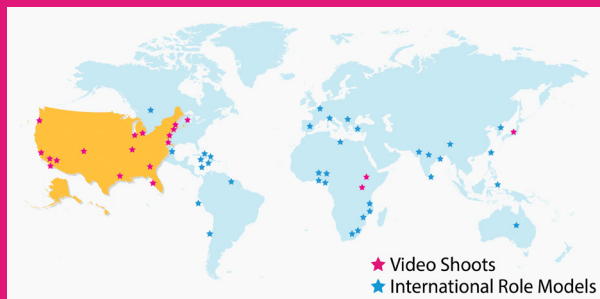

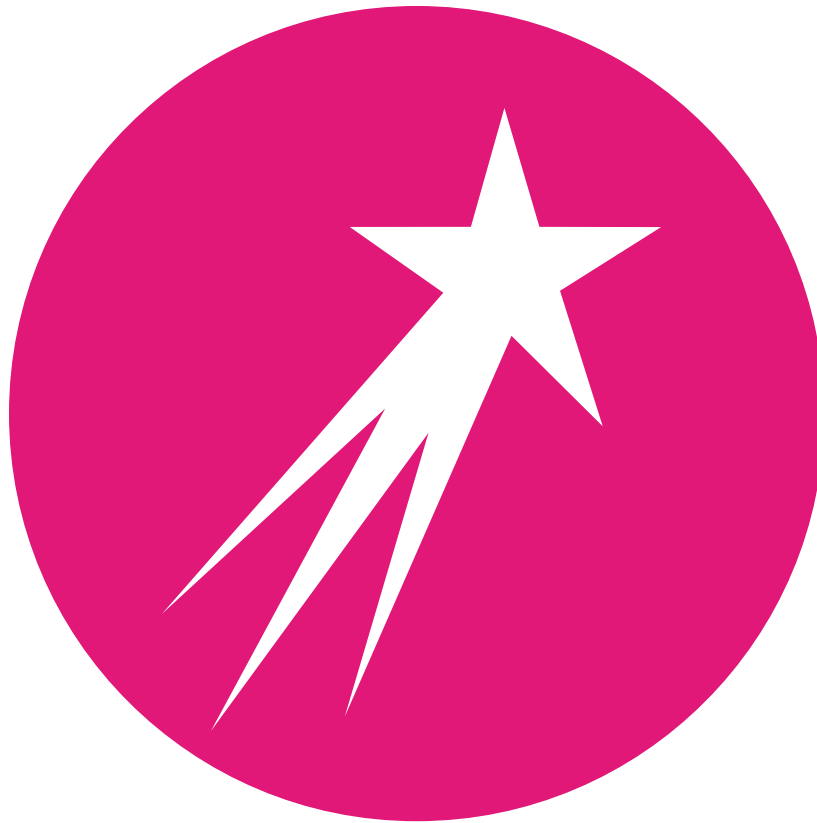
I am beyond grateful for the role models and experts who freely share their knowledge and wisdom with girls and supporters like you who allow us to provide our programs 100% free.
