# Context

To complement the Beirut explosion crisis and as an action plan for emergency response, AICA is completing a project of 39 Mental health education sessions for 109 Lebanese and Syrian youth between the ages of 18 and 29, and the topics of the sessions revolved around bullying, peer pressure, positive communication and self-respect.


With the application of hygiene and safety measures COVID-19, while respecting social distance, a number of participants (of 8 Youth in each session) were taken into consideration according to the region, and masks were distributed to all participants, and upon entering the sessions, the temperature was checked in case of infection. Anyone with a fever by the health team participating with us. Youth in need of specialized treatment were also referred to specialized centers through case management.

The Youth in the Burj Hammoud area, in addition to their early marriage, school dropouts, most of them had a state of shock, as they fled the war in Syria to live here a war with a different face and it is psychological, especially after the Beirut explosion, which brought them back memories of fear and insecurity, so there was a need to implement Sessions with them to create a safe space through which they can unload what they conceal inside

# **Activities implementation**

- Activity 1: A need study on the topics that youth people need to determine the session titles
- Activity 2: Preparing for the PSS Content Session:
- Bullying (its definition, forms, types, and how to confront it)
- \*Peers (definition, types, stressors and advice outcomes)
- Self-esteem (the definition of self-esteem and what it takes to self-esteem)
- Positive communication (its definition, elements, and how positive communication can be)
- Activity 3: Presenting a video on self-esteem, in addition to activities within the session, including how to convert a negative trait into a positive trait

- Activity 4: Communication: We reached 109 Youth by coordinating with "Al Hayat" center, and through volunteers from AICA.
- Activity 5: Implementing 39 educational sessions in the field of mental health. Each group includes 8 Youth (109 Youth 12 Lebanese and 97 Syrian refugees) who take all sick precautions such as social distancing, muzzle and hand gel.

#### COVID-19

A person was assigned to take the temperature at the entrance to the center and ask questions that showed whether the beneficiary had symptoms of a COVID-19 infection, the chairs were placed in a way that the distance is 2 meters and a half between chairs, a mask was given, there was a hand sanitizer that was used all the time, Room was sterilized before the start of giving the session, there were visits by the M&E officer to make sure that all the directives were implemented, In addition to the beneficiary satisfaction form, which includes evaluation questions on compliance with protection measures.

After agreeing on the rules of the session, the facilitator begins by giving the key words to encourage the youth to empty and share stories and present a video to discuss the topic of the session in order to extract information from it and give advice.

During the sessions there were frequent expressions that the facilitators tell the reality, they accurately describe the psychological state we are suffering from, and they were calling for an increase in the number of sessions. Among the most prominent lessons that have been mentioned:

"I am very happy that for the first time I am sharing my story without fear. I am relieved to tell about myself."


Among the success stories is a girl who was married at the age of 13 minors without being informed by a man older than her, who is her cousin. She spent her life subjected to physical and verbal violence from her addicted husband who was stealing the expense that his mother sends to buy the drink, she came to the center after he She convinced her husband that she came to get help and money. She is a joy, according to her saying, because for years she has not gone out of her house, which is a tent, and today she sees the rays of the sun and the sky, especially since after the explosion of Beirut she lives in a state of depression as a result of her memory of her escape from the Syrian war She faced a more difficult war here, which is an economic and psychological war, according to her saying. She was always asking for a divorce, but no one from her family would support them because of the bullying that she would be exposed to because she was divorced and because of the shame that would befall her. Her dream was to study and major in computers, she did not live in childhood or adolescence, and after the bombing in Beirut, she feared for her children because she did not want to live the same experience in a country she described as a safe person. Today, she is looking for a shelter outside this country where security and peace would be her demand. the only.

Sessions have helped her in that she knew how to value herself and strengthened her flexibility to be able to cope with the situation she was living in and also helped her to express more freely what was inside so that she could overcome it.

Also another girl came with her sister who was supporting her, since the Beirut bombing, and she does not listen to anyone, thoughts are distracted, she lives in a state of fear. Most of the time spends her time in her room sleeping, during the session she spoke and said: I live in a state of fear, I need help For a specialist, and her sister said that it was the first time after an explosion, she speaks and asks for help.


