2021 was truly a year of hope and resilience. Just when we thought things were getting better in March 2021, we were hit with the devastating second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic. We were faced with a familiar situation. Once again, we had to mobilise our team to conduct ration distribution and engage with children online. However, we used our learnings from the first wave of the pandemic to do an even better job this time around. Since 2020, we have distributed **8382** food kits in Mumbai and our villages in Karnataka. We distributed footballs to every child in our programme so they can stay engaged at home and practise online drills and activities that we designed for them. We opened 4 more Digital Learning Centres where **876 kids** stayed connected with school and had access to computers.

We also started a clinic for residents in the community. As vaccines became available, we addressed vaccine hesitancy to dispel rumours and myths and mobilised parents for vaccination in our urban and rural communities.

Once things got better, our team swiftly resumed sessions with COVID safety protocols in place. In addition to resuming sessions in our existing locations, we also expanded to new locations in both Mumbai and Karnataka with **2910 children** now participating in our football sessions weekly. We organised a number of events and tournaments to mobilise and engage with beneficiaries post COVID restrictions were eased. We welcomed a new cohort of Young Leaders in Mumbai and Karnataka who will help deliver football and life skills sessions across our **32 communities**.

# FOREWORD



We also supported our coaches in earning their **D-License coaching** badges, a key step in improving the quality of delivery of our football sessions. Anita, an OSCAR beneficiary who represented us in the UK and Denmark was selected to play for India and will soon prepare to play the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup to be held later this year. Lastly, we have strengthened the organisation by forming committees for Prevention of Sexual Harassment (PoSH) and Child Safeguarding. We have integrated innovative technologies into our systems; Upshot for beneficiary tracking, HR One for a smooth employee experience and ERP4Impact to streamline donor management. I am also pleased to say that we

successfully renewed our FCRA licence which will greatly contribute to our financial sustainability in the coming years. For me, the above are milestones, signs of real growth and adaptability to change even in the most adverse circumstances. OSCAR has had the support of its amazing staff, Young Leaders, partner organisations, funders, individual donors, trustees, advisors, volunteers and well wishers who have believed in the work we do and stepped up when the community needed them the most. I hope you enjoy reading this report and are able to gain an understanding of what OSCAR stands for. Once again, I would like to thank everyone who supported us through this rollercoaster journey.





## FOOTBALL & LIFE SKILLS



OSCAR Foundation believes that the core values inherent in football, are principles necessary for community development. Based on our 'No School, No Football' policy, OSCAR Foundation provides football and life skills sessions to children from underprivileged backgrounds on the condition that they attend school regularly.

In Mumbai, our sessions operate at **20** locations reaching out to **2342** children and in Karnataka, we reach out to **568** children across **12** villages in the Yadgir and Gulbarga districts.

## Special Projects



### ENABLING CHANGE

'Enabling Change' is our disability inclusion project aimed at helping children with disabilities participate in football and life skills sessions in a safe environment. We deliver specially designed activities keeping in mind their needs.



### OSCAR ELITE FOOTBALL

The OSCAR Elite Football Project is a unique project that gives talented young football players in Mumbai an opportunity to compete in All India Football Federation's (AIFF) youth leagues. Any talented child irrespective of their financial background is welcome to attend our open trials with the best players selected to represent our teams across various age groups. This project is in partnership with Soccer School of Excellence (SSE)



### KICK LIKE A GIRL

Our 'Kick Like A Girl' project advocates for gender equity in polarised low-income communities. We encourage girls to challenge preconceived roles of women in society and educate them about their freedoms. We conduct multiple trainings for female Young Leaders who then implement their learnings with young girls through a gender life-skills curriculum.

I played football for the first time at OSCAR when I was 10 years old. I did not know much about football but I eagerly looked forward to the football sessions every week as I was excited to develop my skills and technique. The highlight for me was going to Denmark, being chosen as team captain and winning the Dana Cup with my OSCAR teammates. It gave me great confidence and opened so many opportunities for me. I am grateful to OSCAR for their constant support.



Priya (17) is from our Ambedkar Nagar community in Mumbai. She was recently selected to play for the Maharashtra U18 Women's Team. She is an inspiration and role model to hundreds of children in her community.

# EDUCATION



## DIGITAL LEARNING CENTRES

Our Digital Learning Centres (DLCs) promote digital literacy and provide access to computers for children living in low-income communities. OSCAR is committed to bridging the digital divide by offering a number of courses across age groups including a certification by the National Institute for Information Technology.

We have also distributed tablets to 200 children across our communities who were especially vulnerable during the pandemic in an effort to address the learning gaps caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

### COMPOSING FUTURES

'Composing Futures : Music for Good' is a project by Community Organized Relief Effort (CORE), Music Heals International (MHI) and OSCAR Foundation that uses music as a tool to bring about positive change in the lives of children. 45 children currently benefit from this project.



### CHILD SPONSORSHIP

OSCAR Foundation's Unnati Child Sponsorship Project supports the most vulnerable children in our programme by sponsoring their academic needs, football and life-skills sessions and computer classes. Through this, we have provided holistic support to 110 children from underserved communities.



# YOUNG LEADERS



## YOUNG LEADERS

The Young Leaders Programme is a key 'football for development' initiative that is the foundation for the sustainability of our cause. Youth from low-income communities including previous OSCAR beneficiaries are identified and trained to work with children from underprivileged communities in order to build and create community leaders and role models to support future generations.

OSCAR Foundation also helps develop the employability of Young Leaders by conducting workshops, organising exposure visits and providing opportunities for internships.

### Programme Highlights

- In-person training conducted for 60 Young Leaders from Karnataka and Mumbai
- Young Leaders helped expand our programme to new communities in Mumbai and Karnataka
- Sessions on topics like self-esteem, self-awareness, mindfulness, gratitude, courage and confidence were delivered through our Buland initiative
- Young Leaders identified and distributed ration to families during the second wave of the pandemic

# PROGRAMME



Karan, a Young Leader from Karnataka, was recognised as one of the best Young Leaders at the Cityzens Giving Summit. He was also awarded the Karnataka Khel Ratna in Bangalore and the Prajavani New Achiever's Award in Gulbarga. He was also gifted a signed Phil Foden jersey by Manchester City for mobilising children from villages for football and life skills sessions.

Since the last 5 years, Ankit has used our football sessions as a platform to encourage underserved children to pursue their education. He was invited to share his journey at TEDxYouth@HFSI. He spoke about his life, journey in sport for development and his acting career.



Zoya, a senior Young Leader won the Beyond Sport Courageous Use of Sport Award presented by WWE. Her efforts in mobilising young girls for football and life skills sessions were appreciated by the international sports for development community.

Our Young Leaders won the Goals for Girls #PitchforChange award for their efforts in generating awareness on the importance of female participation in sport. They enrolled 50 girls through this awareness campaign.



# ACTIVITY UPDATES



## Vaccination Facilitated for Parents of OSCAR Beneficiaries

OSCAR extensively worked on vaccine hesitancy and subsequently facilitated vaccinations for nearly 2200 parents of our beneficiaries in Mumbai and at our Yadgir and Gulbarga locations in rural Karnataka. This helped keep our beneficiaries and youth safe from COVID.



## Footballs Distributed to all Children in our Programme

2000 Footballs were distributed to children across our football programme during the COVID pandemic to encourage them to improve their skills at home and not venture outside during curfews and lockdowns. The children were engaged in physical activity which reduced screen time.



## Resumption of Sessions

After an 18 month break, we resumed football and life skills sessions once COVID restrictions were eased. Our sessions were welcomed by parents and children alike who were eager to see the programme up and running. We received plenty of interest from other communities and have expanded to a few new locations.

## In-person training conducted for Karnataka and Mumbai Young Leaders

We conducted offline residential training for over 60 new Young Leaders from rural Karnataka and Mumbai. We were amazed by the enthusiasm and energy of our Young Leaders who have already mobilised and are operating batches across our locations.



## Project Buland Young Leader Training

The Buland project was designed to encourage youth to reflect on themselves and view the world around them with compassion and empathy. Our participants attended sessions on topics like self-esteem, self-awareness, mindfulness, gratitude, and courage. They later implemented their learnings on the field.



## Exposure Visits for Children

Through our Helping Hand initiative, we arrange exposure visits for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. In 2021-22, we took children for an open bus Mumbai city tour and organised a screening of 'Jhund', a film on football for development. Such exposure gives kids a chance to experience the simple joys of life. We are grateful to Helping Hand members for their support.



# ACTIVITY UPDATES



## OSCAR International Teams Reunion

We held a reunion for our boys and girls team that travelled to foreign lands. They met with Ashok, our founder and Lucinda who facilitated the OSCAR Schools Tour in the United Kingdom. It was a wonderful moment to reflect on their journeys and progress.



## OSCAR Elite U-16 Team Win Player's League

Our U-16 OSCAR Elite team played in the Player's League tournament and won the final. It was a great indication of the progress made by our talented footballers. We were also glad to hold open trials to form teams across different age groups.



## Field Trainings for Staff

We conducted a number of trainings on field for our staff. The topics included designing activities and implementation of a life skills assessment scale with Dream a Dream. Our coaches also earned their AIFF D License coaching badges.

## Karnataka Parents Festival

We hosted parents' festival for parents of our beneficiaries in rural Karnataka. 450 parents across 12 villages attended the festivities and participated in a number of fun activities and games.



## Child Safeguarding and Capacity Building

We conducted a number of trainings for staff and young leaders to boost implementation of our child safeguarding policies. An interactive child safeguarding training and first aid training was held. We also conducted a Prevention of Sexual Harassment (POSH) training.



## OSCAR Celebrates Women's Day in Mumbai and Rural Karnataka

We celebrated Women's Day with over 600 mothers and girls in our Mumbai and rural Karnataka locations. Over two days, we conducted fun activities, games, workshops on financial literacy and much more. We received a wonderful response from the mothers.





## BRIMFUL OF ASHA

The ASHA (hope) project is a pilot project in our child sponsorship initiative where children are given long-term support till they complete their graduation. Out of the first 10 beneficiaries of this project, 5 are children with disabilities and the remaining have been identified based on need and potential.



# OF THE YEAR



Through ASHA, the school, tuition and OSCAR programme expenses of the children are covered in addition to need based expenses that might arise. We have covered the cost of rent, ration supplies and medication in 2021 due to the complications caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

In an effort to improve the quality of life of the children with disabilities in our project, we have sponsored the fitting of hearing aids for 5 children who have hearing and speech impairments. After these hearing aids were fitted, we have seen a drastic improvement in their ability to listen, speak and keep up with their education.

As most children have missed out on their academics during the pandemic due to a variety of reasons including disability, lack of access to devices and internet, financial circumstances etc., we have provided them with tablets and the necessary tools for them to bridge the knowledge gap caused by the disruption of the pandemic. We have also distributed footballs, books, stationery and raincoats for all children.


We are thrilled with the work that has been done in the maiden year of this project and hope to expand soon to more children in need with the support of like minded well wishers.



# COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORT

The last two years have been particularly difficult due to COVID-19. With an especially devastating second wave of infections that brought life to a stand still in April 2021, we were yet again faced with a number of familiar problems. People in our communities were without work, children were out of school and more importantly, families were at risk of not being able to procure basic food supplies to sustain themselves. We are proud to announce that over the last two years, we were able to distribute 8382 ration kits to people in need. We also worked extensively on vaccine hesitancy and menstrual health and hygiene in low-income communities.





While she was always a bright student and a good athlete, she was restricted due to the lack of opportunities available. With the guidance of her coach, Mahek has become a good footballer, improving her passing, dribbling and tackling. She is also very comfortable with computers now and can use a number of softwares like Microsoft Office and Scratch. Mahek has become a role model in her community as she has wonderful leadership qualities which have greatly benefitted OSCAR in reaching out to more children in her community.

Mahek's mother has been very impressed with the positive changes she has noticed in her daughter. She shared that Mahek's confidence has soared to a level beyond her imagination. She is impressed by the impact that our life skills sessions have had as Mahek regularly discusses her life goals, ambitions and takes initiatives independently.





She was not attending school regularly and was not interested in her studies. However, after her coaches explained the importance of education, there was a change in her behaviour. Once she was informed by her coaches that she can attend sessions only if she is regular at school, she started taking her academics seriously. She started completing her school work on time and would also help her parents with household chores and errands. Her coaches have also helped her develop her football skills. She is a quick learner and excellent with the ball. Renukamma eagerly looks forward to playing football every week.

Saniya (15) has been with OSCAR for the last two years. While she was a regular student, Saniya often found it difficult to manage her time and also had an anger problem. After joining OSCAR, she learnt about time management from her coach and has greatly improved on these skills which help her find a good balance between school, tuitions and football. She has also developed her communication skills after attending our life skills sessions and often resolves her own conflicts calmly. She has learnt how to pass, dribble and also shoot! At our digital learning centre, Saniya has learnt Microsoft Office which helps her complete her school work. It has been a great help for her, as she found it challenging to complete her homework and attend classes on her phone. Saniya enjoys attending OSCAR sessions because she feels it's a safe place for her to express herself.

The OSCAR International team, volunteers and supporters have had a very productive year. As lockdown restrictions were eased, the primary focus was on getting children back into education and making up for lost 'school time' by raising funds to open more Digital Learning Centres and equip children with tablets installed with self-paced learning software. Throughout the pandemic, OSCAR's UK partner schools raised funds for emergency relief and continued with enthusiasm to support the Digital Learning Centres and tablet distribution.



In September 2021 OSCAR International was delighted to announce the appointment of HRH The Countess of Wessex as Royal Patron. The Countess has supported OSCAR both in Mumbai and the UK since 2016. In line with OSCAR's core values, we feel sure her passion for education and gender equality will help raise awareness of our work.

In April 2022 Ashok and Lucinda embarked on a UK Assembly tour visiting 15 schools, reaching over 6,000 pupils. A morning assembly, a Geography class on low-income communities, followed by 'slum



style' football activities left schools with a greater understanding of the daily challenges faced by OSCAR girls and boys, motivating them to get involved and do what they can to help.



I have had the extraordinary opportunity to work with OSCAR and engage my peers in the USA who have worked together to raise funds and visibility for the OSCAR children. Our work with OSCAR was run by students to help other children protect their rights and raise awareness.

# INTERNATIONAL

The Child Sponsorship project is growing and key to sustainability. We are pleased that the project is keeping kids engaged and inspired. We currently have 65 sponsors supporting 110 children (40 boys, 69 girls, and 1 transgender)



The ASHA initiative within our Child Sponsorship project is integral to OSCAR's Enabling Change Programme. Their generosity enabled our team to accompany young beneficiaries with hearing impairments to specialist clinics to be fitted with hearing aids.

The Trustee Board plays an active role in governance, monitoring and evaluation, safeguarding and fundraising.




