Strategic investments for maximum impact

Your support of CARE's Humanitarian Surge Fund is making an outsized difference at a critical time. Careful investments of flexible funds are paying off – by ensuring CARE's response teams are out front in times of crisis and unlocking additional funds worth many times the original allocation.

What You Achieved

In recent months¹, donors to the Surge Fund helped CARE:

- Invest more than **\$4.3 million** toward emergency response and longer-term rehabilitation.
- Deploy rapid response teams to crisis zones in 40 countries.
- Provide initial infusions of \$30,000-\$200,000 for each crisis intervention.
- Multiply the impact of donations by 27x by leveraging nearly
 \$120 million in additional funds from multiple sources.
- Support community preparedness and mitigation plans that maximize impact and minimize cost in times of crisis.
- Keep women and girls at the center of relief efforts, including by applying Rapid Gender Analysis, a tool pioneered by CARE, to address specific needs.
- Pre-position supplies and train staff to ensure effectiveness when emergencies occur.
- Replenish resources for **protracted emergencies**, like long-running refugee crises, that have faded from public awareness.

Preparedness pays off: In Mozambique, CARE builds long-term resilience in communities that are vulnerable to natural disasters during the annual cyclone season. While responding on an emergency basis every year since 2019, CARE prioritizes advance preparation efforts, coordinating with and strengthening local partners. With \$50,000 from the Humanitarian Surge Fund, CARE is forming a strategic partnership to pre-position shelter supplies at CARE's warehouses across the country. The partnership will enable our teams to respond quickly and at scale during the 2025 cyclone season.

Your support is more important than ever at a time of financial uncertainty for the global humanitarian system. As new governments take power in the U.S. and other countries, international aid budgets may face large-scale cuts. Yet the demands for emergency response are greater than ever.

CARE, Always There. CARE's emergency response programs reached nearly 22 million people last year² – across the spectrum from immediate aid to longer-term recovery. We increasingly face complex crises with multiple causes, including conflict and climate change, that pose constantly changing circumstances and require nimble and innovative approaches. Many emergencies receive little international attention and face lagging donor support. In all these cases, CARE is best prepared when we have access to flexible financial resources that can be directed quickly where they are needed most.

The **Humanitarian Surge Fund** helps CARE meet today's challenges by maintaining a **reserve fund** that can be tapped at short notice – when lives are in the balance and there is no time to wait for traditional fundraising campaigns to ramp up. Early intervention helps ensure that **aid reaches the most vulnerable people.** It also can galvanize global attention and catalyze additional grants – often much larger than the initial allocation. **The Surge Fund is a smart investment that pays off many times over.**

The Impact of Your Gift

The Humanitarian Surge Fund supports CARE's efforts in highprofile global emergencies as well as crises that affect millions outside the media spotlight. In each case, we make careful investments to meet immediate needs and help people in the most vulnerable communities rebuild their lives. The following are examples of how gifts to the Humanitarian Surge Fund are making a difference around the world.

• Middle East – Gaza Conflict: Since the outbreak of the current conflict in Gaza in October 2023, CARE has reached more than 804,000 people with lifesaving assistance. Despite huge operational challenges and risks to their own safety, our dedicated local staff and partners are determined to maintain and strengthen our response in shelter, health, water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH), food security, and protection. We launched our response with a Surge Fund allocation of \$536,400, eventually leveraging \$9.8 million in grants from

multiple sources. A separate allocation of **\$200,000** covered medications, supplies, and a solar power system for **CARE's primary healthcare clinic** in Deir Al-Balah, which provides an average of 200 patients daily with services including maternal healthcare, pediatrics, mental health, and vaccinations. *CARE continues to call on parties to the conflict to provide full humanitarian access and the release of all hostages.*

- Lebanon Support for Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs): As intensifying violence is driving a new wave of population displacement, CARE is providing food assistance (hot meals, voucher assistance, and food parcels), dignity and hygiene kits, water, and other necessities in and outside shelters. CARE is responding in North, Beirut, Mount Lebanon, Beqaa, and Akkar governorates, with programs including food security, WASH, shelter, and protection targeting women, girls, the elderly, marginalized communities, and people with disabilities. A Surge Fund allocation of \$231,000 has helped unlock more than \$1.7 million in additional grants.
- Vietnam Super Typhoon Yagi: In September 2024, the strongest storm to hit Vietnam in decades caused widespread loss of life and damage. Challenges, especially for women and girls, included access to food, clean water, shelter, menstrual hygiene supplies, and healthcare. In addition to physical injuries, many survivors face mental health issues, including the emotional toll of losing homes, livelihoods, and assets. CARE, working with government partners, launched an immediate and longer-term response, including cash vouchers to begin vegetable planting and multi-purpose cash to rebuild homes. The initial \$175,000 allocation from the Surge Fund resulted in \$675,000 in leveraged funds from multiple sources.
- Nigeria Flooding: Floods in Jigawa state in August 2024 resulted in widescale loss of life and property, including disrupted food supplies, contaminated water sources, and long-term impact on livelihoods due to submerged farmlands. Women and girls face particular challenges, including menstrual hygiene and the threat of violence. CARE's comprehensive response includes emergency food assistance through cash transfers; nutrition counseling and education; supplies for water purification and storage; hygiene supplies and promotion; safe spaces for women and girls including hygiene facilities and counseling services; and outreach campaigns and training to reduce the risk of gender-based violence. An allocation of \$150,000 from the Surge Fund has helped unlock \$1,245,000 in leveraged funds.

• Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) – North and South Kivu Displacement and Flooding: The resurgence of conflict in eastern DRC has resulted in displacement and a surge in criminality, including sexual violence, in IDP settlements. The situation has been exacerbated by extreme weather that has destroyed temporary shelters and emergency latrines. CARE's response included food assistance, dignity kits to meet women's and girls' needs, safe spaces and psychosocial support for survivors of gender-based violence, and support for village savings and loan associations to help affected people, especially women, rebuild their livelihoods. With an initial \$125,000 allocation from the Surge Fund, CARE accessed \$2,325,000 in leveraged funds.



• **Chad – Food and Nutrition Crisis:** Chad is confronting a complex humanitarian crisis characterized by persistent insecurity, instability in neighboring countries, economic shocks, drought, and floods,

against a backdrop of political fragility. Chad hosts about 1.4 million refugees and asylum seekers – the most per capita in Africa. More than 7.6 million people are in humanitarian need, but a funding shortfall led to severe cutbacks in food assistance a year ago. An allocation of \$150,000 from the Humanitarian Surge Fund was leveraged to raise an additional \$1,672,500. CARE provided cash, agricultural inputs, tools, and technical training to help families meet immediate needs and invest in livelihoods. We also distributed feed and supplements to help pastoral households sustain their herds during the lean season, improved WASH access at facilities serving malnourished women and children, and worked to mitigate and respond to gender-based violence.

- Burundi Protection and Prevention of Gender-based Violence: As in many emergencies, the severe weather events linked to the El Niño climate phenomenon have seen an elevated risk of threats to women and girls, including gender-based violence and sexual exploitation. The effects of El Niño include abnormal rainfall, flooding, landslides, and destruction of homes and economic infrastructure. CARE's priority is sustained protection and prevention including through awareness raising, the selection and training of male and female "gender champions," and distribution of household, hygiene, and dignity kits. Composition of the dignity kits such as menstrual hygiene supplies and solar-powered flashlights for safety are based on women's input about their needs. Activities were launched with an initial \$100,000 from the Humanitarian Surge Fund.
- Bangladesh Flooding: In August 2024, 12 districts of eastern Bangladesh were inundated by heavy rains and an onrush of water from upstream Indian states, affecting millions of people. In addition to immediate shortages of safe water, emergency shelter, WASH and household supplies, and other necessities, many faced longterm livelihood threats due to the lack of water and fodder for farm animals. Hundreds of thousands of people fled their homes for flood shelters, with some bringing their livestock. CARE worked through a local partner to provide multipurpose cash assistance, focusing on food security, livelihood restoration, and overall wellbeing. The team also distributed hygiene kits to meet the needs of women and adolescent girls. An initial allocation of \$100,000 from the Surge Fund was supplemented with \$80,000 in leveraged funds.

Your Gift Multiplied: The Surge Fund's Leverage Effect

The examples above are just a few of the emergencies where resources from CARE's Humanitarian Surge Fund have been deployed in recent months. Since July 1, 2023, *more than \$4.3 million in allocations from the Humanitarian Surge Fund helped CARE launch emergency responses in 40 countries*. Thanks to those investments, CARE *leveraged nearly \$120 million in additional grants*. The full list of Surge Fund allocations between July 2023 and November 2024 is shown below.
