FOREWORD

In the difficult year that was 2020, hope for the future was demonstrated by the solidarity and compassion shown by people across the world with those in need. Adyan is proud to have been a part of this, with the We Stand With Beirut project supported by our community. We are grateful to all of our supporters – institutions and individuals – who helped us launch this project just two days following the explosion that shook Beirut, and to run it continually over the past five months. This second summary report will give an overview of the impact of this project during the period of October to December.

The start of 2021 however does not bring much positive news for Lebanon: the socio-economic situation continues to decline, leading to desperate suffering for many. The Covid-19 situation is also getting out of control, with hospitals across the country at capacity. In light of this, at the end of 2020 the Adyan Management and Board took the strategic decision to make humanitarian support an ongoing function of Adyan for the foreseeable future. The We Stand With Beirut project will run as planned until the end of June 2021, and concurrently we will launch a project to support those in need across Lebanon, which will continue after the end of the dedicated We Stand With Beirut initiative.

We hope that you will continue to support our work in this area, and we look forward to further collaborations with people from across Lebanon and internationally. As we look to better days ahead, we remain committed during these extremely challenging times to preserve Lebanon's most valuable asset: its people, and to strive together to preserve diversity, solidarity and human dignity.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

On 4 August at 6.07pm, a warehouse at the Beirut Port containing large quantities of ammonium nitrate exploded, causing devastating loss of life, injuries and widespread damage across Beirut. Adyan, Lebanese Foundation for Diversity, Solidarity, and Human Dignity, has diverted all its energy to standing with people who are suffering by taking action out of social responsibility, as members of a society that has been struck by devastation. Thus, Adyan has committed to launch a project dedicated to helping the afflicted under the title of “We Stand with Beirut.”

The fact that Adyan Foundation had no previous expertise in humanitarian field created an opportunity to initiate several partnerships and collaborations with other organizations, initiatives and individuals in different domains, yet all were aiming to stand with Beirut.

PROJECT OUTCOME MAPPING

AIM

“We Stand With Beirut” emergency response was launched to help people afflicted by the explosion, and to support them through seven Priority areas:

- 1-Advocacy for Solidarity,
- 2- Support for Volunteers,
- 3- Psychosocial support,
- 4- Small Business Rehabilitation,
- 5- House Repairs,
- 6- Food Security & Essential Supplies,
- 7- School and Social Structure Rehabilitation

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVE

To join, through Adyan’s youth, volunteers’, ambassadors’, and families’ networks, as well as through the members of the Forum of Religious Social Responsibility and other community members, volunteering campaigns that aim to secure urgent needs for those affected and to help in removing the rubble and preparing for the restoration phase. To channel international and local support to local initiatives that address the seven priority areas.

INDICATORS

Since August 2020, Adyan Foundation has created several partnerships to achieve the goal of supporting people in the affected area through “We Stand With Beirut”. These partnerships/projects will be listed below in section 3 with more details on each. Another indicator is the ability to attract funding/support and to spend it in the most effective way.

1. ADVOCACY FOR SOLIDARITY

a. Online crowdfunding through Global Giving: In December 2020, Adyan launched a special fundraising appeal via 'GlobalGiving', an international fundraising platform. The appeal aimed to raise funds for children with special needs at Blessed School in Beirut, which was badly damaged by the Beirut explosion. The campaign successful and the targeted fund was raised. (See section 3.7-b).

On 22 December, students at Blessed School organized a Christmas street celebration in the centre of Beirut, filling the neighborhood with joy. Due to the successful campaign, Adyan was also given permanent membership on the GlobalGiving platform. This means we can use the platform for continued crowdfunding and for specialized appeals.

b. The Solidarity in action campaign: Since the beginning of the WSWB project, updates were being shared with donors through the issued newsletters and reports, so that 13 bulletins were issued covering the updates after the blast as well the progress and accomplishments in the different projects WSWB initiative included. Two reports were issued covering the period of 2020, one on Oct. 23rd 2020, and another one covering the progress till December 2020. Reports included stories of impact, numerical data and financial figures as well as testimonials of people (beneficiaries and volunteers), a final narrative and financial report will be issued at the end of the project covering the entire project duration.

During the period of project implementation, a total of 10,000 USD was spent on issuing newsletters, films and other media productions to highlight and support the work done in several projects and their impact. Moreover, till end of 2021, an amount of 49,333 USD is dedicated for a social media campaign to highlight what has been accomplished in WSWB and its impact as well as promoting for "Solidarity in action" the continuation of Adyan's humanitarian work in Lebanon.



2. SUPPORT FOR VOLUNTEERS

a. Support for ‘Have a Dream’ volunteers: Adyan foundation provided support; transportation and accommodation for 25 Egyptian volunteers part of the Have a Dream team who came to Lebanon to help in clean up and repair.

b. Adyan Volunteers clean-up work: As well as the funding support from partners, many others have offered their time and energy to stand with Beirut. We are deeply grateful and proud that these volunteers so quickly mobilized to express their solidarity with affected people. A number of Adyan network members participated in the clean-up work in the areas affected by the explosion. Some of the work was cleaning off the glass from Burj Hammoud Street and putting them in bags for recycling, cleaning up the debris from four houses in the Karantina Area as well as distributing food and drinks to over 100 volunteers in the Geitawi area.

c. The social kitchen (Nation Station): Since September 2020, Nation Station has been delivering free meals to vulnerable families in Geitawi. In this project, the idea is to turn this activity into a social business, able to sustain over time.

The Social Kitchen is a potential business model that Nation Station will be adopting to secure sustainability. In partnership with Adyan, Fondation de France and Mada, makesense supported the core team at Nation Station through creating the concept of the social kitchen, map and set up a retro-planning of the activities, and make sure we have the right competencies in the team to ensure efficiency and help overcome challenges.

“Makesense has contributed immensely to our day-to-day operations, facilitating and providing accessibility for volunteers. They were able, through guidance and support from Makesense, to contribute in daily kitchen operations (delivery, cooking, and packing) as well as household assessments. We have been able to rely on them through many occasions, which allowed us to grow.

Makesense also provided support to Nation Station through workshops; which allowed us to grow individually as team members, and collectively as a group. We hope to continue side by side in this journey of sustainable help and entrepreneurship.”

3. PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

a. IDRAAC Institute for Development, Research, Advocacy and Applied Care:

Project description: The project consisted of providing Psychiatric and Psychological first aid Assessment and support in addition to Psychiatric and Psychological treatment with follow-up sessions to the most vulnerable and at-risk persons affected by the Beirut Blast. A fund of \$42,000 from 'We Stand With Beirut' was dedicated to this project.

Achievements: over the course of 6-month starting from December 2020, IDRAAC was providing first aid assessment and support for 200 individuals, in addition to psychiatric and psychological treatment and follow-up sessions, face-to-face support and evidence-based treatment - for 60 individuals.

The total number of direct beneficiaries of this project is the following:

For the psychiatric and psychological first aid activity, total of 200 consultations for mental health patients (98 female, 102 male) were provided by senior psychiatrists from IDRAAC.

For the psychiatric and psychological treatment activity, total of 60 persons (33 female, 27 male) benefited from Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) provided by psychologists and psychiatrist from IDRAAC. Each beneficiary was provided with 10 therapy sessions.

I had chronic issues and the blast did not help me, and following the blast, I got COVID as well so I have a lot of stressors and the doctor helped me a lot in overcoming my current state. b. Embrace: Embrace is a Lebanese NGO that works to raise awareness about mental health and suicide across Lebanon through yearly national campaigns and direct outreach and awareness efforts in all areas of the country.

It runs the Embrace Lifeline, the first national emotional support and suicide prevention helpline in Lebanon.

Project description: To meet the urgent mental health needs of individuals affected by the explosion, Adyan collaborated and supported Embrace to support its “Mental Health & Trauma Response to Beirut Explosion” project.

Achievements: Adyan’s support contributes to increasing the hotline’s operating hours – so gradually became available 24/7 – and providing psychological and psychiatric consultations to individuals impacted by the Beirut explosion.

Between October 2020 and April 2021, Embrace lifeline upwards of 6000 calls (50% Males; 50% Females) between ages 18 to 34, with most frequent cited reason to be emotional distress. 2240 free mental health consultations were offered in the form of, individual psychotherapy sessions, psychiatric consultations, group support sessions, and social work services. The 337 beneficiaries helped in Embrace clinics were mostly females with age range between 18 and 34.

c. Beirut Blast memorial wall: An initiative by Ms. Carla Karam (a specialist in mediation, child protection and nonviolent communication), that Adyan supported through to show solidarity and support to victims’ families by creating a memorial of the Beirut blast on August 4, 2020 in order to remember the victims and destruction the explosion caused as well as to spread messages of peace, healing, and to demand for justice. This memorial wall was created to be a space to express families’ feelings and mourning and to remind passers-by the location of the incident.

The wall is 500 meters long, facing the port of Beirut with drawings that shows reflections of the destroyed city, justice, symbolic drawings for different monuments related to the explosion, sayings of family members they wished to be on the wall, in addition to aluminum photos portraits of the victims placed along the wall. Ms. Karam gathered a team of artists, volunteers, and got the support and guidance of Adyan Foundation, altogether made it possible to create the wall. The duration for implementing the project started on April 4, 2021 and launched on June 4, 2021 in the presence of victims’ families, media outlets and public.

d. Toy distribution for children in Karantina area: An initiative by Afaf Khalil, member in Adyan ambassador’s network- in collaboration with Muslim Scouts and Al Jinan University. The initiative aimed to emotionally support children living in the area affected by the blast through providing them with bags that included coloring books and pencils, lego, puzzles and brochures on how to deal with trauma prepared by the WHO and the National Health Committee that help children recover emotionally, express their feelings, maintain their emotional wellbeing. Children were divided into 3 age groups with specific type of toys for each. 155 bags were distributed to 52 families living in Karantina area (102 Females and 73 males).

e. Migrant Workers stuck in Lebanon: The financial crisis that hit Lebanon affected not just the Lebanese but also expats residing and working in Lebanon with no laws that protect them or guarantee that their employer gives them any entitlements. This was the case of 35 Ghanaian girls who lost their jobs and could not afford to buy tickets and were simply in limbo living day by day at the door of their consulate. In April 2021, Adyan foundation in collaboration with other NGOs took on the challenge of showing these girls and women some human dignity and empathy, by providing them with the legal, technical and financial assistance they needed to return home including: General security clearance, mental support, tickets, PCR tests, and some pocket money.



4. SMALL BUSINESS REHABILITATION

a. Agonist coffee shop: This coffee shop was one of the shops repaired in partnership with DLR to re-operate again. Founded by Dr. Wassim El Hage, this coffee shop is special; it employs individuals with special needs giving them a chance to shine. It is an inclusive space that embraces people with special needs, understands their worth and breaks the negative stereotypes about them in Lebanese society. In addition, support was given to DLR for the renovation of Christian Art Workshop where broken doors, aluminum and glass were fixed.

b. Rise Up Lebanon: To address the massive damage to small businesses, Adyan is collaborating with “Rise Up Lebanon” to provide emergency support to the most vulnerable small businesses (those with up to 4-6 employees), to help them repair their only source of income and become operational again as soon as possible. To date, repair operations have been completed in 52 small businesses in Geitawi area, including clothing shops, beauty salons, grocery shops, pet food and supplies shops, snack shops/ restaurants and other. The work mainly included glass and aluminum repairs, electrical restoration, wall painting and false ceiling constructions (faux plafond).

c. Makesense: In December, an additional fund from “Fondation des Cedres” was dedicated to repairing shops through Make Sense. Adyan supported the repair operations of 15 small businesses in Geitawi area, including clothing shops, food and supplies shops and snack shops. An amount of this fund was directed towards “Rise Up” Lebanon to continue their constructions.



5. HOUSE REPAIRS

a. Adyan's Network for Inclusive Citizenship and Spiritual Solidarity members volunteered in affected areas to undertake house repairs. Only few days after the blast in collaboration with **Beb W Shebbek**, 23 houses and 2 shops were repaired in the areas of Corniche El Mazraa, Sin El Fil, Burj Hammoud and Mar Mkhayel. The work included painting walls and repairing doors and windows.

b. Forum for Religious Social Responsibility (FRSR) members, started their response initiatives and partnerships to support house repairs. From October to December, in collaboration with the **Muslim Scouts**, they have carried out glass repairs in 96 houses. They also repaired Seven Skies business, and provided kits containing first aid supplies and COVID-19 prevention materials (masks, sanitizers and gloves) to their volunteers on the ground. Forum members also partnered with **Dialogue for Life and Reconciliation (DLR)**, the Maronite archbishopric of Beirut, and the Sustainable Network of Religious Leaders in the North to repair. They covered repair costs for both houses and contributed to home appliances and a bedroom for children in the house in Karantina. Furthermore, they provided spiritual support for the afflicted families. Repair operations have been completed in both houses, and a bedroom and a living room were provided for a third house.

"Our initiative was, and still is, a pioneering one since it helped create a solid and sustainable network for more than 30 religious leaders in the North so they can work together to break the stereotypes and prejudices of their own communities and build interactive bridges of communication among themselves. The Forum and network members continuously work together to widen their impact and to witness positive changes within their own families and small communities." – Dr. Ziad Fahed & Sheikh Firas Ballout, October 13, 2020.

Furthermore, a member of Forum (Mohammad Al Arab) took action to support families affected by Tareek Al Jdeedi explosion which happened in the basement of a building when fuel container exploded resulting massive damage in the building and its surrounding. Affected people were provided with parcels of essential items and hygiene materials.

6. FOOD SECURITY & ESSENTIAL SUPPLIES

a. Mariam Kitchen (soup kitchen): A soup kitchen concept that was started by Forum for Religious Social Responsibility (FRSR) member (Father Hani Tawk) in collaboration with Shelsh group under the NGO Jouzourouna, in the area of Karatina. The kitchen cooks and serves 700 up to 1000 meals per day. Adyan is supported the kitchen with the costs of food supplies and materials until the end of October. This includes funds to procure serving dishes, a meat chopper, and meat in order to provide non-vegetarian meals via the soup kitchen. Adyan has also provided the kitchen with a **food dryer** to minimize raw food waste and save time, as well as a **vacuum machine** for packaging food, which helps preserving food lifetime.

“The kitchen is open to anyone from all cultures, nationalities, ethnicities, ages, and religions.” – Father Hani Tawk

b. Food parcels distribution: Members of the Forum for Religious Social Responsibility (FRSR), led by Elie Karash and Kassem Kassir in collaboration with **Liqaa Convention Center**, Conflict Resolution Group and Saint Joseph Parish, packaged and distributed food parcels to 170 families affected by the blast in Bourj hammoud, Dawra and Mdawwar areas of Beirut.

c. Medicine Distribution: Since 31 August, Members of the Forum for Religious Social Responsibility (FRSR), led by Jessica Abou Haidar, started initiatives to secure and distribute medicine for affected individuals with long-term illnesses. The aim is to cover the costs of medications for chronic diseases for one month. In collaboration with the NGO **Chreek** and **Foi et Lumiere**, 272 medicines were distributed to 95 patients with chronic diseases in Rmeil and Mar Mkhayel areas of Beirut – distribution is supervised by professional medical staff.



7. SCHOOL AND SOCIAL STRUCTURE REHABILITATION

Through “We Stand With Beirut” initiative, Adyan foundation cared to support education by considering schools and social structure rehabilitation as one of the areas of support in Beirut. Several initiatives were done either through Adyan Networks members - such as repair works of St. Elias Cathedral in Down Town Beirut, St. Charles School in Ashrafieh and Blessed School - or through creating partnerships with other NGOs who had programs focusing on Education like Dialogue for Life and Reconciliation DLR.

a. After School Support (DLR)

A project by Dialogue for Life and Reconciliation (DLR) starting an online tutoring program for students residing in Gemmayzeh, Mar Mikhael and Karantina as well as other areas affected by the explosion. The program included 75 students, 1,530 tutoring hours over 6 months, and 35 tutors for subjects like Arabic, English, French, Chemistry, Biology, Physics and Math.

Furthermore, 16 youth participants from “Active Citizen – Strengthening resilience” project in partnership with the British Council contributed to the relief work through WSWB, 12 of them participated in this program as tutors and were highly committed.

The extra miles:

- Purchase of Tablets and UPS devices to help students who could not afford and the power cuts.
- Virtually Gathering students and tutors from different backgrounds and cultures
- Provided emotional support for the students.
- Experiencing solidarity through mutual support as well as spiritual solidarity that takes over cultural differences in times of crises.

b. Blessed School for Children with Special need:

The initiative covered curtain repairs in the administration building, toys for the playground, in addition to the repair of specialized room for children with autism.

In addition to that, a fund was raised through Global Giving crowdfunding platform to provide Blessed School students with Christmas gifts, that included tablets and educative tool and school supplies.

“When people ask me if Adyan, in general, and the Forum in particular, is a Christian or a Muslim group, it brings joy to my heart to say that it is a God-related group, full of humanity and respect for others regardless of their backgrounds, beliefs, and belongings” – Linda Macktaby, October 13th, 2020.

c. St. Charles School: A school in Ashrafieh area that was affected by Beirut Blast. The school is semi free and has two sections, kindergarten and elementary. The school has 800 students with diverse religious backgrounds and nationalities. The school supports poor families, families with domestic violence, divorced parents; some even live in extreme poverty. Through WSWB initiative **50 tablets** were provided to help students to have better learning conditioned with remote teaching, in addition to donating a copier and an LCD projector.

SUSTAINABILITY



Adyan is a Foundation for diversity, solidarity and human dignity. Since it was established, the scope of work has been defined to be working locally, regionally and internationally to promote for pluralism, inclusive citizenship, community resilience, and spiritual solidarity, through homegrown solutions in Education, Media, Policy, and intercultural and interreligious relations. Throughout the 15 years of being a socially responsible entity in the Lebanese community, Adyan has always shows ability to respond to circumstances and changes in a way that best serves the needs of the community.

End of 2019, the idea of beginning humanitarian work was a subject under discussion at the board level in Adyan. Nearly mid-2020, viewing the deteriorating economic and social situation in Lebanon, board members saw that it was time for Adyan to take a step forward in the humanitarian field to support the Lebanese community. There were a strong will and belief that Adyan's values of diversity, solidarity and human dignity can be promoted and put in action to stand with Lebanon through the unprecedented hard times, and the fact that Adyan is not specialized in humanitarian and relief work shouldn't be a barrier.

The trust Adyan has earned from international donors throughout years of its activity was an inducement to step into humanitarian field. The board decision was to collaborate through creating partnerships with organizations that work in this field and have expertise in it, and at the same time, it would be a chance for Adyan members to gain experience and officially adopt and continue with human solidarity work in future.

After the Beirut Blast on August 4, 2020, Adyan Foundation diverted all its energy to stand with people of Beirut who suffered from the explosion. For this reason, the 'We Stand With Beirut' project was launched and dedicated to support people through the 7 priority areas.

One year after the blast, 'We Stand With Beirut' has come to its end, but it is the start of a new journey for Adyan in living the human solidarity. "Solidarity in Action" is the continuation of Adyan in humanitarian work to reach all Lebanese areas, where people are suffering from economic, financial and social problems.

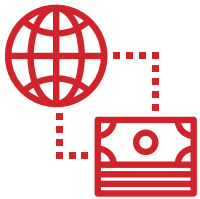
