

EDUCATION AND LEADERSHIP FOR GIRLS IN RURAL AREAS

Teach for Bolivia is committed to transforming education in rural areas of the country, focusing on girls and young women who face significant barriers to accessing inclusive, quality education. One of the fundamental pillars of this program is the training of professionals, known as **Agents of Change**, who contribute skills, experience, and a deep commitment to the education of the most vulnerable. Through this commitment, we can demonstrate how this effort positively impacts rural communities and how our programs contribute to the leadership, self-esteem, and comprehensive development of students, especially girls and adolescents.



During the first two months of the school year, the Teach for Bolivia Programs Department held "Introduction Breakfasts," with 45 meetings in La Paz and 10 in Santa Cruz. These events brought together key players from the local educational ecosystem with the goal of strengthening collaborative partnerships.

In an environment of equal dialogue, the collective commitment to transformative education in communities, especially for indigenous girls and adolescents, was strengthened.

Climate Education

We celebrated World Environment Day with our educational communities in La Paz and Santa Cruz, where our girls and young women led environmental awareness activities with children and adolescents.

During the activity, students learned how to make eco-bricks using 2-liter bottles filled with up to 400 grams of plastic waste, which is equivalent to approximately 500 to 700 bags.
