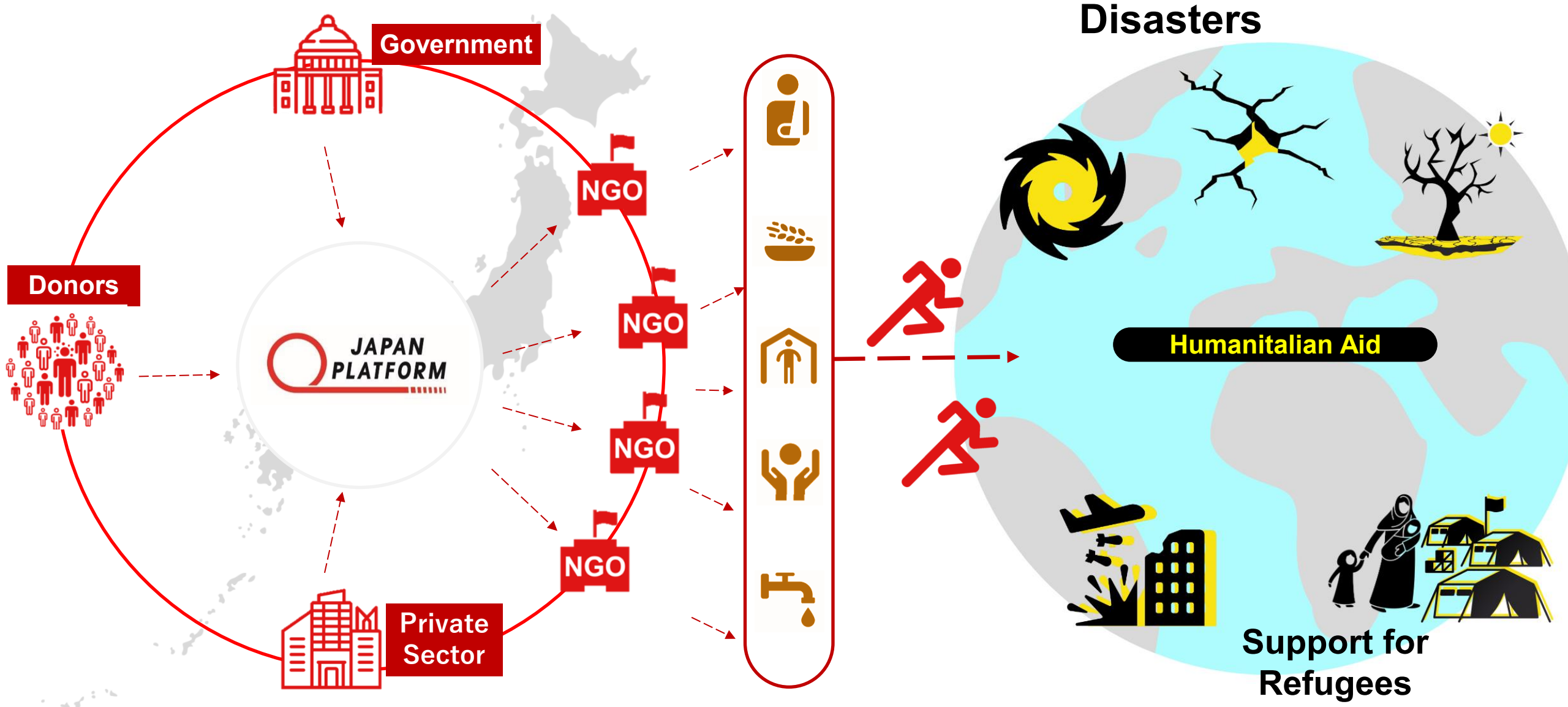

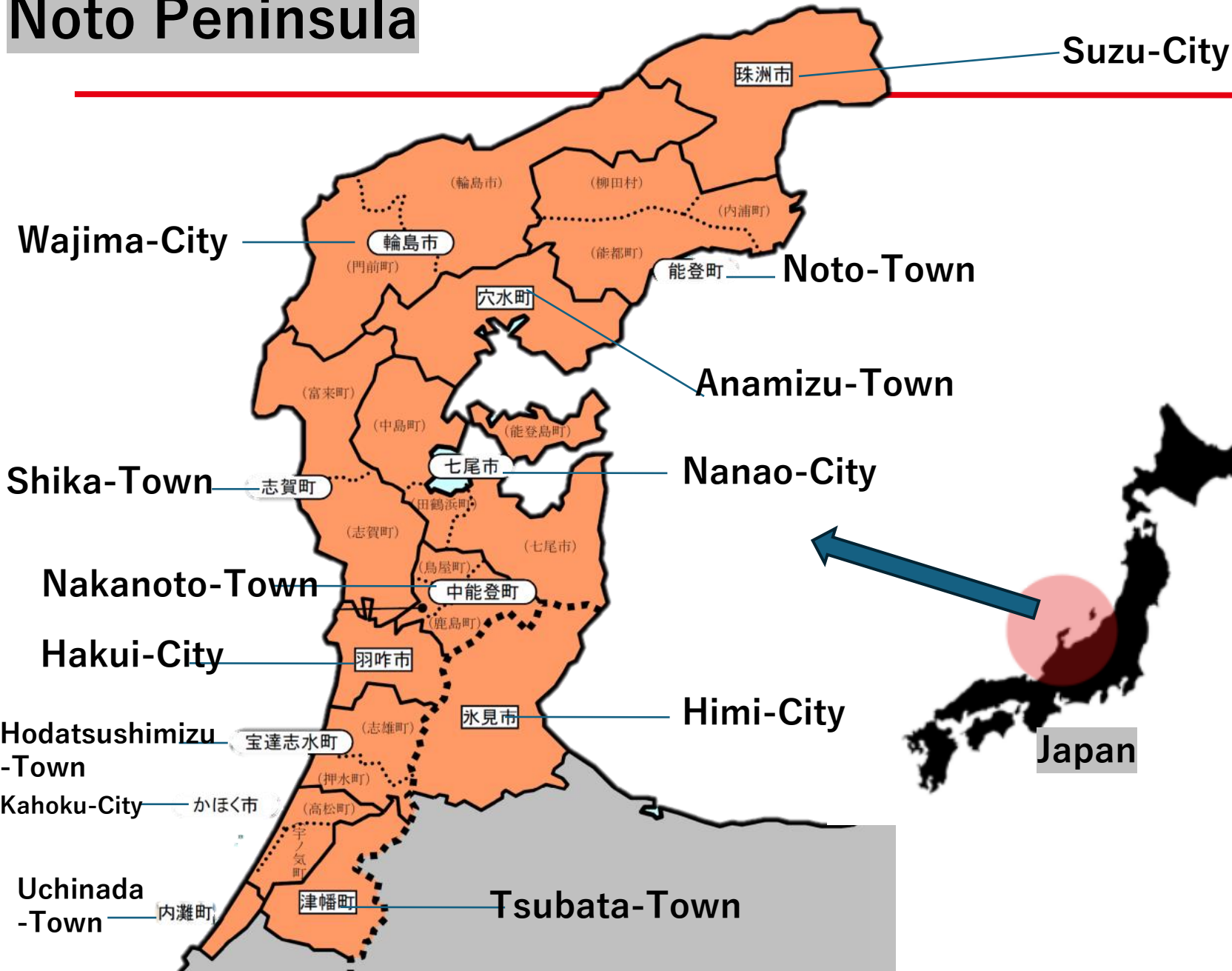

Update: Sep. 24, 2024

On September 23, 2024, Japan Platform for Disaster Relief (JPF), an international NGO Emergency Humanitarian Aid, will expand its support plan for victims of the 2024 Noto Peninsula Earthquake, which has been ongoing since January 1 this year, to support victims of the torrential rain damage in the Oku-Noto region of Ishikawa Prefecture.

<b>Period</b>	January 2, 2024 - March 31, 2026
<b>Target area</b>	Areas affected by torrential rain disaster, Noto Peninsula Earthquake in 2024
<b>Support</b>	Emergency Humanitarian Aid, surveys, material support such as food and daily necessities, support for evacuees (in shelters and at home), support for the disabled, the elderly, and children, etc.
<b>Active Groups</b>	10 JPF member NGOs are active in the field

※ The period and budget for the support will be reviewed as necessary according to the local situation.

# Activity Report

2025.

Temporary bathing facilities have been in operation since immediately after the earthquake. People from the disaster area also worked as staff members.

V-Net, a JPF member NGO, began providing support in Noto immediately after the earthquake in January 2024. While delivering food, fuel, and other supplies to evacuation centers, we set up and operated temporary bathing facilities at evacuation centers as a funds project in response to the desperate need for support from the affected areas and the government. When the area was hit again by torrential rains in September 2024, we decided to continue our support for the baths, providing warm baths to many people until the end of the project in February 2025. Local residents also played an active role in the operation of the baths as staff members, leading to employment.

I was born and raised in Wajima. My house was partially destroyed by the earthquake, and I lived in a shelter, but now I am living in temporary housing. When I was finally getting used to life in the area, electricity and water were temporarily cut off due to the flooding last September. My place was fine, but the temporary housing near my house was flooded up to below my waist. I also have to work, so I have been working at this temporary bathhouse since May. I am very grateful to all those who are helping me."

Noto was a region where residents had strong ties with each other, but the living environment has changed drastically due to the earthquake damage. Preventing the isolation of disaster victims during the process of moving into temporary housing, for example, has become an important issue. PARCIC, a JPF member NGO, has discovered through its past activities that food distribution can also be a place for the affected people to interact with each other through conversations in a relaxing space such as a tea party, PARCIC has been able to meet the needs of people of various generations through tea parties and other relaxing conversations.

Since the Noto Peninsula earthquake on January 1, 2024 and the multiple disasters caused by the torrential rain disaster on September 21 of the same year, local people have been suffering from prolonged anxiety and stress, and are increasingly troubled by insomnia. In Suzu City, Ishikawa Prefecture, where more than 50% of the population is aged, many people have health problems such as chronic diseases and need nursing care, making it essential to take measures to prevent disaster-related deaths.

Peace Winds Japan (PW), a Japan Platform (JPF) member NGO, is working with Suzu City in three districts of the city to prevent the deterioration of health conditions and isolation and loneliness of disaster victims, which are believed to be factors causing disaster-related deaths.
