It is both our privilege and honor to present this report of Surgical Eye Expeditions (SEE) International's accomplishments for 2009.

We are proud that through the hard work and generous contributions of many individuals, companies, and foundations, SEE International supported 14,124 sight restoring surgeries around the world in 2009. This was an increase in service of almost 40 percent from 2008, bringing the total number of lives changed for the better to more than 384,000. We were also able to support nine surgeries and help provide eye care to 780 individuals through the Santa Barbara Vision Care Program. And our administrative costs were kept at a very low three percent.

Each surgery performed is the result of the coordinated efforts of volunteer surgeons and other medical professionals, individual donors, foundations, corporations, volunteers, and the dedicated team at our global headquarters. Your generous support enables SEE International to continue this important work of restoring sight to the blind and visually impaired.

Our Affiliates

SEE International welcomes ophthalmologists interested in philanthropic leadership. Our affiliates must be in active practice and board certified (or foreign equivalent) in their country of residence. They donate their time, resources, and talents to perform thousands of sight restoration surgeries every year.

At clinics SEE International coordinates all over the world, affiliate surgeons spend long days in the operating room restoring sight to thousands of people every year.

These affiliates donate their time and talents to provide underserved people in communities who would not otherwise receive care.

Over 600 ophthalmologists from 75 countries belong to SEE International's global network of affiliate volunteers, performing 384,000 surgeries since our founding in 1974.

Visiting affiliates not only pay their own way to and from expedition sites, they also carry all of the additional supplies needed for the expedition with them.

This helps ensure that all equipment arrives safely and on time.

Host affiliates are responsible for coordinating appropriate approvals from local health authorities, performing pre-screenings and post-operative care, and arranging for in-country housing and transportation for visiting surgeons.

Expeditions are also supported by talented registered nurses with ophthalmic experience, certified ophthalmic technicians, surgical technicians, and equipment technicians who donate their time and talents.

Africa, the Middle East, & Eastern Europe

Cataracts are responsible for almost half of the 7 million blind people in Africa alone. Many of these cases occur at a younger age, disabling those who are in the prime of their life.

Being blind in these regions significantly increases mortality rates, by as much as 400 percent in Africa. Women have a significantly higher risk of being visually impaired than men. In 2009, SEE International assisted affiliated ophthalmologists in completing 3,875 surgeries and 8,467 screenings in 12 countries in these regions.

From the field (2009)

Asia is the world's largest and most populous continent, with approximately 4 billion people. The world over, every minute, 12 people become blind and of those 12, four live in the South-East Asia Region.

In 2009, SEE International's expedition teams performed 5,938 surgeries in this region and 15,043 vision screenings. Our volunteer expedition teams worked in 18 different countries in Asia and the Pacific Islands.

Latin America & the Caribbean

Throughout Latin America and the Caribbean, there are many who are blind simply because they have no access to proper eye care. Blindness in this region is in large part due to cataracts, a condition that in most cases is easily fixed. This suffering is needless, as an estimated half or more of the cases of blindness in this region are curable. In 2009, SEE International opthalmologists visited 16 countries in these regions, where they performed 4,174 life-changing surgeries and facilitated 10,566 screenings.





Manual Small Incision Cataract Surgery

In October 2009, 16 humanitarian-minded ophthalmologists arrived in Santa Barbara, Calif., to participate in SEE International's annual M/SICS Course. The course consisted of a didactic lecture and wet-lab sessions under the supervision of Dr. Madhavi Ghanta, a distinguished Indian ophthalmologist who revolutionized the technique and Dr. Jeff Rutgard, a seasoned SEE International affiliate who devotes his practice exclusively to humanitarian ophthalmology.

In recent years, SEE International has expanded its program by teaching and promoting Manual Small Incision Cataract Surgery, a rapid, effective and economical method of cataract removal developed specifically for humanitarian clinic settings.

"I learned a lot from the course and I think what really was a highlight of the day was the ability to use actual human eyes, which really afforded an opportunity to learn the techniques in a hands-on manner," said Dr. Susan Senft.

The course was so effective that one of the participants, Dr. Richard Prince, performed a successful surgical case on a patient suffering from a dense cataract within two weeks of completing the training.

"I think I should have no problem with this surgical technique," said Dr. Prince, who hopes to travel on an upcoming expedition and use M/SICS in the field.

Dr. Prince, however, was not the only course attendee to have expressed his interest and enthusiasm. In fact, each of the participating doctors took a moment to talk to SEE International Clinic Coordinators on the day of the course to explore the expedition opportunities where M/SICS would best benefit the underprivileged blind.

The main advantage of the procedure is that it is completely manual and allows the surgeon to work with a narrow incision. This means that the ophthalmologist can eliminate suturing, gaining time and

eliminating the risk of post-operative complications attributed to suture materials.

SEE International's M/SICS Course is accredited by the American Academy of Ophthalmology as a continuing medical education course.

We would like to thank Madhavi Ghanta, MBBS, DNB and Jeff Rutgard, MD for teaching the course.

A special thanks to Madhavi Ghanta, MBBS, DNB, and the Goutami Eye Institute for allowing SEE International to share her M/SICS presentation.

The Santa Barbara Vision Care Program

The Santa Barbara Vision Care Program (SBVCP) provides vision care to the most economically disadvantaged households in Santa Barbara County, USA. In 2009, SBVCP performed nine surgeries and provided care to 780 individuals, including 170 children during the Kid's Day event organized by the Eyeglass Factory in December.

The SBVCP, administered by SEE International, was founded in the late 1980s to fill the need for access to vision care in the local community surrounding the organization's global headquarters. We receive referrals from social service agencies, churches, schools, and neighborhood clinics.

Our patients receive a comprehensive vision screening program, including vision and glaucoma screenings, free eye glasses (provided by the Eyeglass Factory), community education,

and eye surgery at no charge. This program is entirely funded by local individuals and foundations. From 1992-2009, a total of 49,809 patients have received free vision care and 317 surgeries have been performed during this time.
