# Workshops

#### **Exploring and Understanding Laughter**

Robin Graham is a Laughter consultant, Laughter Ambassador for Laughter Yoga International, and for Laughter For All Ethiopia, a teacher of yoga breathing with the Art of Living Foundation, and has been leading laughter-based activities since 1998. Inspired by laughter and spirituality, he is driven by the potential to change the world, build stronger more compassionate communities, and to help individuals to find happiness. He has an MA in Health and Happiness Awareness, and is a playwright and poet too, president of the Rotary Club of Manchester, Trustee of WeStandTogether, and runs Feelgood Communities CIC.

#### **Hidden Disability Awareness**

Accessibility remains a barrier for many members of society, including those with hidden disabilities, which are often misunderstood largely due to a lack of awareness. Chloe Coxshall is a neurodivergent and chronically ill person, who has experienced these barriers first-hand and is passionate about accessibility education. She will be running a workshop for students to create draft campaigns to advocate for hidden disabilities, whether this focuses on a specific aspect of hidden disabilities, a specific access need or accessibility in a specific venue. Initiating conversations about disabilities is often the first step in improving accessibility and inclusivity.

#### Black2Nature

Lily Khandker, the Equality Diversity & Inclusion and Visible Minority Ethnic Communities Manager at Black2Nature will be running a workshop on Black2Nature! Black2Nature campaigns for equal access to nature for Visible Minority Ethnic (VME) communities as they are currently excluded from the countryside. They organise nature camps, events, conferences, and campaigns to make nature conservation and environmental sectors ethnically diverse. They nurture VME young people to help them find their inner resilience to help their mental health.



# Workshops

#### Young Magistrates

My name is Robert Stone and I am a Hampshire magistrate. I shall be assisted in facilitating the workshop by up to two magistrate colleagues. In the workshop we shall explore a range of issues around knife crime, through consideration of the case of a young person charged with having a knife in a public place. All participants will be encouraged to play an active part in discussing the issues involved. This will include an interactive session which will involve critical thinking whilst making their deliberations, with a few curve balls to get them to reassess their verdicts.

#### **Billion Acts of Peace**

#### What is Billion Acts of Peace?



On PeaceJam's 10-year anniversary, **10 Nobel Peace Laureates and 3000 PeaceJam youth from over 40 countries joined together** at an unprecedented and immensely powerful event to plan and implement a global call to action.

10 Issue Areas were identified as the most important of our time to ensure more peace in the world, and a goal was set - engage everyday citizens worldwide to join together to create and inspire 1 Billion Acts of Peace, and in the process truly change the world collectively.

### **Social Action Projects**

On the Billion Acts of Peace website, you can log an act of peace or create a campaign, otherwise referred to as a social action project (SAP).

#### What is an Act of Peace?

A thoughtful action that spreads more peace in your community and impacts one or more of the Billion Acts Issue Areas. It can contribute to a larger social action project e.g. writing a letter for a letter writing campaign or taking part in litter picking.

#### What is a Campaign/SAP?

A campaign allows you to mobilise your community, around an event, address a need in your area, or set a goal to create an impact in one or more of the Billion Acts Issue Areas and work to achieve it together.

Each year, the One Billion Acts of Peace campaign highlights the best youth acts and projects, worldwide. 12 Finalists are selected and honored worldwide.

#### **Matty's Social Action Project**

Hey, I'm Matty from the PeaceJam UK Youth Team. As part of the youth team we're asked to run a Social Action Project. I decided to do my campaign on nuclear disarmament because I think that nuclear weapons should be abolished. We live in a nuclear weapon state and have been taught that nuclear weapons keep us safe. This is a myth. Nuclear weapons are weapons of mass destruction, and they're dangerous and harmful even before they're used: during production, storage and maintenance.

A social action campaign combines EDUCATION with ACTION. I don't agree with the way we're educated to think that nuclear weapons are necessary for defense or peace: they're NOT moral, logical or safe. So, I created a fact sheet to *re-educate* people on nuclear weapons and help them *unlearn* some of the myths we're taught. I also wanted to help promote the TPNW, the treaty that made these horrific weapons illegal.

The 'Act of Peace' element of my project is simple: get each of you guys to decorate the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament logo in your logbook and post a picture of it using the hashtag #TPNWYouthVoices. It's a quick, accessible, creative way to show that young people do care about nuclear disarmament and to help spread awareness of the landmark treaty:

# **TPNW**

Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons

AKA The Ban Treaty.

It helps move us towards nuclear disarmament by banning: developing, testing, producing, acquiring, possessing, stockpiling, using or threatening to use nuclear weapons.

#### THE YEAR NUCLEAR **WEAPONS BECAME** ILLEGAL

Once 50 countries have ratified (consented to be legally bound by a treaty), it enters into force. The TPNW entered into force on 22nd January 2021. making nuclear weapons ILLEGAL.

# **URANIUM**

Nuclear weapons are destructive even before they're used.



At production stage, uranium mining causes:

- · destruction of ecosystems
- · radioactive contamination
- long-term health impacts to locals (often indigenous communities) due to radiation exposure

#### **POSITIVE OBLIGATIONS**

Commitments to **DO** things, as well as **NOT** to do things:

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION** & VICTIM ASSISSTANCE

The TPNW commits countries to help reduce the impact of contamination to **environments** UK did nuclear tests & ecosystems from nuclear weapons use and testing. They must also help the **people** & communities they've harmed.




