

In July 2018, HER for Humanity was founded and took action to help children in a community in extreme poverty. As you may already know, a school in rural Haiti lost all of its funding and was in terrible condition. We had very little time to pull resources together to reopen the school and get it on its feet. With the help of many, we not only re-opened the school but improved the standards of the school and the students had a successful academic year. We believe that an education is invaluable and has the power to have a significant impact on all of our lives.

Building Strategy

A quality education is the foundation upon which a sustainable environment may be created and this has been our priority from the start. Quality education empowers the community to develop solutions to their problems and improves quality of life. Our Board meets regularly to discuss and improve the quality of education, the educational environment, and develop a sustainability plan. Our collective skills and experience in education and administration enable us to provide critical insights to the project and the community. We engage in discussions of overall strategy, priorities, and long-term growth opportunities.

Project Planning

The Board collaborated with the leadership at the school, Ecole Marie Claire Heureuse de Milot. Together, the education staff and our Board made plans to obtain essential teaching resources, raise academic standards, and provide teachers with professional development. The creation of leadership roles allowed the school staff to feel support and makes communication with the Board easier.



Creating a Sustainable Culture

To create a culture of sustainability, the school's mission and vision are aligned with sustainability, is supported by the staff, and communicated effectively. The school's physical place is designed to be efficient and reduce waste. Ultimately, in the final phase of the project, programs will be created/small business may allow the school to generate revenues to sustain itself. The lunch program is often the only source of food for some students. Many children go to bed hungry at night. Proper nutrition is part of being healthy and essential for children to be ready to learn.




Resources & Financial Management

Her For Humanity calculated a projected budget for operational costs to save the school and quickly started fundraising and accepting donations towards this cause. During the course of the school year, further planning continued to improve the current conditions of the school, build a new school, and develop a sustainability plan. Resources were very limited so the budget included only the most essential plans until more funds were available.

Strategy Information

HER for Humanity has decided to break the project broken down into several integral parts which will be developed in various phases that will take about 5-10 years to complete. The 4 integral parts of this project include: School Operations, Educational Facilities/Environment, Sustainability Plan/Investment, Organizational Development. Our strategy is to work on all of the integral parts of the projects simultaneously but also prioritize the most essential things first to keep costs low and efficient.

We refer to Phase I as "Survival Mode", being the phase that saves the school from closure and providing teachers and students with the necessary resources to continue the academic year. In Phase 2, "Recovery Mode", we build an educational structure that will last and benefit the community for many years. Lastly in Phase III, "Thrive Mode" further investments are made in the community to empower it so that it may be accountable and self-sustainable. The other integral components of the project will be fully developed and supported by other fundraisers in a fiscally responsible manner.





Impact Story

In September while visiting the school and bringing supplies to the children in Haiti. I remember vividly looking at the grim surrounding environment. There were nearby shacks where people lived. The smell of burning trash in the air coupled with thick the humidity made every breath as thick as bricks. There were little, naked, unaccompanied children running around in the streets playing and laughing, I had tons of little lollipops in my duffle and started to pass them out. Before long, I was surrounded by a sea of little children. The looks on their faces like Christmas morning. Looking around you realize there is so little resources and so much to be done.

A sobering feeling when you realize that the problems of the children and the community do not begin or end with education. The poverty is so severe that the children that attend the school live in these shacks. The shacks do not have electricity, running water, a kitchen or a bathroom. They do not eat on a regular basis. Many people in the town say that there hasn't been any electricity in town for several years.



Our Boys

Outside of the school many children gathered to see what unusual activity was taking place at the school. Many of them completely naked, without clothing or shoes. I noticed 4 boys on the side of the road and inquired what school they went to and why they weren't there today. To my surprise, one the boys responded, "We go to this school". I wondered why they weren't on the inside of the gate and another one of the boy informed me that "clothing and shoes are required to attend school" and at that time they just didn't have anything that they could wear.

This astonishing discovery led Her for Humanity to think about this barrier and others that get in the way of children being educated. The lack of basic human

needs and resources are just as essential as getting an education. We later provided the boys with clothing and shoes to attend school.

We strive every day to provide children with the necessary tools to have a quality education and to spark change that will somehow break the cycle of poverty. We couldn't do this work without generous people like you and we thank you for all your support. We look forward to expanding this project.



Looking Forward





A municipal land was donated to the school by the town of Milot for the purpose of building a school to benefit the community. Since taking over the operations of the school, HER for Humanity has been heavily present and taken steps to bring the school up to code according to the laws. Currently we have authorization to operate from the Ministère de l'Education in Haiti. We intend to continue our efforts to sustain the operations until it is selfsustainable and now we are partnering with Food for the Poor to build a new and up to date school facility as pictured here.
