## The Work of FGM Fund Grantee-Partners

The FGM Fund provides financial, technical and advocacy support for grassroots organizations raising awareness in their communities about the health and human rights implications of FGM and working for legal protection from the practice.

Activities of FGM Fund grantee-partners include:

- creating alternative rites of passage and facilitating reconciliation with parents for girls who run away from FGM
- reaching out to students through peer educator trainings, school-based anti-FGM clubs, and "vacation without FGM" programs
- sensitizing parents, children, lawyers, religious leaders, circumcisers, health care workers, policymakers and law enforcement
- working with fathers' clubs and men's groups to build awareness and opposition to FGM
- developing alternative income-generating training and programs for circumcisers
- holding workshops on women's and children's rights and disseminating medical information about the harmful effects of FGM
- using radio, community media and theatre to disseminate information about FGM and publicize advocacy efforts to end the practice
- working with parliamentarians to ensure the enactment of laws prohibiting FGM
- monitoring and advocating for the enactment and implementation of anti-FGM laws

### What is FGM?

Female genital mutilation (FGM) is a 5,000-year-old harmful practice performed across Africa, and in some parts of Asia and the Middle East. FGM describes one of several procedures: the partial or total removal of the clitoris (clitoridectomy); the removal of the entire clitoris and the cutting of the labia minora (excision); or—in its most extreme form—the removal of all external genitalia and stitching together of the two sides of the vulva leaving only a small vaginal opening (infibulation). Generally performed without anesthesia, traditional circumcisers (predominantly women), midwives and medical personnel, including physicians, are known to perform FGM.

FGM can have devastating consequences, including:

- chronic infection
- psychological trauma
- severe pain during urination, menstruation, sexual intercourse and childbirth
- potential death from bleeding or infection

Used in an effort to control women's sexuality, FGM is an extreme form of the many harmful

traditional practices imposed by society to deny women equality. It is defended by both men and women as a social prerequisite to marriage and acceptance of girls into the community. Laws can have an impact on reducing the prevalence of FGM, particularly in countries where they are publicized and enforced. However, laws are not enough to stop this deeply rooted cultural tradition: education, community outreach and political will must also be in place to end FGM.

130 to 140 million women and girls have been subjected to FGM, a human rights violation, whose practice is a breach of a number of international conventions.

Every year, two million girls—or 6,000 per day—are at risk of FGM.

# Why do we need the FGM Fund?

Equality Now established the Fund for Grassroots Activism to End FGM (FGM Fund) in 2000 because we believe that FGM will not be eradicated without grassroots organizations. However, these local groups are often underfunded, isolated and face the overwhelming challenge of addressing the need for urgent intervention. Groups on the ground have the unique ability to change social and cultural norms within their communities and society. Twenty years ago, conversations about the practice were taboo, but now due to the advocacy, outreach and education efforts of these activists, changes in national laws, policies and attitudes to protect girls from FGM are emerging.

Through the FGM Fund, Equality Now ensures that grantee-partners can maximize their effectiveness and the collective impact of their work to end FGM by aiding with monitoring, evaluation and implemention of activities, and facilitating group support and dialogue, including convening an annual FGM Fund meeting.

#### Awaken

Equality Now publishes the biannual newsletter *Awaken*, a resource for communities and activists, including FGM Fund grantee-partners, to discuss current issues related to FGM. *Awaken* is printed in English, French and Arabic to facilitate access to the information and discussion in communities where FGM is practiced.
