(Focus) Masoro Village: March 2021



For Cyaruzine villagers, visiting Masoro is a window ten years back in time: Calling the people of Masoro a village is akin to calling a group of people without a preacher or building a church. What the people of Masoro have is community with each other.

In mid-January of 2021 a call came in from Masoro, a three-year-old Masoro girl was suffering from an infection that was taking her eyesight.

For the people in Masoro living as the Cyaruzinge Villager's do: in 26 brick buildings with 12 square feet of indoor space per person sounds like luxury.



In April of 2020 PSA and HDI personal found a way to ship the people of Masoro and Cyaruzinge Villages donated food. By doing this through correct channels the Masoro people were seen as Covid-19 refugees and have been provided grain to eat by their sector through the many lockdowns.
