

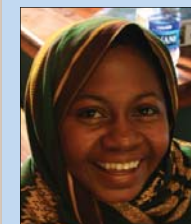

We believe that an investment in education will set an individual on a path to success that will ultimately help them break out of the cycle of poverty. S4Si is a federally recognized non-profit organization based at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. Our mission is to provide educational opportunities to outstanding but disadvantaged young women. Currently, we support the secondary education of 33 girls on the Tanzanian island of Zanzibar.

OUR PHILOSOPHY

- After realizing the tremendous problems that many women face while trying to gain access to higher education, we made a commitment to focus exclusively on women's education.
- We believe that an investment in these students' schooling will set them on a path to success where they can realize their full potential as agents of change in their communities.

HOW WE WORK

- S4Si is run completely by students at UNC-Chapel Hill and our sister organization at the University of Virginia.
- We run our organization with different committees of volunteers that reach out to students on campus and members of the local community.
- Our student Board of Directors meets on a weekly basis to measure and evaluate progress on campus and discuss news and correspondence from our scholars in Tanzania.

HOW WE CHOOSE OUR SCHOLARS

- Each summer S4Si sends student delegates to spend several weeks in Tanzania to choose new scholars.
- Scholars are interviewed, their academic records are reviewed, and other factors outside of academics are assessed.
- We find it particularly compelling when we meet a student who is very gifted but without the help of our scholarship would not be able to attend school because of the hardship it would cause her family.

WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

- All money raised goes toward funding scholarships.
- We pay for: tuition, transportation, books, uniforms, meals, etc.
- We encourage our scholars to attend university; we will support them through their years there as well.

HOW TO SUPPORT S4Si: Our scholars will be the leaders of their generation in Tanzania, and supporting them is supporting the reversal of poverty and rise of education for women in Zanzibar. Students for Students International is always looking to reach out to individuals and organizations that are interested in supporting our mission. Investing \$300 will support a scholar for an entire year, and \$1,200 will support a woman for all four years of high school. However, any donation, no matter the amount, will no doubt make a lasting impact on the future of a young woman.
