## Rainforest Partnership Linking People to People for a Sustainable Future

In celebration of our efforts, the City of Austin proclaimed the week of November 5th-12th 2009, Rainforest Partnership Week. Rainforest Partnership, launched in 2007 and located in Austin, is the only Texasbased nonprofit focused on reducing tropical deforestation and raising awareness of its effects on global climate change.

Our team partners with Latin American rainforest communities to develop and implement sustainable means of earning an income. When trees are more valuable standing, rainforest lands are preserved.

During the Global Climate Conference in Copenhagen in December 2009, we met with climate change experts and rainforest preservation organizations from around the world. The resounding consensus? Global acknowledgement of the importance of rreducing emissions from deforestation and forest degradation (REDD). Rainforest Partnership's approach, based on community level focus and cross-national partnerships, is an essential part of a comprehensive solution to solve this critical issue.

## Chipaota, Peru

In 2009, with donations from Rainforest Partnership supporters, we successfully partnered with the community of Chipaota in the Peruvian Amazon.

Together, we conserved 9,000 acres by creating a management plan to sustainably harvest the principal economic asset of the community — fiber of the Piassaba Palm growing in their forest. To ensure long-term sustainability, we established a community-run business comprised of 84 community members to harvest and market this palm fiber in new ways.

We now work with a group of 15 women artisans from the community to produce traditional handicrafts and utensils from seeds, fibers and vines from this land. Rainforest Partnership provides local workshops on the production and marketing of these goods and is currently evaluating opportunities to bring these products to the international market.

### Sani Isla, Ecuador

In traditional societies of the Amazon Basin, women are excluded from most income-producing activities. However, after much deliberation the indigenous community of Sani Isla proposed an idea that featured a traditional woman's job — Kichwa arts and crafts.

Rainforest Partnership is partnering with the Ecuadorian nonprofit Conservación y Desarrollo to provide education and training and build an "art studio" that provides women with a place to work together, exchange ideas and experiences, and sell their products to visitors from the community's nearby ecolodge and other markets. These crafts use natural forest materials such as seeds and fibers, which can be grown between rows of cacao on pre-cultivated land. This allows the community to harvest multiple crops from the pre-cultivated area, prevent further deforestation, and improve their quality of life.



## **Pampa Kermosa, Peru**

The Pampa Hermosa community in central Peru recently prohibited the collection of butterflies and orchids, hunting of birds and bears, extraction of wood, and cutting and burning of forests for pasture. The decision to conserve their cloudforest and its treasures gives them the opportunity to be a significant "ecotravel" destination and offer tourists accessible waterfalls and a diversity of wildlife unique to this region.

To help the community of Pampa Hermosa maximize their potential, Rainforest Partnership provides training and tools to construct sustainable infrastructure that will help support the influx of tourists, build the economy, and protect greater amounts of forest land.


