

f one lives in a village, the simple solutions stare you in the face. For years the rural youth have left their villages to look for jobs in the cities. For years millions in remote villages have lived in darkness using kerosene, candles torch batteries and wood to provide light. For years paper qualified engineers have come up with expensive centralised solutions to provide light, forgetting Gandhi and his message that decentralisation is the answer, and that people-centred ideas are the only sustainable solutions for India and the world. For years we have looked down on the poor who cannot read and write, as if they are the problem.

We have written off rural women as a part of the problem, instead of perceiving them as a part of the solution. Billions of dollars are spent on "experts" writing studies, offering alternatives, thrusting models on the poor that don't work, because they have not been involved in the planning and implementation, and to think it through.

Enter the Solar Mamas.

Who are they?

Called Solar Mamas by the Prime Minister of India, they are middle aged illiterate women – many of them mothers and grandmothers – who live in non-electrified villages but are rooted in them. They have been selected by their communities to be trained in India, in 6 months, to be solar engineers with financial support under ITEC from the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

Why?

In spite of the billions spent by the experts/ engineers, they have failed to provide clean inexpensive non-polluting light to millions across the developing world. And because there is an urgency to tackle the problem of climate change, using solar energy to provide "clean light" with the help of rural women – Gandhi's Last Man and Woman.





When?

A proven, inexpensive, down-to-earth global model. The first Solar Mama was selected in 2000. Since then over 1700 Solar Mamas have been trained from 96 countries. 1500 villages have been solar electrified and 75,000 houses have benefitted from this programme. A total of 45 million litres of kerosene have been saved from polluting the environment.



Cost

It took 20 years to prove that this Barefoot Model works. It cost 15 million dollars including travel, training, transportation, purchase of solar equipment and installation by the Solar Mamas without any electronic engineers around.

Today, with the foundation laid out, with the outreach established all over the developing world south of the equator, it should be possible to scale up the same impact in 5 years with the same investment.


