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## Educating and Empowering Girls

The Rwandan government enacted a policy that provides all Rwandan children with nine years of fee-free education. Yet, girls are still dropping out of school at far higher rates than their male counterparts. Africa attends secondary school. **The challenge is keeping girls in school.** Girls with seven years of attending school, girls many four years, families still have to pay for uniforms, supplies, and small houses to supplement teacher salaries. Sanitation issues also prevent girls from attending school, as the lack of latrines makes it impossible for them to attend class when menstruating, especially also at a high risk of sexual **100-200% violence**, which can result in unwanted pregnancies, expulsion from the family, and drop out. **CARE International**. **Familial**
