OUR APPROACH

Swazi SHEROES focuses on fighting HIV/AIDS through economic empowerment. The goal of SHEROES is to work with young women to build entrepreneurial and workforce skills that translate into viable, sustainable economic opportunities.

Job training and mentoring complemented by mental health support

GOCIAL ENTERPRISE

SHEROES will learn entreprenuership, marketing, and business skills in order to acheive economic independence

MENTORSHIP

Participants return to the program to mentor and coach a next generation of SHEROES
