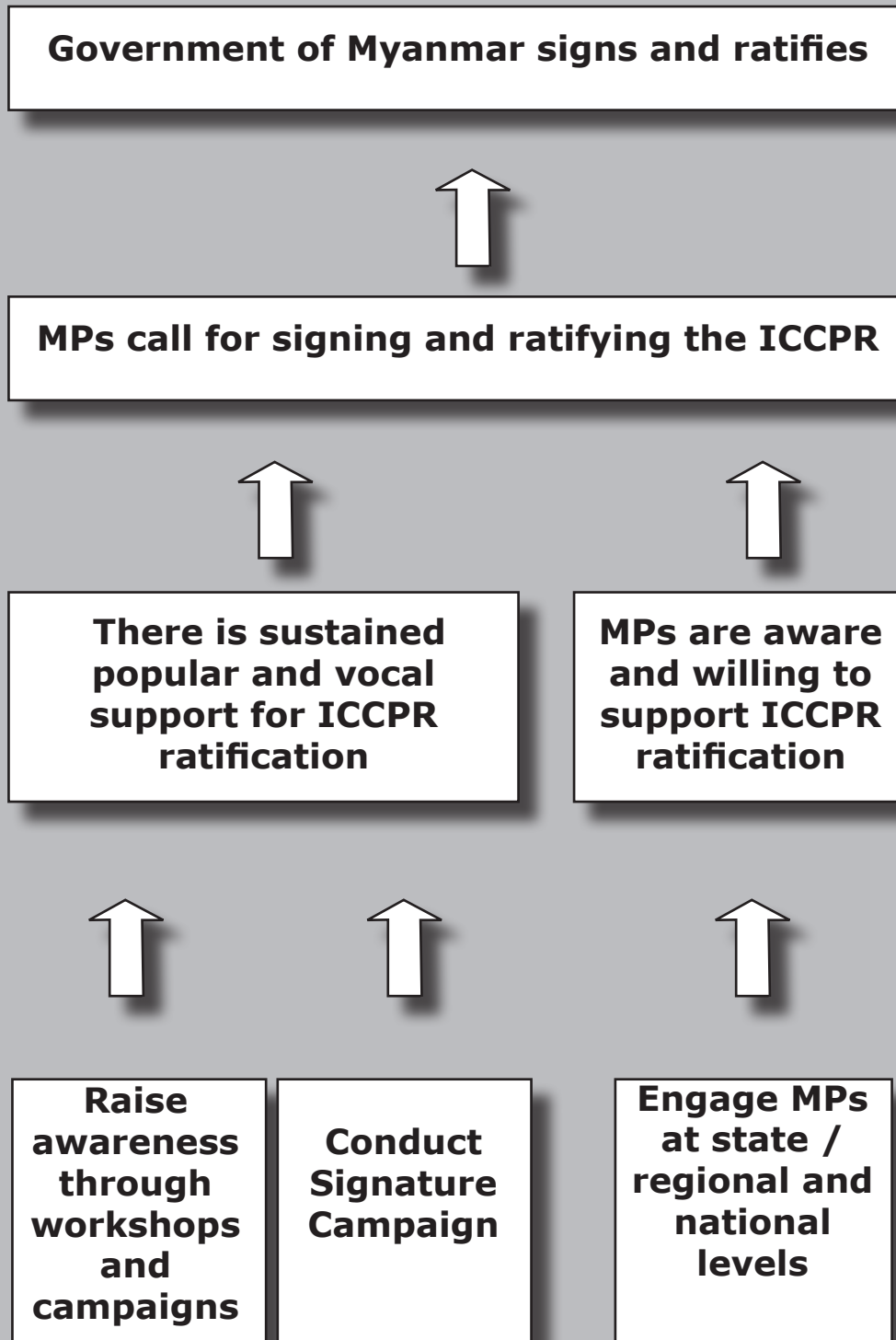

Why the ICCPR is so important for Myanmar

The ICCPR is a key Human Rights Treaty that obligates countries that have ratified it to protect and preserve their people's civil and political rights

It fights for

- Freedom from torture and cruel punishment
- Freedom from slavery and forced labor
- Freedom of thought, religion and expression
- Peaceful Assembly
- Privacy, home, and family life
- Rights of children
- Political Participation
- Equality

Myanmar is among the last few countries in the world to sign and ratify the ICCPR
