The school is located in a camp, where many internally displaced people now reside.

Through the engagement of NuDay's teachers, students are dedicated to their courses and are enthusiastic about each school day. Asi Camp's Future Generation School is now in its second year, and is continuing to serve children in the area through ensuring a mental and emotional grown.



The Asi Camp Future Generation School has a computer lab, encouraging students to do research on their own and making information more easily accessible.

Outside of the school year and during holidays, Asi Camp's Future Generation School turns into a community center, bringing families and friends together to celebrate. Known as "Kid Friendly Zones," NuDay Syria opens the doors of the school for recreational and educational activities, aiming to help children through the difficult memories that they may have whole also enhancing their kinetic and intellectual abilities.
