Project Title: Community Resilience Programme

Project Location: Bidur Municipality, Nuwakot District, Nepal

Project Period: November 2020- November 2021

Project Goals: To build community resilience in the rapidly changing situation of Nepal due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The project will build awareness on health and hygiene practices, create awareness on child and women trafficking. domestic violence and promote sustainable agricultural and environmental protection.

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Project summary: The Community Resilience Programme aims to build community resilience in the rapidly changing situation of Nepal as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The project will provide awareness on health and hygiene practices, the dangers of child/ women trafficking and alcohol abuse, domestic/family violence and promote sustainable agricultural as well as the importance of environmental protection.

Statement of Need: Prior to the pandemic, a large proportion of rural Nepali men worked either in the capital Kathmandu or overseas (in India, the Gulf, Korea and Malaysia) as migrant labourers. Until recently, approximately 25% of Nepal's GDP was comprised of remittances, however this came with a heavy price tag: terrible working conditions and an alarming number of bodies being returned to Nepal in coffins.

COVID-19 resulted in hundreds of thousands of migrant labourers returning to Nepal with no hope of returning back. Not only has this resulted in escalating COVID-19 case numbers but is creating social issues on a scale unknown in Nepal before. Men, who are unaccustomed to living with their wives and children, now find themselves unemployed and tempted by alcohol and domestic violence, under the growing pressures that they now face. Child and women traffickers are known to use such emergency situations to recruit unsuspecting and poverty-stricken victims with hideous results. Land that has been lying fallow for years (due to cheap food imports) now requires agricultural solutions that contribute to increasing self-sustainability. Environmental protection is also critical to conserve soil, waterways and prevent landslides and slips, through proper land management.

Proposed solution: The project will tackle these issues commencing in nine villages of Bidur Municipality, Nuwakot district where FSN is already on the ground working with communities through an early years' education programme. Nuwakot's proximity to Kathmandu makes it an easy target for traffickers and community awareness is poor due to the lack of education in the area. Now, thousands of migrant labourers are returning with little prospect of work.

FSN has developed excellent relations with the communities and with the local elected leader since establishing projects there in 2018. It has also constructed an eco-friendly earthbag built school to replace one that was damaged in the 2015 earthquake. FSN is well placed to work with these communities to bring about long-term sustainable change.

Community Development Clubs will be established in each of the nine villages to be a vehicle for change at the local level. Four community animators from each club will be recruited and trained to mobilise the community, in order to raise awareness. These animators will work under the supervision of an area supervisor who will be trained to oversee the project activities. Animators will be selected based on their enthusiasm and ability to communicate effectively. They will receive an allowance for their work as well as a certificate to show their commitment to community level change. Community animators are likely to be young highly motivated college students or older village leaders who understand the aims of the project.

A number of community events will be organised and held over a one-year period that attract community members of all ages to attend. These will cover the key focus areas of the project. Prior to each event, community animators will promote it widely within their community to ensure maximum participation. They will also follow up events with visits to community members to refresh and encourage positive changes. The events will use different mediums, including street theatre, story-telling and other interactive methodologies that are designed to bring about effective long, term change. Community Development Clubs will be able to compete for an environmentally friendly community award in recognition of best practices. These will be awarded at the end of the year based on set criteria to those villages that have made the greatest behavioural changes over the year. As well as a first prize, runner up prizes will be awarded.

Monitoring and evaluation: Monitoring visits will be made to ensure programme effectiveness and continuation beyond the project period to encourage long term change. A baseline and end of project survey will be carried out as well as an evaluation of project success with recommendations for the future.

Sustainability: This initial pilot project is planned to be rolled out in other parts of Nepal as part of FSN's ongoing commitment to improving the lives of children and their families. The Community Development Clubs will continue to function on an ongoing basis.

Beneficiaries: Community members in 9 villages in Bidur Municipality, Nuwakot including families and the extended community. Total men: 2500, women 2600, youth (18-25) 1500 and children: 2000. Total population: 8,600
