OUR HISTORY

MBM was founded in 2013 by jazz vocalist and composer, Tamara C. Williams, in response to the need for arts and performance programs made specifically for survivors of trauma.

In 2014, MBM was one of the first organizations selected to work with the South Bronx as part of the inaugural year of NeON Arts, a partnership between Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute and the NYC Department of Probation.

Since then, MBM has partnered with domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, hospitals, juvenile justice centers, and state agencies across NY/NJ to provide arts recovery programs to traumatized youth and adults. MBM has been in a year-round residency at Children's Village in Dobbs Ferry and Staten Island, NY since the Fall of 2017

In 2019, MBM initiated the Montclair Community Chorus as a vehicle for performing original compositions from our flagship program, the "Sing Your Story" Project, to engage the larger community in discussions about trauma.

MBM creates custom, arts-based workshops to inform communities about trauma.




"Sing Your Story" Project (SYSP)
