

Brief Introduction of the Primary Education Project (PEP)

Miss Jane Jerrad initiated the Primary Education Project (PEP) in 2001 under the governance of the Diocese of Hyderabad (DoH) Church of Pakistan (CoP). Since June 2022, Mr. Mithu Naroo has been leading the PEP team and its projects under the leadership of Rt. Rev. Bishop Kaleem John. PEP is actively making a significant impact in the marginalized communities of six districts, including Sanghar, Mirpurkhas, Umerkot, Tando Allahyar, Tando Mohammad Khan, and Badin. Through various projects and programs, PEP provides quality education and plays a crucial role in community development. By the end of April 2024, PEP has served an estimated more than 35,000 beneficiaries, with 10,000 direct beneficiaries and 25,000 indirect beneficiaries.

(1.1) Sustainable Village Schools:







During the **project cycle from 2022 to March 2024,** PEP has decided **not to establish any new schools** based on the Donor's recommendation. Instead, PEP focus on providing ongoing support to become self-sustainable, where they are fully owned and operated by the communities. As of March 2024, PEP has **successfully phased-out from 21 schools**.

(1.2) Women Empowerment Groups (WEGs):







PEP has formed 92 Women Empowerment Groups (WEGs) involving 1199 women, these women are doing saving in their groups and utilize that saving for various purposes like constructing latrines, buying livestock, launching small businesses, and covering healthcare costs. Additionally, PEP has conducted diverse training sessions for WEGs on topics like the advantages of saving, small businesses, clean water, child protection, and preventing early marriages. These training have led to positive transformations in the attitudes and behaviors of women, boosting their confidence to enhance the social and economic well-being of their families. Furthermore, PEP has established 35 Female Adult Literacy Centers (FALCs) where 352 women are being taught fundamental literacy skills to further empower them.

(1.3) Aflatoun (Social and Financial Education for enrolled children in primary schools):







The PEP is a partner of Aflatoun International since 2010 and implementing Aflatoun Curriculum in its village schools. PEP established Aflatoun groups for 3rd to 5th grade students and each group has approximately 10 students involved in weekly/monthly saving. These students use money for buying their stationary, uniform and celebrating festivals with their own money. The purposes of these groups are to make them independent and help them to take effective decisions of their future.

(2) AFLATEEN (Social and Financial Education for enrolled and non-enrolled teenage children):







PEP established **40** groups of the adolescents in the targeted 40 communities and provided **Training of Trainer (ToT)** to the selected **40 teachers** who were assigned to teach the **Aflateen+ Life Skills and Financial Education** curriculum through sessions. The major topics of the sessions were:

- Career counseling
- Entrepreneurship
- HIV awareness
- Disadvantages of Drugs & Addiction
- Stop Child Marriage

(3) COMMUNITY ECONOMIC & SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT







The project aims to enhance awareness by conducting sessions, training, and theater performances on various social issues such as girls' education, health & hygiene, child labor, early marriage, and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR). Additionally, it has set up 24 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and Female Adult Literacy Centers, installed 24 hand pumps, provided 430 water coolers, distributed 150 health and hygiene kits, 500 school stationery sets and bags, and offered seed grants (PKR.50,000 for each) for small businesses to 24 women. The SHG members have also received (376 kitchen gardening kits & 215 Goats) and training on kitchen gardening and livestock management to support their families' well-being.

(4) STOP CHILD MARRIAGE PROJECT







The PEP-DoH is currently executing the 5th phase of the Stop Child Marriage Project since 2018-2024 in specific villages, focusing on empowering communities about GIRLS NOT BRIDE and THE RIGHT TO BE A GIRL through various awareness activities such as sessions, campaigns, seminars, and theater performances. PEP also urges parents to enroll their daughters in nearby schools, offering school bags and stationery, and providing sewing machines and training to girls who have finished 5th grade and are pursuing further education.

(5) TRANSFORMING CHURCH CAPACITIES (TCC) PROJECT







The Transforming Church Capacities (TCC) project was implemented with the youth of **12** churches, the project had a clear **objective of instilling biblical values and strengthening the youth's connection with God**. Furthermore, it successfully **guided young leaders in their journey towards the church and helped them gain a deeper understanding of their faith.** Some major achievements of the projects are:

- 58 Youth (26 male & 32 female) trained through discipleship training in collaboration of OTS.
- 90 Youth (41 boys & 49 female) attended Let's Think National conference facilitated by SALT.
- 43 people (29 male & 14 female) trained on through Leadership Development Workshop, facilitated by TILTI.
- 101 Youth (male 47 & 54 female) attended Personal and Professional Skills Development workshop.
- 2 Prayers sessions conducted and attended by 98 people.
- 2 peace building sessions conducted and attended by 50 youth member

(6) OUTREACH CONSORTIUM PROJECT (OCP) SINDH







The Outreach Consortium Project (OCP) is a coalition of seven Christian organizations of Sindh which is implemented in interior Sindh and it covers four districts including Mirpurkhas, Umerkot, Hyderabad and Tando Allahyar. Strategically, the project focuses on outreach ministry with collective aims to encourage

holistic transformation among unreached Christian communities and churches. The OCP is led by PEP-DoH and is responsible for reporting, monitoring, government compliances and guiding the implementing partners for the effective smooth running of the project. The other six partners including 1. Society for Safe Environment and Welfare of Agrarians in Pakistan (SSEWA-Pak) 2. Kachhi Community Development Association (KCDA) 3. Parkari Community Development Programme (PCDP) 4. Sahara Community Health Association (SaCHA) 5. Hayat-E-Nau (HEN) 6. Desert Care Challenge (DCC) further covers the outreach components and activities to reach the unreached communities. The disbursement of the funds among consortium partners is managed by the Diocese of Hyderabad (DoH) Church of Pakistan.
