


GOAL: To raise R1 Million (USD68 000) to cover the cost of building South Africa's first Elephant Orphanage, which has been recently named Hoedspruit Elephant Rehabilitation and Development (HERD).

HOW CAN WE ACHIEVE THIS: We are asking for 1000 people/families/companies to donate just R1000 (USD80 or more!) to reach our target of R1 million. 1000 X 1000 = R1 000 000

READ MORE ABOUT OUR PROJECT:

The Wildlife Conservation Trust (WCT), has recognised the urgency of building a dedicated elephant orphanage, that will focus solely on the wellbeing and care of the growing numbers of orphaned or displaced elephants in South Africa and surrounding countries.

Over the past four years, the WCT has assisted with the funding and support of orphaned elephants at the Hoedspruit Endangered Species Centre (HESC), who under the guidance of the team at Jabulani, welcomed any orphaned or displaced elephant calves that have needed a place of rehabilitation and care.



There has been a concerning increase in elephant poaching within South Africa over the past four years. These are the poaching statistics from the Kruger National Park alone:

2014	2015	2016	2017	2018
2 Deaths	22 Deaths	24 Deaths	68 Deaths	72 Deaths

We have to be proactive and ensure that we are adequately equipped to accept further orphans in a controlled environment designed for best practice in elephant care.

The land has been secured close to the unique Jabulani elephant herd, who have accepted four elephant calves in previous years and the building has already commenced.

It will also be advantageous on an emotional level for baby elephants to be near a mature, close-knit elephant herd, and this will also create a more comfortable space to monitor the stages of integration into the herd on an individual basis for each elephant calf's different needs.

Our first and foremost prerogative with every orphaned elephant is to ensure their survival through their early formative years, and the Jabulani herd provide an ideal and unique family structure for little elephants that would have lost their families for a variety of reasons.


READ MORE ABOUT OUR PROJECT:

We can never be sure of early health issues that may have been the reason that its herd may abandon an elephant calf, but we have to be proactive and prepared for the increase of orphans from any number of environmental factors, but mostly due to the rise in elephant poaching statistics in Southern Africa.
