Programme duration: 2019-2021

Improving primary education and preventing violence against children through peace culture education in the Alibori department, January 2019 – January 2022 (36 months)

Budget: 145'000 CHF / 144'334 USD

General objective

To contribute to quality education and reduce violence against children in the Alibori region in Benin by promoting violence-free education in school (primary and preschool levels) and in communities.

Specific objectives

- **OS1.** To contribute to the improvement of school success and to reduce school abandonment by strengthening the psychosocial competences and the capacities of primary and preschool teachers to adopt pedagogical practices and postures centred on children.
- **OS2**. To contribute to the reduction of violence against children in schools and in families through the introduction of pedagogical practices based on positive discipline and on a positive representation of the child.
- **OS3.** To accompany the Ministry of National Education MEMP in the realisation of the new Sectoral Plan for Education objectives

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
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Context

After 25 years of democratic rule, Benin still experiences governance challenges that impact the delivery of public services such as education. Decentralisation proves particularly challenging in the education sector, where laws assigning to localities the responsibility for the construction, equipment, repair and maintenance of school buildings are only timidly enforced. In the field, the central level continues to direct and execute actions normally devolved to local administrative units.

The new Sectoral Plan for Education post-2015 (PSE post-2015) underlines several issues within the education system: the difficulty to satisfy a rapidly increasing demand for schooling, the need for measures to promote equality in certain zones and social categories, the insufficient attention given to alternative education, literacy, adult education and training, the improvement of sectoral governance etc.



The number of students enrolled has increased across nearly all levels of schooling between 2010 and 2015, representing now a major challenge for national institutions. Public education remains plagued by frequent school abandonment (school abandonment rate of 18.61%, 19.21% for girls) and unsatisfactory acquisition levels, revealed and confirmed by the national exams results.

The new Sectoral Plan for Education stresses the necessity of improving education quality in Benin to address negative phenomena such as radicalisation, the perpetuation of oppressive social norms, particularly towards young women, occurrences of violence against children and societal violence more generally. The new sectoral plan believes in the "fair development of human capital as the foundation of economic growth". To realise this vision, it is primordial to improve the quality of teaching and acquisition. Children's learning environment must be made safer and more peaceful, and children must be prepared for leadership. The acquisition of life competences centred on the protection of children against violence is primordial, as are civic education and peace education.

<u>Intervention for the prevention of violence against children and the strengthening of primary education in the Alibori region</u>

Situated in the country's North-east, Alibori is the largest region in Benin (23% of the national territory). The department's population is predominantly rural (75%) and practices Islam (81.3%). Agriculture is the main economic activity. Alibori faces all the major education challenges present in Benin today: the region has the lowest school enrolment rates in the country (6.7% preschool enrolment rate, 59.4% primary school enrolment rate), and an attainment rate of 36.4%. The repetition rate is the second highest in the country (13.3%) and abandoning school is common (abandonment rate 18.3%). At school, the student/teacher ratio

is 72 (the highest in Benin), with direct repercussions on teaching methods and classroom discipline. A doctoral thesis (2016) studies the factors behind school abandonment in Alibori, including violence at school and gender-based violence¹. To respond to the region's serious educational needs, Graines de Paix has chosen this department as a priority zone for intervention. We have designed an in-service training program for 1800 primary school teachers in Alibori.

Activities for the introduction of peace culture education and the prevention of violence against children in Alibori

- A1 Elaboration of the project's theory of change in Kandi in collaboration with the actors
- A2 Awareness-raising campaign to prevent violence against children in Alibori (Kandi)
- A3 Integration of PCE into the primary teachers' repository of competences (Cotonou)
- A4 Elaboration/validation of training plan for parental education (Cotonou)
- A5 Elaboration/validation of a training program for primary school trainers (Cotonou)
- A6 Training workshop for primary school level trainers (Kandi)
- A7 Training workshop in parental education for community workers in Kandi
- A8 Elaboration and validation of primary school training guide (Kandi)
- A9 Elaboration and validation of pedagogical kit for primary school teachers (Kandi)
- A10 In-service training for primary school teachers: organisation of 94 sessions of 3 days each
- A11 Deployment (48x) of the touring exhibition "Education without violence" in communities
- A12 Deployment (30x) of the exhibition "Neither hedgehog, nor doormat" in targeted schools
- **A13** Follow-up/monitoring of trained teachers
- **A14** Monitoring of the effects of the intervention
- A15 Final report on the intervention's outcomes, to be integrated into the midway evaluation of the PSE post-2015

Expected results (outcomes) of the intervention to introduce peace culture education and prevent violence against children in Alibori

- A theory of change for the intervention is elaborated in Kandi (capital of Alibori region).
- A monitoring framework for the intervention is set up in Kandi.
- An awareness-raising campaign is rolled out to reduce violence against children, gender-based violence in particular.
- A training program for trainers is produced by GdP experts and validated by the MEMP; 20 primary school level trainers are selected among the pedagogical counsellors and trained to carry out teacher training and accompany the acquisition of a new professional posture in keeping with quality education.
- 1'880 primary level teachers are trained to the tools and approaches of peace culture education.
- 30 community workers are trained in parental education.
- A training guide is designed in collaboration with the intervention actors.
- A pedagogical kit for the primary school teacher is produced, featuring 50 activities on a range of topics, including gender-based discrimination.
- The exhibition "Education without violence" is toured in communities throughout the 240 days of the intervention.
- The exhibition "Neither hedgehog, nor doormat" is toured in selected schools during 150 days throughout the duration of the intervention.
- 180 follow-up visits are carried out by trainers during the intervention.

- A baseline and end-of-intervention survey are carried out, data is collected, analysed and a report
 is written to inform the programme and the midway evaluation of the PSE post-2015 (scheduled for
 2021).
- A monitoring report is written up, presented and integrated into the midway evaluation of the PSE post-2015.

Beneficiaries

The direct beneficiaries of the intervention in Alibori are the trainers, pedagogical counsellors and primary school teachers trained by Graines de Paix. Primary school students, community representatives and parents taking part in GdP animations and activities will benefit from the intervention.

The indirect beneficiaries are the community at large, which will benefit from an improved primary education, a higher school attainment rate and a more peaceful social climate.

Finally, the Ministries of Preschool and Primary Education and Ministry of Social Affairs and Microfinance will benefit from actions that contribute to offer quality primary education and to provide equal access to education in Alibori. The ministries will also be equipped with resources and competences to better ensure the protection of children.

Evaluation

A. The external evaluation of our resources, *Grandir en Paix* (Bex, Suisse) and of our projects (*Violence prevention project in Tonkpi, Côte d'Ivoire*) offers a guarantee of the quality of our interventions and their impacts.

Our *Grandir en Paix* collection, published by Loisirs et Pédagogie in Switzerland, was implemented in 9 classrooms of the Bex primary school during one school year and evaluated by the Haute Ecole Pédagogique du Valais in 2017. The resource obtained the official grade B, granted to resources demonstrating a "high quality, scientifically validated or highly recommended, following practical experiments in classrooms with an external evaluation".

- B. The London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine is evaluating our violence prevention project in the Tonkpi region in Côte d'Ivoire. The intermediary results already demonstrate:
 - A statistically significant change in the rejection of physical discipline practices by teachers after one day of training.
 - A statistically significant increase in teachers' selfconfidence and motivation to use non-violent techniques and the proposed peace activities.

Final results will be available in 2019.



Budget

Our Benin Programme is designed over three years (2019, 2020, and 2021). The total budget amounts to CHF 1'450'000 or USD 1'443'346 over 36 months. The summary featured below outlines the cost per activity for our areas of intervention. Our financing plan includes diverse funding mechanisms. We have successfully secured 50% of our global budget from the Smartpeace Foundation (Switzerland).

Our aim is to mobilize our community and the Global Giving platform to secure 10% of our global budget, USD 145'000.
