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## **OVERVIEW**

First and foremost, thank you to all NCH donors, members and partners for your generous support!

Over the last year, NCH has forged a meaningful partnership with lawmakers and federal agencies that have shaped policy and resources more inclusively and collaboratively. We have been able to support more leaders who have lived experience of homelessness. Further, the funding provided by our community of supporters has led NCH to financial stability.

At the height of the pandemic, the National Coalition (NCH) distributed over 2 million masks to homeless service providers nationwide. We partnered with the Ford Fund during one of the most critical periods of the country's battle with the Coronavirus. In addition, we have provided COVID-specific care packages in the DC, Maryland, and Virginia areas to many homeless and shelters. The packages included hand sanitizers, socks, batteries, feminine hygiene products, and other non-traditional items.

NCH worked closely with the Department of Housing and Urban Development to introduce the first Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the unsheltered homeless population. This funding will be a vital resource in the effort to move people off the streets and into housing in some of the nation's most marginalized communities. With Progressive's support, NCH-trained leaders were instrumental in developing the country's vaccine distribution, communications, and logistics in partnership with the Department of Housing (HUD), Urban Development, and the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

NCH's trajectory from its original organizing principle that people who have experienced homelessness must be leading change has led to participation in various HUD Technical Assistant projects. NCH has been able to employ 30 formerly homeless men and women across the country to provide direct guidance to federal agencies about homeless service delivery.









The program has been so effective that NCH has been approached by multiple organizations for new projects, including a statewide project in California to promote racial equity and two additional projects with HUD and the Center for Budget and Policy priorities. NCH recently started relationships with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to provide support for housing 38,000 homeless veterans and with the American Center for Families to work on creating equitable process through the Temporary Assistance for Children and Families Program.

NCH has partnered with the Secretary of HUD to create the People with Lived Experience and Expertise Committee (PWLEE). The PWLEE groups have been instrumental in developing new strategies and procedures to address homelessness, including the Unsheltered Homelessness NOFO mentioned above. PWLEE committees have been appointed to The House America initiative - a group of Mayors, Governors, and Judges convened by the secretary to share successes in ending homelessness.

The incredible advocates employed by NCH have provided numerous trainings to both Federal HUD staff and local service providers, ensuring holistic care and programs for people experiencing homelessness during the COVID pandemic. We have presented on panel presentations and webinars on topics including CARES Act Funds, Stimulus Funds related to people without homes, and eviction prevention resources.

NCH is perhaps most excited to have launched the first-of-its-kind **Lived Experience Training Academy (LETA)**. The mission of LETA is to provide people with lived experience of homelessness the tools to serve on board of directors, as consultants, as well as other professional employment opportunities. NCH plans to provide services to 25 communities with cohorts of 25 individuals in 2023.












Over the last year, NCH has added staff in its Civil Rights, Development and Public Education departments. True to our mission, 90% of staff have experienced homeless in their lifetime.

NCH has embraced a hybrid work environment. We now have a presence in the Midwest (Cleveland, OH), the West (Los Angeles, CA), the Northeast (NYC and upstate NY), and the South (Miami, FL and Charlotte, NC), as well as the DC Metro region. We have focused growing our support for communities that are not providing a healthy, therapeutic, or speedy path back to housing for the population by working with local advocates to seek better solutions and better outcomes. NCH partnered with several organizations to request that the federal courts enforce the existing fair housing laws. We have also expanded in recruiting new network members from all fifty states, including numerous individuals with lived experience of homelessness.

### STAFFING



NCH has increased staff drastically in the last 3 years. The increase in fulltime staff has nearly doubled the capacity and reach of the organization, improving our image, and furthering our movement.










#### **SOCIAL MEDIA**





#### VALENTINES DAY ACTION FOR BUILD BACK BETTER

On February 14th, 2022, NCH went on the hill and led a broken-heart valentine action to advocate that congress pass Build Back Better. We printed cards with each senator's name and the corresponding names of the unhoused neighbors who passed away in their state. NCH collected the names of 5,500 individuals who passed away in 2021, but it is estimated that nearly 17,500 each year pass away.



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#### Rashema Melson

Hello, my name is Rashema Melson, I am a born and raised DC native. I experienced homelessness consecutively for 12 years, from the age of 12-24 years old. I graduated from Georgetown University in 2019, and that was the same year I joined the Speakers' Bureau, which has been absolutely life changing. I was in a place in my life where I wanted to invoke change and help others who



have experienced similar traumas as mine, such as homelessness and lost hope. Once I started to engage with the National Coalition for the Homeless (NCH), I knew I was in the right place. I was able to speak at so many different events: schools, universities, businesses, and conferences helping people become more aware of homelessness and how they could make a difference in ending it. Through my speaking, I gained more confidence and value in my identity, and not just thinking of myself as the quitter Homeless Valedictorian" or a "homeless person' and others began to notice the humanness in me as well. Donald Whitehead, Executive Director of NCH, offered more opportunities to me and others to partner with HUD to do profound and groundbreaking work within the homelessness response system, and while also making a generous income. In the span of almost 3 years, this opened the door for me to become a TA provider, independent consultant, 1st generation homeowner, and 1st generation entrepreneur; I am now CEO and Founder of Pain Into PURPOSE, Founder & President of the Melson Foundation, and own 1.5 acres of land. My life has completely evolved for the better and I deeply enjoy working with and alongside NCH to continue to bring change to our impoverished and under-resourced communities that need us. If it wasn't for NCH's Speakers Bureau allowing my light to None of this would be possible without NCH. They have helped me to become the professional woman who has so much passion making sure that another homeless individual has the opportunities that I received to elevate and to believe in themselves so they can see themselves in a new light. 




#### John Harrison

I became homeless in my forties and was on the verge of declining into chronic homelessness.

A turning point for me was finding out about the National Coalition for the Homeless. The support and encouragement they provided me, and their practice of including me and others in their work



and mission, helped to restore my sense of self and rediscover my strengths. Being a member of NCH's Speakers Bureau was instrumental in restoring my sense of purpose as well. With renewed confidence I decided and was able to go to college, in my fifties. Donald Whitehead made me aware of an opportunity to work in the homeless response system and I became a street outreach worker.

The experience I gained in that work led to further opportunities participating in HUD TA work where both my lived experience of homelessness and my role doing street outreach gave me a valued perspective. The guidance and mentoring I've received have transformed the challenges of homelessness into a priceless resource I can draw upon the work I'm doing now. I've helped people that were living in stairwells and laundry rooms just last year now have keys to their own apartment. And I am doing meaningful work in transforming the homeless response system through numerous contributions to HUD Technical Assistance projects.

#### **Deborah Gilbert White**

As a member of the Faces of Homelessness Speakers' Bureau, I have spent the last few years speaking to groups, organizations, and legislators about protecting the humanity, dignity, and rights of people identified as homeless or at risk of homelessness. Experiencing homelessness through eviction in Delaware put



me on the path of being an advocate for myself and for others. My training as a social psychologist before homelessness allowed me to focus on issues of diversity and inclusion.

Coming out of homelessness I continue to push for protective legislation such as a DE Bill of Rights for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness and the Right to Representation for tenants during eviction.

Most recently I was hired as Director of Education with the National Coalition for the Homeless, and in this capacity will assist others with the lived experience of homelessness by informing the work of LETA (Lived Experience Training Institute) and supporting the development of leadership skills that move the experience of homelessness beyond telling our stories shaping and framing the transformative change needed to end it.
