### A REPORT ON CYCLONE FREEDY RESPONSE BY ABUNDNACE WORLD WIDE

## 1.0 Introduction

The most severe cyclone to make landfall in Malawi in the past 12 months was Cyclone Freddy.

It's devastating effects were felt and experienced in many districts of the southern Malawi such as Nsanje, Chikwawa, Thyolo, Blantyre, Mwanza, Mulanje, Phalombe and Zomba while Chiradzulu, Neno (Fig 2) and lakeshore districts had mild impacts.

In many areas of these districts, the commonest impact was flash flooding especially coming from hills (whose trees had been cut down due to illegal settlement), mudslides (which was a rare happening to most people in Malawi),



and of course fast abrasive winds. Consequently, many roads were rendered impassable, bridges got cut off, houses got washed away including crops, animals and sadly many people also lost their lives. DoDMA's final figures indicate over 1,000 people were dead and over 500,000 displaced as their homes got destroyed.

# 2.0 Cyclone Freddy in Mbando

Like in many places in southern region, Mbando community in Machinga district where Abundance operates, 63 households were heavily affected through houses that were destroyed. On 15<sup>th</sup> April Abundance Team travelled to Mbando to distribute relief items that were bought through funds that were donated to Abundance. For those present see Annex 1.

#### 2.1 Relief Items Distribution Exercise

The Moderator Moses Phulusa welcome people present and asked a volunteer to say an opening prayer. A young lady said the prayer and preached about" Hope and remembrance of God amidst disaster".

Welcome remarks were made by both Snr Group VH Mbando and TA Mposa. Clifford Manthama was asked to say few remarks before the chiefs were given the floor. He expressed deep sadness on the loss of livelihood and property for the villagers. He gave the background to the donation that came through Abundance. The Trustees and other well-wishers through Global Giving. Communities were asked to make use of the residual moisture in all areas that water flooded and now still wet.

Snr GVH Mbando appreciated the Abundance gestures and requested TA Mposa to address the audience in details. TA Mposa explained that

- Cyclone Freddy had devastated the area like many other areas in southern Malawi.
- As part of disaster management 13 camps have been created to accommodate those people that have been displaced in TA Mposa.
- A total of 2,903 households have been affected with a total of 11,633 people. Of these 733 are men and 10,900 are women.
- The Traditional Authority stressed that even though these are the numbers being housed in camps many more people have been affected and are have sought shelter with relatives.
- Since the disaster happened Dodma has been able to provide food relief to the various camps but those that opted to find shelter with relatives have not been reached out to. These are the people Abundance reached to.
- A total of 63 households were reached (Annex 2). They have been assisted
  with food stuff; flour, cooking oil, sugar, salt, soya pieces and Bonya (small
  dry fish) and washing soap. Several meters of black roofing sheet were also
  procured to aide those who will be rebuilding their homes.
- Lake Chirwa is so full of water beyond the levels that the population has ever seen before. The trading centers closer to the lake are all now submerged under water, destroying infrastructures such as maize mills, shops and road networks.
- The population expected the waters to recede but now it seems it has come to stay beyond previous locations.

- It is also disheartening to note that Mposa 's main cash crop which is rice has been washed away in torrent floods. People usually use money from rice sales to buy maize for food. With less rice anticipated to be harvested there are higher possibilities of hunger occurrence. However, the chief said that use of residual moisture would be encouraged what would be needed is support in terms of inputs such as seed and fertilizers and manure.
- On a happier note since the lake is now full there has been a boom in fishing businesses a s the fish population has gone up. With a lot of planktons and other fish feeds available the fishes are also of bigger size.
- There was also concern as to what was going to happen to the camps as schools opened on the 17th of April 2023, which means that camps have to be dismantled. The big question is "Where will the people when they do not have homes rebuilt yet?".
- Both chiefs echoed their thanks and appreciation to Abundance tor this timely gesture to come in and help and save lives. The TA asked the Abundance representatives to carry the vote of thanks to the Trustees and Dr. Deepa Pullankatil for the relief items.

Meeting ended with a prayer.
